Administration Acts To Make Way Easier For Insolvent Banks

JOHANNA GADSKI DIES OF INJURIES IN BERLIN

BERLIN, Feb. 23 (AP)—Madame Johanna Gadski, noted opera singer, whose career was marred in the fever of patriotism during the World War, died today of automobile accident injuries. She was 59 years old.

Washington, Feb. 23 (AP)—The administration today supplemented its efforts to help the nation's insolvent banks by announcing a new move to make the way easier for banks that have succumbed to the pressure of the economic slump.

John W. Fole, comptroller of the currency, today announced the establishment of a central agency in New York City for marketing bonds held by closed banks with a view to obtaining the best return possible and avoid an indiscriminate dumping of securities with consequent loss of value.

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BEETS GIVE BURLEY CLUB BOY PROFITS

Melvin Beek, Cassia County Scholarship Winner, Keeps Project Record Carefully

BURLEY, Feb. 23 (Special to The News)—How a satisfactory sugar beet yield was obtained in a year in which the while fly was particularly prevalent, is shown in the schedule of records kept by Melvin Beek.

Planting was done early, on April 15, drilling in 15 pounds of seed to the acre. The soil was worked to the depth of 10 inches.

Three weeks after planting the beets began to come up. On May 18 they were furrowed and on the twenty-first they received their first irrigation.

Cultivated six times. Cultivation was done six times. Weeding took place approximately eight days apart during July and August.

The beets were grown on a plot on which beets had been harvested the previous year, and during which year a heavy application of barnyard manure had been used.

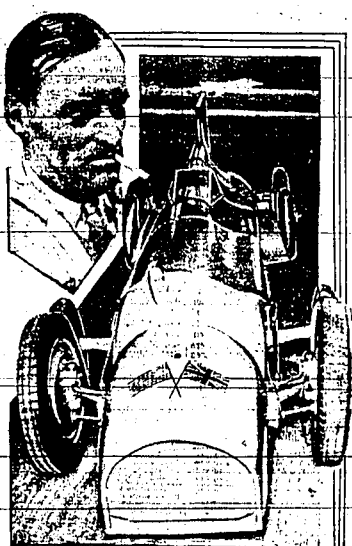

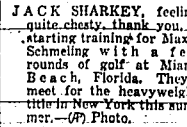
