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BURLEY IRRIGATORS USE POWER FUNDS

Waterusers of District Re- ceive Notice of Payment of Construction Charges

BURLEY, Jan. 28 (Special to The News)—Notice has been given Burley Irrigation district waterusers by Secretary G. W. Lyle that construction charges for the year 1931 have been paid from proceeds of general district power profits, and that they need not be met by individual waterusers this year. The 1931 construction charge was set at \$125 an acre of irrigated land.

The power profits are being used, in part, to carry out an enlargement program of canals and pumps under the pumping system. Part of these profits have been set up through legal action taken by the Minnesota Irrigation District, which asks for a readjustment of private distribution of these profits between the two districts of the Minnesota project.

No part of any of the construction charges for any year other than 1931 may be paid from the power profits. Secretary Lyle advises, too, that any maintenance charges be paid. The permit from the secretary of the interior was given today for payment of the 1931 construction charges, amounting to \$125 an acre.



Dawes Sheds Diplomatic Robes To Head Huge Credit Unit

LEADING ENVOY OF NATION RESIGNS TO DISPENSE BILLIONS

America's Most Famous Pipe Smoker Reverts to Natural Position of Financier

NEW POST RECALLS VERSATILE CAREER

Lawyer, Engineer, Soldier, Author and Vice President Shines As Executive

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—America's most famous pipe smoker has tossed aside the trappings of diplomacy again to become Charles Dawes, master financier.

First "Dawes Plan" Pays For Schooling

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—Charles Dawes' bent for financial management dates from the first year job he ever had. During one summer he was a surveyor on an Ohio road construction project. He did the task so well he was made chief engineer for one stretch of road. Back to Cincinnati law school he went in the fall, but returned week-ends to supervise the construction crew, who were paid in scrip, for times were hard then. Young Dawes bought the workmen's scrip, sold it to bankers at a profit and made enough money to continue in school.

With a single flourish he has discarded the ambassadorial hat and diplomatic shirt to roll up his sleeves as head of the two-billion-dollar Reconstruction corporation—the greatest credit agency calculated to alleviate the nation's business ills. Thus America's leading ambassador reverts to his natural role—the Dawes who shines with rapid-fire activity in terms of millions and billions. It takes him back to his first

big business, especially an administrator. Despite a versatile career that has classified him as lawyer, engineer, soldier, author, congressman, vice president, "Charlie" Dawes is

essentially a banker, a business man, an administrator. He has proved it by jumping back behind his desk in private business whenever demands of public life have allowed him to do so. This blunt-spoken mid-Westerner was figuring in millions and billions before most of his schoolmates were making \$40 a week. It was this same Ohio-born Dawes who wrote an analysis of the nation's banking system before he was 30. At that time he was a lawyer in Lipton, Nebraska, specializing in receivership cases.

Two years later he was controller of the currency under President McKinley. And who was it who nearly 40 years later outlined to the allied nations of Europe a method of rehabilitating the continent's war-torn economic structure? That was the Dawes of 1924 who conceived the reparations plan better known as the "Dawes Plan."

But his last great work involving gigantic sums of money long before that. As the first director of the United States Budget under President Harding, he created a reverberating stir by his recommendations to slash government expenses.

"We realize," he said then, "that the business of the country is now prospective, that the working man are out of employment, that we are flooded with the inexorable necessity of reducing expenditures, and we propose—just as we did four years ago—to win the war—to try to do it, and that's all we can do."

Everybody remembers how he served in France as general purchasing agent for the American expeditionary forces and supervised expenditures of billions. Yet that was just another job to the lawyer who turned banker the very day of the only political defeat of his career—when he was defeated as candidate for the United States senate in 1910.

The moment he may he couldn't be elected, Dawes told his closest friends, "I take all right. Tomorrow I'm going to Chicago and start a bank capitalized at \$4,000,000." This "association" was "Understreet." Within a few days Dawes had founded the Central Trust company, Illinois, and had become its president. Since 1921 he has been serving as honorary chairman of the board.

