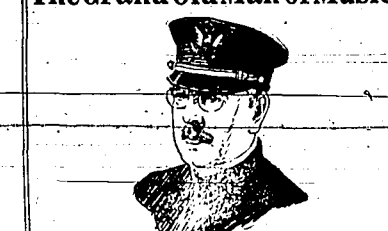

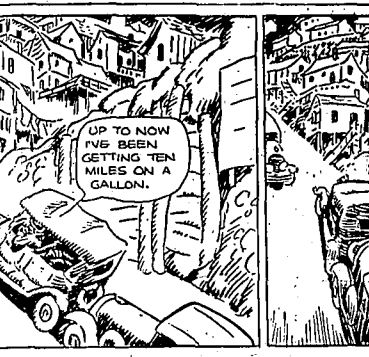

by GRACE PERKINS (Continued from last page)

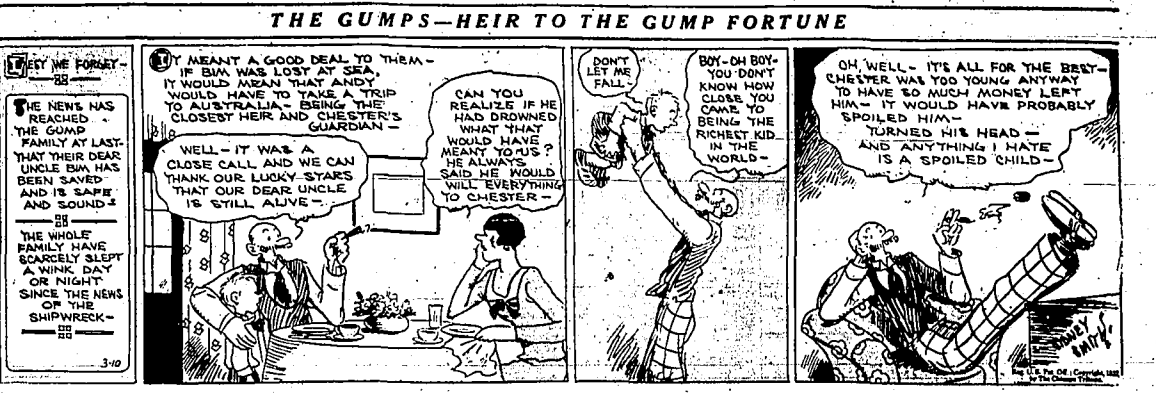

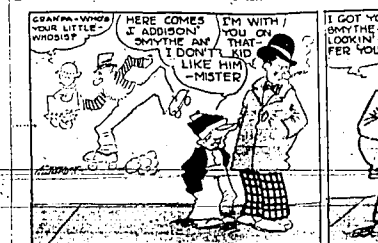

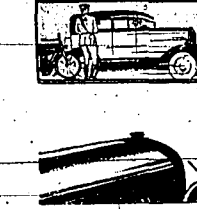

### GOVERNOR LOOKS FOR IMPROVEMENT

#### State Executive Comments On Financial Situation; Sees Idaho Improvement

Governor C. Bon Ross, here last night to attend an annual banquet of the Southern Idaho Fruit and Game association, in an interview that he looks for "some improvement in the financial condition in Idaho when crops begin to move."

"This is largely a farming state and we must look for improvement through the production of new wealth," he said. "Prices of carry-over crops will probably not improve, though stabilization will help some. Stockmen will probably receive benefit from this course, and farmers will be benefited in smaller degree. Everybody knows what my position has always been on labor." He continued. "I regard it as a mistake that the production of a wage for labor is a sacrifice for their country in a war brought on by ruling classes. Every condition that makes a reduction in salaries necessary."

"If conditions do not improve farmers and laborers will have to take another reduction. We are suffering from payment of debt and money. We are paying interest today on \$150,000,000,000 in this country. We need a savior to drive money out of circulation. There is not now money enough in existence to pay the interest."

