DUCE PAYS PONTIFF HUMBLE HOMAGE AND RECEIVES HIGH HONOR FROM POPE

VATICAN CITY, Feb. 11.—Benito Mussolini knelt and kissed the ring of Pope Pius XI in reverence for the Catholic church today.

At the end of an hour's private conference the two leaders emerged from the throne room of the Vatican and shook hands in friendship.

More honor was shown Mussolini than was provided in the Vatican protocol for premiers. The pope, who is 70 years old, greeted and more and higher dignitaries were present.

The pope in return made his visit an imposing affair, lining the streets with troops from the Palazzo Venezia.

Pinchot Deplores Drift From Ideals Of "Rail Splitter"

SRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 11 (AP)—If Abraham Lincoln were a candidate for president this year on the platform of human rights, said Governor Clifford Pinchot, Pennsylvania, tonight he would "go to first base with the controlling powers of the Republican-convention in Chicago."

Addressing the mid-day club's observance of the one hundred twenty-third anniversary of the Civil War president's birth, the Pennsylvania governor frequently mentioned in the news as a presidential aspirant, said:

"How many of our national leaders can declare with Lincoln: 'I have never had a feeling of pity or of a feeling of normality for the sentimentality embodied in the Declaration of Independence, and then called on Hoover?'"

"Tomorrow's celebration of Lincoln's birth was characterized by Governor Pinchot as an 'empty ritual, a useless gesture, if we lose sight of all the wrongs that are fought for and gave his life to.'"

"Tonight's observance in the mammoth hall touched off the annual memorial in this city that knew Lincoln best. Two miles across the city from the Lincoln Memorial to state capitol, lay the Rail Splitter's remodeled tomb, rededicated last summer by President Hoover."

MASSED ARMIES OF CHINA BATTLE JAPANESE FORCES IN BITTEREST ENGAGEMENT

Hostilities Halt For Four Hours in Chapel Area, However, to Permit Refugees to 3000 Refugees

SHANGHAI, (Friday) Feb. 12.—Battle broke out again today at Woosung between the massed armies of China and Japanese forces for Manchuria.

In Shanghai's battle-torn Chapel area, hostilities were halted while foreign relief workers rescued refugees estimated at 3,000 marooned victims.

The Japanese high command was determined to reduce the stubborn Chinese force at Woosung with 500-pound aerial bombs, but none was used in the first attack of the morning.

Manufacturer Prepares to Blast Dam Barrier to Industry For Two Years

DETROIT, Feb. 11 (AP)—Declaring that "some one has to risk something to get things started," Henry Ford today disclosed his latest plan for breaking loose the jam that for nearly two years has retarded this auto giant's expansion.

He announced that within the next few weeks the Ford company will bring out an improved four and a new eight cylinder motor.

At the same time Mr. Ford expressed the hope that the "raw material supply man" would not begin to "blame" the Ford company's effort of manufacturers to "start the wheels of industry."

In times like these, he said, "everyone has to take some risks, make some sacrifices and even be willing for a time to do business without profit in order to start the wheels of industry and business again."

In automotive circles, Ford's remark that he was determined to "start the wheels of industry" was interpreted as indicating his intention to initiate a new program of competition in the long-defunct field.

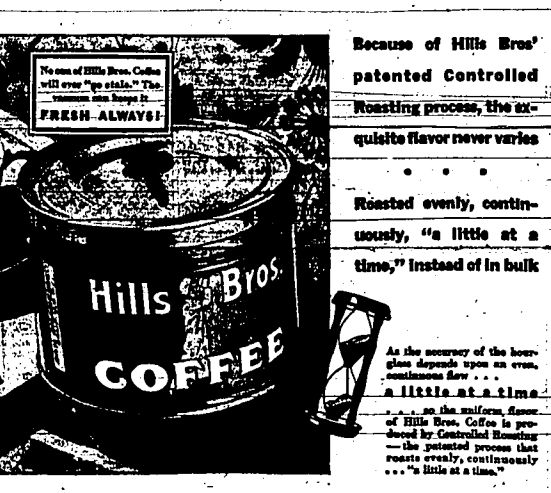

# COMMISSIONERS OF CASSIA COUNTY CUT BUDGET OF EXPENSE

### Board Authorizes Reductions and Eliminations in Nearly All Offices in Next Year's Program

(Special to The News)  
BURLEY, Feb. 11 (Special to The News)—The board of Cassia county commissioners in adopting the budget for the coming year.

