The day's proceedings brought to a head a long-continuing disagreement between the county agent and the weeds department regarding the blackboard demonstrations and debate a considerable proportion of the budget.

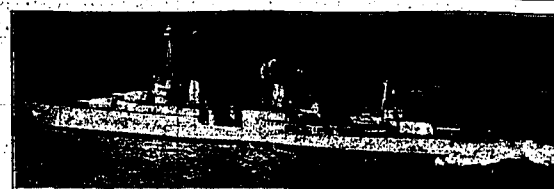

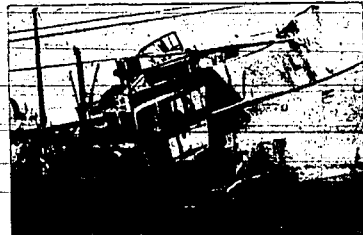

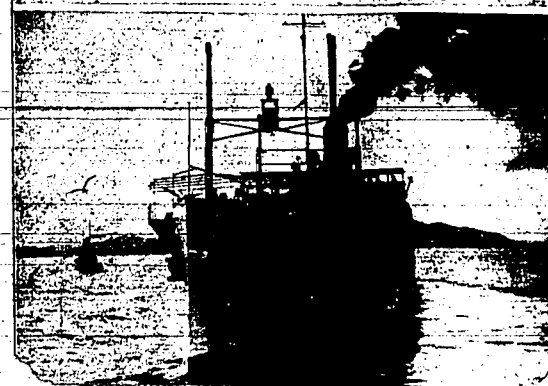
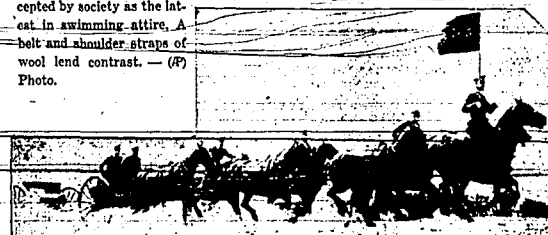
