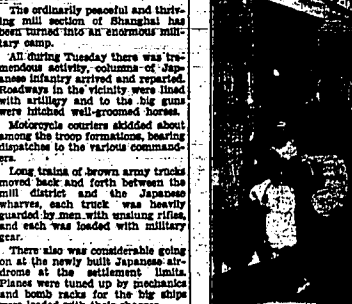

"Lastly, the punishment for illegal use of hands has been so severe involving disqualification of the player and a penalty of half the distance of the ball to the line that I feel instructed to advise his players to take any chances."

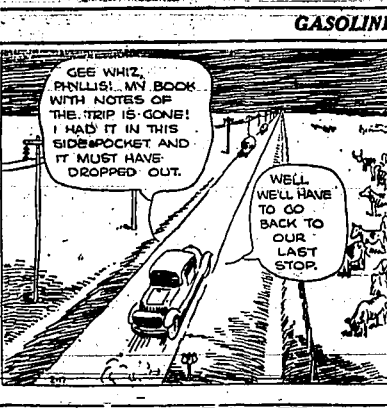

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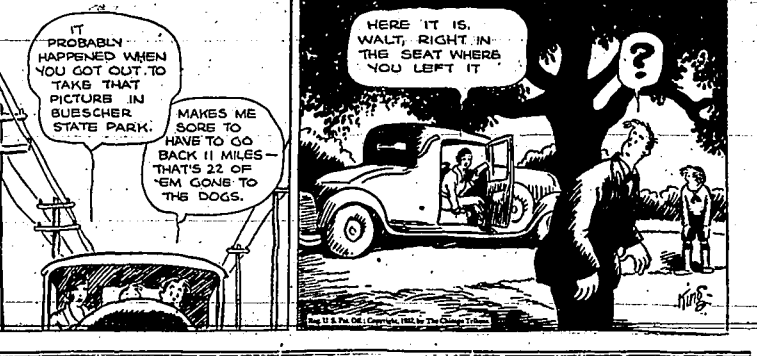