A committee was appointed to investigate applications for old-age pensions, made up of four Burley business and professional men. It is making its investigations in order to make their recommendations to the commissioners. The committee is headed by R. C. Fish, Roy C. Davidson, T. L. Lowe and J. T. Brandt.

At the hearing for considering the tentative budget, committee members from the Burley Chamber of Commerce and from the communities of Elba and Albion. These committees recommended the reduction of the county fund for the present year. The tentative budget previously set at one-half million, to \$300,000, which amount is to be used mainly to liquidate a deficit in the fire exhibit fund. The commission has now appointed a fair board for the coming year.

Abolish Two Offices  
The fireproof inspector and the county nurse were abolished. The county agent's budget was placed at \$2500, last year's expense of this office was \$3750. There was \$5000 set aside for notices under existing law, as against \$9194 expended last year. Printing and binding was cut from \$1000 to \$750. The county clerk's salary was cut from \$1200 to \$900. The district court expense last year was \$750. It was cut to \$500.

County offices were considerably reduced in the present budget from \$4,600,000 to \$3,450,000. The sheriff's office was cut to \$694; last year this office expensed \$854. Funds for publication of notices were provided at \$1000, as against \$1000 last year. Insurance and bond premiums will have \$2000 appropriated this year; last year it was \$2750.

Cut Gas Costs  
From seven bids submitted for gasoline and oil, the bid of Spencer & Co. was accepted. This bid offered gasoline for county use at 15 cents a gallon above tank wagon prices. Paraffin kerosene oil will be supplied at 7 cents a gallon and paraffin at \$1.10 a gallon.

It was stated that Cassia county has the highest per capita of automobiles in Idaho. The county has no bonded indebtedness, and the condition of the outstanding warrants is very satisfactory.

### TAX-CUT APPEALS MARK CLOSE OF BUDGET HEARING

#### Buhl Citizens Urge Need For Reductions Upon County Commissioners Ending Four-Day Sessions

Closing hours yesterday of the public hearing on Twin Falls county's tentative budget, which opened in the district court rooms here last Monday, brought a delegation of Buhl citizens without specific recommendations to urge upon the county commissioners the need for tax reductions.

The commissioners will today take final action on the budget which will be the county's appropriation bill, and the basis for the county's 1932 taxes to be levied next fall. The tentative budget, as published, provides for expenditures totaling \$17,104.29, distributed as follows: Current expense fund, \$127,000; county hospital and poor fund, \$113,038; warrant redemption, \$22,368.29; agricultural fair, \$10,800; general school fund, \$15,000; treasury note redemption fund, \$20,000.

The commissioners yesterday had under consideration a \$71,800 tentative appropriation for their own department, which is a part of the current expense fund appropriation. The commissioners' tentative budget provides for \$7000 salaries and wages, including salaries of the three commissioners at \$1500 each; county physician, \$1500, and court bailiff, \$500.

The commissioners budget carries also an item of \$14,000 for indigent expenses, on which account there was expended last year approximately \$25,000. It includes also \$12,500 for payment of widows' pensions, \$1000 for the county hospital, and \$131,000 for the county auditor.

A fierce blizzard which swept over the Twin Falls sections yesterday afternoon, following a morning that promised clearing weather, filled the streets with snow and blocked the highways, making work that had been almost completed in clearing the roads of the snow.

The north and south road this side of Murtaugh, stopped many cars going each way and irregularly from the west crowded into the hotels of Twin Falls last night. The road to Shoshone, and Gooding was kept open.

The east-bound afternoon stage, which left about 2 o'clock, was delayed nearly three hours by the condition of the highway near Murtaugh. The westbound stage due to arrive here at 6:15 P. M. was an hour and a half late. The driver said this was caused almost entirely by the fact that about 30 cars had been marooned in the highway near Murtaugh. The cars were gotten out eventually, he said, and the stage came through.

Another day of hard work, following clearing of roads under control of the Twin Falls highway district, loomed last night before J. D. Ginnema and his crew of workers.

We started in at 9 o'clock Wednesday evening and it was a "quit blowing," he said, "and by the time the snow started yesterday had covered up all of the 125 miles of gravelled roads that had been blocked. There are 340 miles of roads in the district but only about one half of them are ready for travel. To clear them involved travelling 200 miles. I suppose they are all blocked again and that it will take another 24 hours to clear them after this storm ceases."