As chairman of the finance committee of Chicago's world fair of 1933—a \$100,000,000 proposition—Dawes has many months ahead of him a hurried trip to London to help raise money for the project.

Within four days he had guaranteed of \$12,000,000 from Chicago business men for the payment of the fair's bonds.

LIBRARIAN ASKS FOR RETURN OF VOLUMES

Appeal was made yesterday by Miss Jessie Fraser, librarian of the Twin Falls public library to all persons who move into a new place of residence to return any library books left by previous occupants to the library.

Miss Fraser pointed to the large number of books in the Twin Falls library as indicating that more books are likely to be in constant demand. She said:

"Many books over a period of years, are lost to the users of the public library, by people who move away, and carelessly leave the books in the houses from which they move. The books have the public library stamp, and there can be no doubt as to where they belong. Many times such books are returned by the next

occupant of the house. At other times the new occupant hesitates to return the books, for fear the overdue penalty will be imposed upon him. This is an erroneous idea, for the library appreciates greatly the return of any such books, and no fine will be charged to anyone except the original borrower.

"The library at present has a very large turnover, many patrons with an insufficient number of books. Many small libraries with a much larger number of books do not have such a large circulation. The Twin Falls public library, with less than 14,000 volumes, including bound magazines and reference books, had a circulation during December, 1931, of 17,241 volumes. This means that the library needs every volume which belongs here.

"An effort is being made to have every volume returned to the library which by any chance has been left by a careless user. Such books are the property of the public library, and should be returned there, in order that the public generally may have full use of them."

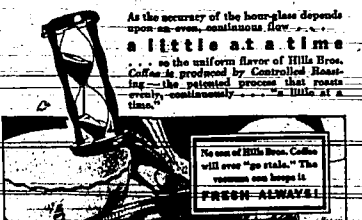

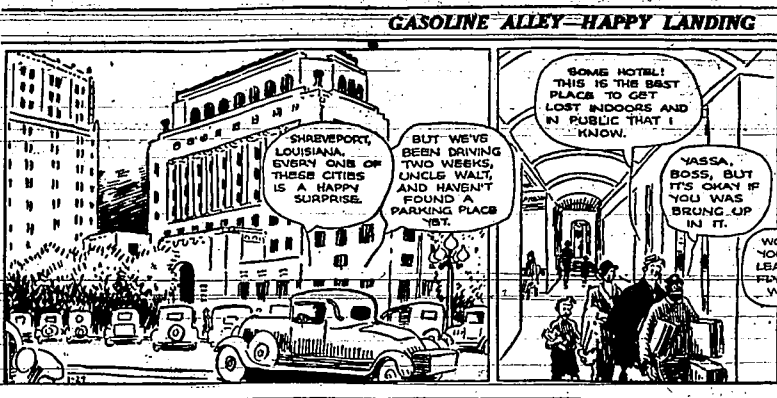

LAND DEAL LEADS TO FELONY CHARGE

Thomas Cavender, Accused of Selling Property Twice, Held to Answer

Thomas Cavender, Twin Falls, defendant in what is believed to be the first criminal prosecution in Idaho for selling real estate twice, was held to answer to that charge in the district court, following a preliminary hearing before Judge C. G. Kinney in probate court here yesterday.

Cavender is accused of selling a lot in South Park addition to Lamoine Stevens on July 6, 1931, after contracting to sell the same property to J. A. Boyd on March 2, 1931. It was Cavender's contention that Boyd had abandoned the property and the deal before the district court was made.

Evidence indicated that Boyd contracted to pay \$10 a month for the lot, and had built a dwelling house on it, before he went to Piler last summer to get work. Stevens was said to have paid \$400 cash for the place.

The question to be determined was whether the first contract had been canceled before the second sale was made, is one of fact to be determined by a jury. Judge Kinney said in ruling against motion for dismissal of the charge against Cavender, and ordering the deal held to answer in the district court.

The alleged offense constitutes a felony under Idaho law. Cavender was held under continuing \$1000 bond.
