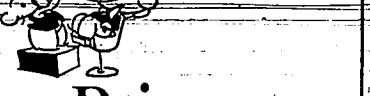

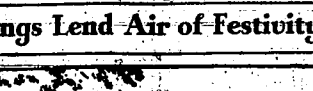

A New Yorker at Large

G. D. SEYMOUR (Associated Press Staff Writer) NEW YORK, Feb. 13 - Travelers, who know their Shanghai and London as well as they know their New York, will tell you that this is the most beautiful metropolis in the world in that it finds you about...

It is very simple, because it is numbered and run up and down town. Streets are numbered and run north-south. That is, generally, there are no streets.

For instance, there is one avenue that changes its name nearly a dozen times as it runs its course. At the lower tip of Manhattan it begins as Greenwich street, later changes to Ninth street, then Columbus avenue, then Morningside place, then Convent avenue, then Joseph street, then Broadway, then Plaza, then Laurel Hill Terrace.

Here it skirts across High Bridge Park, crosses the Harlem river, becomes Ninth street again, and then "disappears" into Broadway which runs all the way to Albany.

Other streets change their names as they slide uptown. Twelfth avenue, at Sixth street, becomes Seventh street; Eleventh avenue, at Sixth street, decides to call itself West End street, and a little later it becomes Broadway, later merging with St. Nicholas.

Twelfth avenue becomes Anderson street, you know, then it becomes Gertrude Kiedis lives. Eighth avenue changes to Lenox Park west of 100th street, and then it becomes Lenox Park when it reaches "142nd."

Manhattan Island is 252 blocks long. I picked up all this data while riding from Sheepshead bay on the subway. I have seen every subway car of New York on every subway car.

Primo street is really First street, but there are many named streets below 100th street. One of the street uptown is Two Hundred Twelfth street.

The theory is supposed to be the roughest, loughest street in New York, and Park avenue—the moon of the city. Yet Park avenue and Park are the same street. As it travels uptown, the Bowery changes its name to 10th street, and then just before it reaches Grand Central it becomes Park.

All names are supposed to be parallel to one another. Yet Twelfth avenue runs due north and south, while Thirteenth avenue runs north-south, by Twelfth street.

Fascinating Street To me, the most fascinating street in New York is Park avenue. It was rebuilt a year or so ago. Minerva Lane. It is crooked, like a bent arm, and runs for miles. At one end was a church, at the other a wine shop. In between were Italian gardens, tenements and a Punch Bowl.

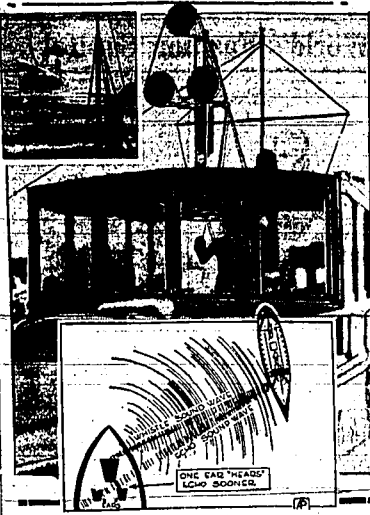
# "Echo Ear" Provides Safety For Ocean Travel On Foggy Days

## DEVICE REVEALS SEA DANGERS IN MISTY WEATHER

Instrument Shows Location of Vessels, Shorelines or Tiny Floating Objects

SOUND OF WHISTLES REBOUNDS OFF SHIPS

"Sonic Locator" Hears Way Around Obstructions Even On Windy Course



A new device that sounds out a path for fog-bound ships utilizes a high-pitched whistle that sends out short sound waves. The three megaphones "hear" the echo on the rebound, the specialized mechanical "ears" thus giving the basis for calculations by which the pilot can follow a safe course, missing ships and other obstructions.

Feb. 13 (Special to The News)—A new device for "human ears" offers new means of safety for sea travel in fog.

They have been used secretly for several months on a Long Island sound motorboat by Chester W. Rice, General Electric engineer, as successful substitute for sight in fog.

The device reveals the location of invisible steamers nearly half a mile distant, of shore lines and even of floating objects as small as rowing boats. The whistles are aimed at a distance of about an eighth of a mile.

Alphasounds and Whistles Used

Three megaphones and an automatic whistle constitute the main portion of the new device. One megaphone directs the whistle blast in the direction the pilot wishes to "see." The other two receive the echoes. The whistles are really specialized mechanical "ears" which can be turned to hear of any sound the rebounding sound directly from its source.

A dial shows the distance that the echo travels. The distance of the other boat or marine obstruction. The distance figure is based on the fact that the speed of sound is virtually constant, at nearly 1100 feet a second in air.

Expansion of Depth Finders

The apparatus is called the "sonic locator." It is an extension to air of the principles of the sonic depth finders, by which the depth of the sea bottom is determined by the time it takes the sound waves to get into the water and back to the surface.

The fog echoes come principally from "scattered" sound energy, which might be described as the "punch" in the waves as they spread fan-wise over the water's surface.

The distance is much greater "punch" of this sort in a single sound wave from a high than from a low tone, 10,000 times as much. This means multiple means little to human ears but is the crux of the success of the new device.

Whistles in High Pitched

The whistle is high pitched, 2000 to 3000 vibrations a second. These are "short" waves. They have several advantages in addition to the extra energy.

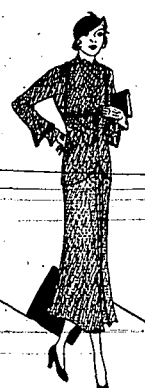
### Cotton Resembling Wool and Silk Appearing Like Fur in Gay Colors Appear For Springtime Frocks

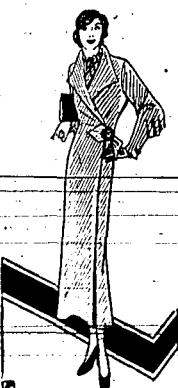

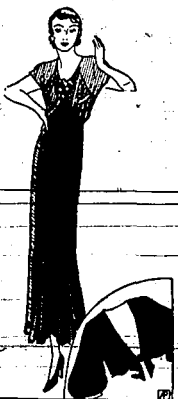

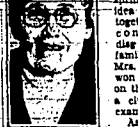

# SUIT PUTS SPLIT OF \$1000 REWARD IN COURT'S HANDS

## Dozen Present and Former Officers Ask Judicial Determination in Distribution of Bounty Money

A \$1000 reward which St. Louis Metropolitan police department offered in July, 1929, for arrest and conviction of Earl Reed, wanted for the murder of a St. Louis police officer, is the prize which W. A. Seaf, Twin Falls police officer, and 11 persons including present and former Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Blaine and Twin Falls county officers have applied to the district court here to determine among themselves.

Through the combined efforts of these 12 persons, according to the court records, Reed was captured at Minidoka in June, 1930, a few days after his name had been placed on the wanted list of the Wendell bank. They also assert that in December, 1930, they brought about Reed's return to the prison where he was convicted of the murder and sentenced to life imprisonment.

### Chase Proceeds Capture

Reed, who was known also as Ross and Elmona took refuge in the hills of the Wood river region above Valley following the capture of the wanted man. He was pursued by officers of five counties, including present and former Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Blaine and Twin Falls county officers, who were present and recognized by him shortly before they boarded an east-bound train. Albert reported to Minidoka officials officers who look the fugitives off the train at Minidoka. They pleaded guilty to bank robbery and were sentenced the same day. Reed was released from the Idaho penitentiary to be returned to Missouri after he was identified by means of fingerprints as the wanted St. Louis murderer.