"Politically this looks like a Democratic year," he said, but refused to make detailed statement of his views on Idaho conditions.

Captain W. H. Absendahl, Boise, accompanied Governor Ross here. They returned to Boise last night. The governor will attend a father-and-son banquet at Filer tomorrow night.

#### Twin Falls Unit of Relief Organization Adopts Membership Drive Program

They are: disabled service men and their families; 9-D disaster and emergency relief; where Red Cross activities were not duplicated by those of local organizations; 3. Production by volunteer service of garments for use in veterans' hospitals and similar institutions; 4. Roll call, Twin Falls chapter's membership, she said, is 29 per cent of the population of this district.

### BEE KEEPERS CALL FOR TEST OF LAWS

#### Honey Producers' Association Wants to Make Sure of Position On License Fees

Idaho State Honey Producers' association, representing 100 to 200 carloads of honey normal annual production, called on P. Lee Johnson, state commissioner of agriculture, in resolutions adopted at a meeting here yesterday, to "interview the attorney general with a view to making a test case of the bee laws, bring to light any defects in the laws as a whole, and make sure of our position in the enforcement of the payment of license fees and the conviction of violators."

Another resolution expressed the association's regret over the recent death of C. M. Stinson, Twin Falls, its first secretary.

The association's next meeting will be held at Boise during the meeting of the state horticultural association next January. A picnic season is to be held at Twin Falls county fair grounds at Filer in July, the date to be determined by Harry Newberry, Filer, president of the association.

Speakers at the meeting here yesterday included W. H. Wick, Idaho department of agriculture inspector, and M. L. Dean, Filer, former director of the state bureau of plant industry.

A discussion of fruit tree spray in relation to beekeeping indicated a conclusion that the danger is less than slight under ordinary conditions. Warm, dry weather last year caused a great reduction in the state's normal honey crop, the beekeepers agreed.

Miss H. H. Keck, Paul, answered the question, "Does it pay to advertise honey?" Every honey producer, she said, should devote time and effort to advertising his own product, and should join other producers.

### GAS PROVES FATAL TO EX-MAGISTRATE

#### B. C. Morgan Succumbs in Garage at Home, Leaving Notes to Father and Wife

Bertram C. Morgan, 50, resigned here for eight years, and who recently resigned as justice of the peace in Twin Falls, was found dead in his car in the garage at the home of his father, J. A. Morgan, 250 Fourth avenue east, shortly after 10 A. M. yesterday.

Authorities, following an investigation, pronounced death due to carbon monoxide poisoning. Dr. F. A. Dwight, Filer, coroner, said no inquest would be held.

Letters found in Mr. Morgan's pocket, one addressed to his father and the other to his wife, indicated his purpose was to take his own life because of dependency over his supposed inability to make a living.

His father discovered the body, it was upright in the rear seat of the car. The gasoline tank on the car, which contained between three and four gallons the night before, was empty, and the ignition switch was on.

Arrangements for funeral services were held in abeyance last evening, awaiting replies to inquiries dispatched to relatives elsewhere.

The body rested at the Twin Falls mortuary.

Besides his parents, Mr. Morgan is survived by his wife, Mrs. Eliza Morgan, whom he married in Oswego, Kansas, and their eight-year-old daughter, Phyllis Morgan. He leaves also one brother, V. E. Morgan, Twin Falls, and three sisters, Mrs. E. E. Crabtree and Mrs. R. K. Alexander, both of Twin Falls, and Mrs. Leola Newkirk, Louisiana.

Mr. Morgan was born at Lancaster, Ohio, May 13, 1881, and was only a year old when the family moved to Crawford county, Kansas, where he grew to manhood, and resided until coming to Idaho about eight years ago. He was employed for many years as a salesman.

He was a member of the Junior Order of American Mechanics in Twin Falls and was serving as vice counselor of that organization.
