Backers of Texan Extend Campaign into Georgia in Opposition to Cause of New York Governor

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (By The Associated Press)—The Democratic presidential race gathered force today as the boom for Speaker Garner was carried in to Governor Roosevelt's adopted state of Georgia in opposition to the New York executive.

At the same time Governor Murray, Oklahoma, was ruled out of the March 23 Georgia primary. His signed statement of candidacy failed to arrive in time, but the Georgia Oklahoma immediately announced he would campaign the state for a "wet" vote.

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ADOLF HITLER SEEKS GERMAN PRESIDENCY

BERLIN, Feb. 22 (AP)—Adolf Hitler, leader of Germany's fascist Nazis, will be the presidential candidate of his National Socialist party in the coming election, a party meeting was told tonight by his lieutenant, Joseph Goebbels.

His aide's announcement, made to a gathering of the party's leaders in the Sports Palace, set the political party agenda for the campaign in clear cut array.

President Paul von Hindenburg, as a result, is faced with three opposition candidates in his campaign for re-election, but the failure of the fascists to prove an elected candidate may prove their undoing.

The certain runner in the race against the veteran of the war who is the incumbent is Hitler, Ernst Thaelmann, Communist nominee, and Theodor Duesterberg, the Nationalist candidate who is vice president of the "steel helmet" organization of war veterans.

CHINA'S GUNS AND BAYONETS STOP NIPPON IN TRACKS IN KIANGWAN-CHAPEI DRIVE

Tokyo's Representatives Announce Intention to Report Use of Dum-Dum Bullets by Chinese Army

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (By The Associated Press)—Word that China is preparing to fight the Japanese for at least a year today confirmed an impression in official circles that the nations interested in making peace must wait patiently.

At the Japanese embassy it was said today that Tokyo will bring to the attention of the League of Nations the alleged use of dum-dum, or soft-nosed, bullets by the Chinese forces.

Since the Hague peace conference of 1864, regarding the influence of Czar Nicholas II of Russia, prohibiting the use of dum-dum bullets in war, has always been the cause of heated controversy.

General John J. Pershing on the historic camp grounds of General George Washington and his continental army today paid tribute to the first president as the "ideal American citizen."

Glenn Blythstone, 21, Dies Instantly After 25-Foot Fall From Top of Tree

WENDELL, Feb. 22 (Special to The News)—Glenn Blythstone, 21, student, met untimely death at 11 A. M. today when he fell 25 feet from a tree to hard ground, plunging head downward.

The accident occurred while Mr. Blythstone was topping a tree on property adjoining the home of his mother, Mrs. Bernice Blythstone. The top branches of the tree were being removed unexpectedly, knocking him off the limb he was standing on.

His neck was broken. His skull crushed, and his face crushed almost beyond recognition in the fall.

The accident was witnessed by B. M. Prier, grandfather of the youth, who was assisting in the tree-topping work.

Mr. Blythstone had been a resident of Wendell for more than six years and had attended Wendell high school. He was well-known in the community.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Edith Minard Blythstone; his mother, Mrs. Bernice Blythstone; Wendell; one sister but in civil service as a broad-minded, many-sided person, Colorado; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. B. M. Prier, Wendell.

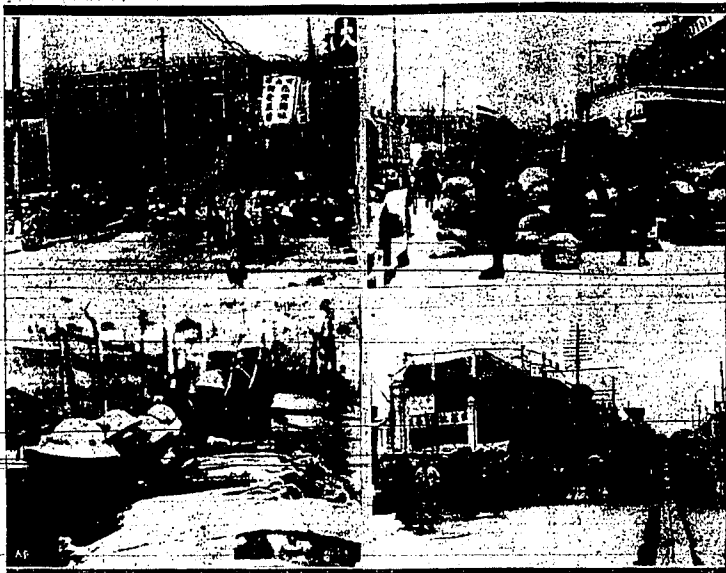

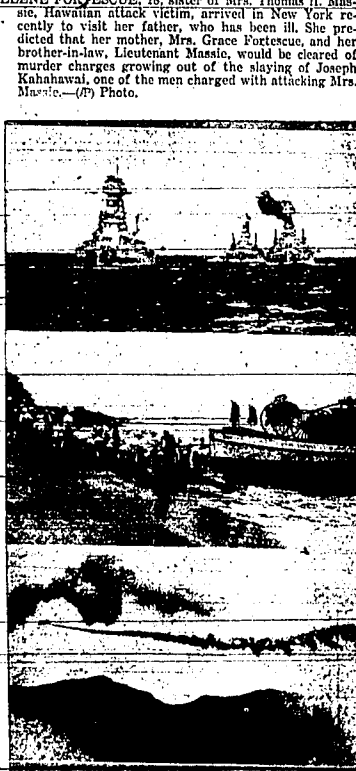
