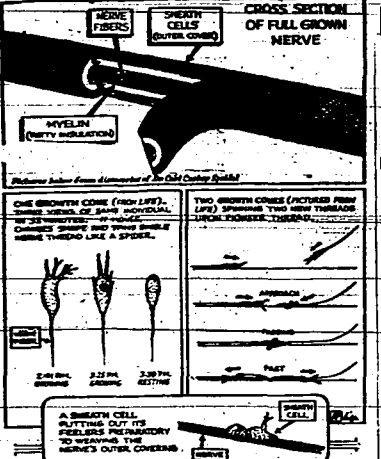

**N**EW YORK, Jan. 12.—To those who speculate upon what is known as the "intelligence" of the nervous system, Dr. Carl Caskey, specialist in nerve anatomy, has made a discovery which is a new theory of life.



Like flowers which maintain communications and power circuits, the nervous system's growth cones are living things which spin nerves and assemble power through intelligence to lay the correct nerve trails and feel their way across obstacles. ## SCIENTISTS PROBE MYSTERIES OF SKY AND ATOM IN YEAR

Progress in War On Cancer and Discovery of New Planet—Feature in Period  
FIELD OF MEDICINE REVEALS BIG GAINS  
Discovery of New Element and—Exploration Trips Also Get Center of Stage

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Scientists in 1931 built a machine to smash the atom, captured new outposts in the war on

Discovery of evidence of huge energy source.  
Building of electrical machine to "smash" the atom.  
Discovering of new ways to cancer treatment.

Discovery of cause of certain types of insanity.  
Ascension of record balloon to estimated height of 23 miles.  
Exploration of Arctic waters by under-sea submarine.  
Making "curable" disease germs visible.

cancer and found evidence of an undiscovered planet out in space. Suspicion that the new planet exists was picked by Dr. William H. Pickering, Mandeville, Jamaica, New York. He noted that the planet Uranus is not following its regular orbit. It was pulled off its course, he believes, by attraction of the unknown planet, which he calls Planet P.  
He has computed that it must be 44,000 miles in diameter, nearly six times the diameter of the earth, and travels around the sun once in every 658 earth years.  
A new sky speed camera was operated by astronomers of Mt. Wilson observatory, California. They found that distant nebulae apparently are rushing away from the earth at 11,000 miles a second, a record to date.

Exploding Universe  
This helped bolster the theory that the universe is "exploding" constantly growing larger.  
A new comet was discovered by Naasal Nagata, Japanese meteor farm worker and amateur astronomer of California.  
Blood of "cancer" patients was found to be more alkaline and to have more "rough" than normal," by Dr. Ellice McDonald of the University of Pennsylvania.  
Another clue may result from studies by the United States Public Health Service, showing that some kinds of living cells multiply rapidly when stimulated by a substance called glutathione.  
Cancer cells, which contain much glutathione, are fatal chiefly because they multiply faster than normal.  
Aviator-prospectors, flying over the northern Canada wilderness, found radium deposits believed worth millions of dollars. These may break the monopoly now held by

Belgium through its Congo mines and make radium less expensive to use in treating cancer.  
R. Van de Graaff of Princeton expects to produce energy of 70 to 80,000 volts with electrical apparatus he has designed. This, transformed into X-rays, can be used for medical experiments with cancer treatment.  
Unlocking the energy of the atom in another possibility of Van de Graaff's apparatus. With its tremendous power it may be possible to transmit one element into another, as the old alchemists dreamed of making gold from lead.  
Next to the last of the unknown element, number 87, was discovered by Professor Jacob Papah, Cornell. Germa like those of influenza and measles, hitherto invisible, was brought out into the light by Professor Arthur I. Kendall of Northwestern university. It is fed by feeding them protein.  
A world's altitude record was claimed by Professor Auguste Piccard, Belgian physicist, who, sealed in a metal ball, soared almost 10 miles into the stratosphere in a balloon to study the upper air and to come rays that come from outer space.

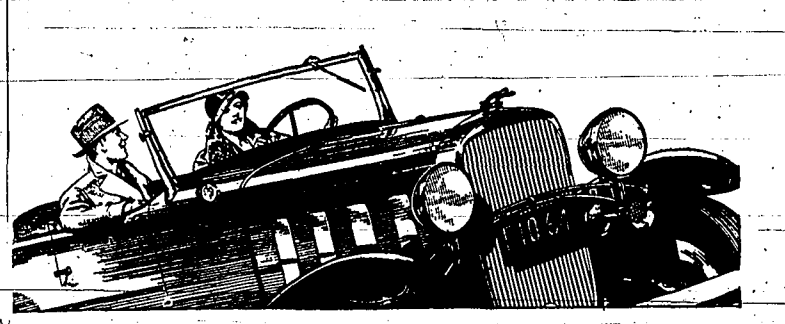

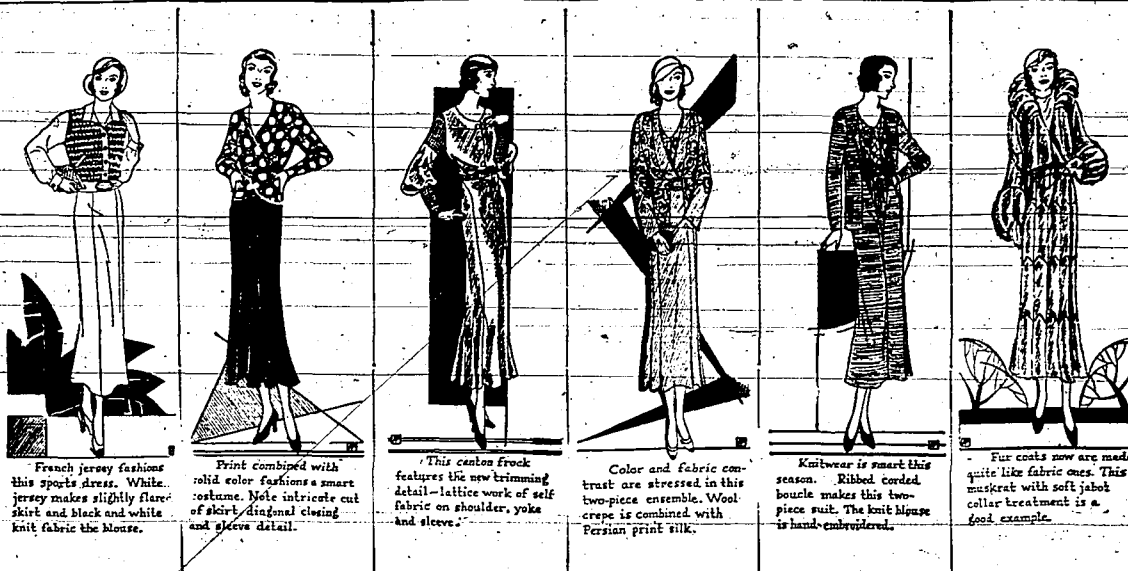
