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VINCENT ADDRESSES CROWD AT GOODING

Commissioner of Education Discusses Economy in Education Administration

GOODING, Feb. 25 (Special to The News)—Dr. W. D. Vincent, Idaho state commissioner of education, addressed an audience of 100 citizens of Gooding and surrounding communities Wednesday evening at the local high school, reporting on economy of educational methods to conform with the present period of "depression."

Dr. Vincent brought out that the schools of Idaho rank well in attendance in quality; that the high school attendance in Idaho has increased 80 per cent in 10 years, while the population has grown only 5 per cent. He pointed out that high school administration costs approximately twice as much as in the grade schools. He said that about 200 schools of the state may be closed for lack of funds. Consolidation of school districts is an efficient means of reducing the per capita cost of taxation, he stated. Other measures being taken include increase in the teachers' duties by reduction of the number of teachers; increasing the numbers in the classes; use of 10-month school term; and accomplishing eight years' work in seven years, which attendance on six instead of five days of the week; sending students to school for "two shifts," thereby using the building 16 hours a day.

He advocated, in consideration of additional loads teachers are carrying, that salaries not be cut. He stated that several school boards have cut salaries, expressed regret, and are now "needed repairs." From their budgets, as well as expenses for purchasing of books, burning services and transportation for students. He advocated exercising caution in "cutting" certain classes from schools, such as music, athletics, domestic science, manual training and bookkeeping.

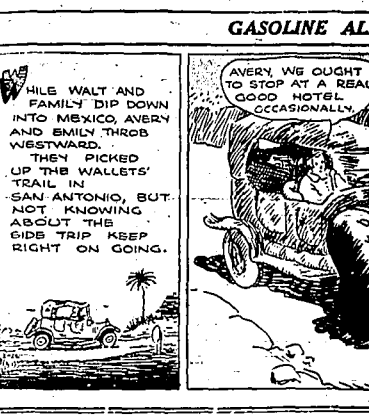

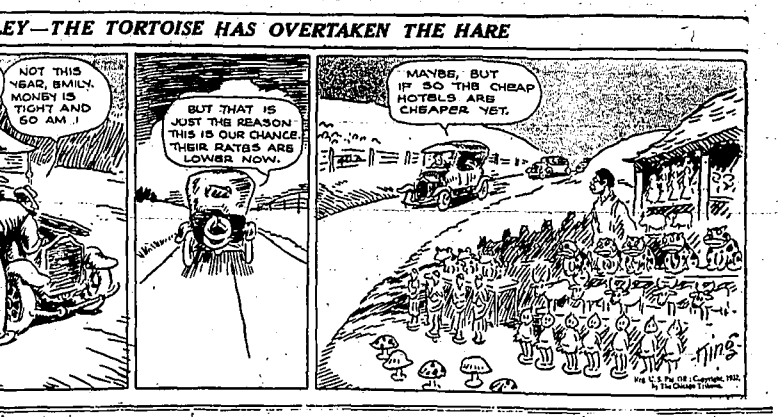

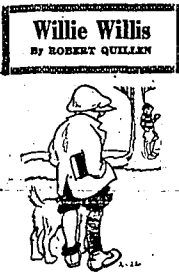
