# Portraits Inspire Stamps Marking Washington Bicentennial

## MINIATURE GALLERY OF ART COVERS 12 PERIODS OF CAREER

Few of Paintings Come From Brushes of Comrades in Revolutionary Battles.

ISSUE DRAWS UPON FIVE CHARLES-PEA-LE WORKS

Postoffice Likenesses Show Period of Life From Ages of 25 to 65 Years

By OSCAR LEIDING (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—"From 25 to 65"—the title of the miniature gallery of art on the postage stamps issued by the post office department in commemoration of its bicentennial anniversary.

For representing 12 likenesses of Washington as he was seen by artists of his time—some of them his fellow soldiers—the stamp portray the first president from the year before his marriage to the widow Martha Custis to within a few days of his death.

While exceeded in number of denominations by the Columbian series of 1893, the stamp issue is expected to have the greatest sale of any postage series in history.

The "By Charles Peale" series of stamps will feature a portrait of Washington in the revolution and a painter of 12 portraits of Washington from life, drawn upon for five likenesses in the postage series.

Peale was present at the battle of Trenton and Germantown, and kept up his painting throughout his war service.

Half-cent stamps bear a Peale likeness of Washington at the age of 25. It appears on a miniature of the original of which is in the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York.

One and one-half-cent stamps show the original of which is in the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, and now at Washington and Lee university.

The picture on the 3-cent stamp shows Washington in the uniform of a general with a coat that is a facsimile of the original, now in the State normal school, West Chester, Pennsylvania, in 1777 at Valley Forge.

Another Peale portrait, made the same year, showing the general with hat in hand, is seen on the four-cent stamp. The original is in the possession of William Patten, Rhinebeck, New York.

The New York Historical society has the original portrayed on the five-cent stamp which was made by Peale in 1793.

Stuart's Painting Framed

The brush of Gilbert Stuart, noted American painter, to whom 124 portraits of Washington are credited, contributed the likeness on the 2-cent and 10-cent stamps.

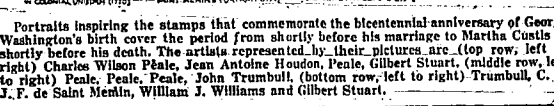
Best known is the "Ambrosian portrait," made in 1796 in Germantown, Pennsylvania, the original of which is in the Boston Museum of Fine Arts.

The other, called the "Bourbon-Charming" portrait, was painted a year later and is in the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Stuart, notoriously by the "atheneum" in an unfinished state, to which he would not have to paint with it.

Portrait on His Staff

John Trumbull, who as a member of Washington's staff during the revolution saw him in some of the most important incidents of his career, painted the likeness from which the 6-cent and 7-cent stamp pictures are taken.

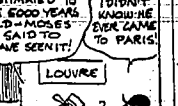
