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GRUESOME STORIES FEATURE TRIAL OF PHOENIX WOMAN

Midget Prosecutor Slowly Forges Chain of Circumstantial Evidence to Lead Ruth Judd to Gallows

PHOENIX, Ariz., Jan. 23—A stocky, five-foot prosecutor, "forged" link by link today the circumstantial chain of evidence by which he hopes to lead Winnie Ruth Judd up the 13 iron steps of the Arizona gallows.

Descriptions of the discovery in Los Angeles of the body of Mrs. Judd, the victim, Samuelson, shipped and carried there as "books and personal effects" by the Phoenix Police group which jammed Judge Howard C. Spinkman's docket.

On the whole, the final chapters by which the state expects to fasten the implacable fact of Ruth Judd's murder on the slim, blue-eyed defendant, County Attorney Lloyd J. Andrews, include the death of Mrs. West's three-month-old daughter, who died the night and early morning of the murder.

Tracing the death-walked trail of Mrs. Judd from Phoenix to Los Angeles, the prosecution, through witnesses whose names are being driven one witness after another from the courtroom and wrap the rest of the case.

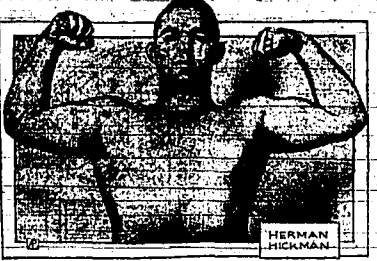
