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SNOW-FIGHT GAINS ON ROAD BLOCKADE

Twin Falls District and City Forces Go Into Action On Heels of Big Blizzard

Highway snow fighters in southern Idaho labored throughout Thursday night and yesterday morning so effect that state highways were expected to be clear again, and motor stages along this route were expected to resume their regular schedules, following Thursday's blizzard.

Twin Falls highway district began operations at 8 o'clock yesterday morning with a five-ton truck moving some 225 miles to clear the drifts from 2 1/2 miles of gravel road. The work continued last night, and was expected to be completed today. In many places, J. D. Binnis, district director of highways, said, was expected to be completed today.

Immediately on breaking through the snow on these roads, the big trucks will start back over the line widening the open roadway, but for the fact that the roadway through the drifts had been widened Wednesday night, Binnis said, the district snow fighters' task yesterday would have been considerably more difficult.

Twin Falls municipal street department employees worked all Wednesday night with grader and small plows, plowing the snow back from the curbs, on three to four miles of streets, and plowing the snow from 15 to 20 miles of sidewalk. It was the first time the sidewalk plows had been called into play this season. The all-night campaign flooded the city in good stead yesterday when driving began on a big scale under the influence of sunshine and thawing temperatures, and snow water ran freely along the curbs.

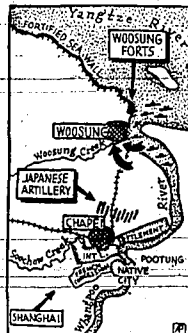

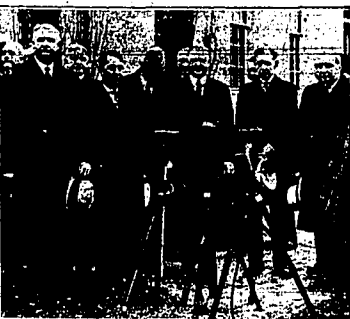
