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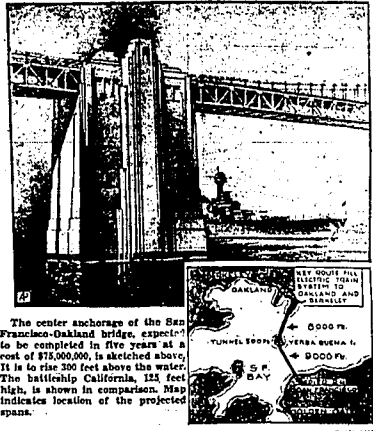
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# San Francisco Bay Bridge Involves Engineering Puzzles

## \$75,000,000 SPAN NEEDS FIVE YEARS FOR CONSTRUCTION

Wide Expanse of Deep Water Adds to Problems of Building Huge Structure  
DESIGN CALLS FOR TUNNEL ON ISLAND  
Deep Mud and Faulty Rock Prove Hazards For Erection of Piers

SAN FRANCISCO, March 10—Engineers preparing to start actual construction of the \$75,000,000 San Francisco-Oakland highway span face problems new to bridge building.

Even as they intensified their efforts on February 24—the date work began on the undertaking expected to require five years for completion—some of their problems remained unsolved.

Design Subject to Change  
Even the design of the bridge is subject to possibly radical changes, although specifications had reached such a stage as to permit maintenance of continuous building operations after the start.

Next Tunnel Island  
But besides traversing the structure across two navigable channels, one 800 feet and the other, 8000 feet wide, the builders have to tunnel through an island, piercing rock that is badly faulted and broken.

On the Oakland side of the island the 8000 feet of water covers mud nearly 100 feet deep, requiring the sinking of a pier approximately 314 feet high from the crest of the bridge to bedrock.

A problem taxing engineering ingenuity likely will be involved in the sinking of the Oakland side pier to an unprecedented depth, as will also the determination of the exact location for a vast stone lock-off joint capable of sustaining the tremendous weight involved.

Architectural Pier Planned  
One feature of the bridge design tentatively decided upon is the construction of a pier planned to be completed in five years at a cost of \$75,000,000.

Modern design, virtually would split the western channel section into two separate suspension bridges, although the colossal structure would appear a single suspension.

Three Bridges in One  
Thus the 9000 foot bridge connecting Oakland, Alameda, Berkeley and other East Bay communities with the San Francisco peninsula would be technically three bridges—two over the main channel and one from Yerba Buena or Goat Island to the Alameda county shore.

This anchorage pier would be 120 feet square, and would rise 300 feet above the water. It would hold the floor of the bridge high enough above the maximum water level so that the battlement California with its 125-foot crown's nest would have a clearance of more than 100 feet.

The projected tunnel through the island would be the largest bore in diameter yet driven. It would have an extreme inside width of nearly 70 feet and a height of 50 feet.

Both tunnel and bridge are to be two deck structures accommodating six lanes of fast motor traffic on the upper deck and two electric train lines and three lanes for truck traffic on the lower floor.

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Capone Becomes "Just One More Prisoner" in Leavenworth Cell

Gang Overlord Faces Regular Routine of Penitentiary During 11-Year Sentence

By CHARLES A. GRUMMICH (Associated Press Staff Writer) LEAVENWORTH, Kas., March 10.—Al Capone will be "just one more man for the jail," said the stern square-shouldered warden of the Leavenworth federal penitentiary. There may have been uncertainty as to the next step by counsel for the Chicago gang overlord, but the United States circuit court of appeals denied his appeal from an 11-year sentence for income tax evasion.

But at the prison there was no uncertainty as to the routine that would follow his arrival here, checking in and "delousing" with the rest of the convicts. Then the penitentiary Capone would know his "boss" warden, Fred Zerbit, head of the main prison who rose from post to warden, or Warden Eber, head of the federal penitentiary executive and fingerprint expert who gives orders in the penitentiary annex adjoining Leavenworth.

Identification of the new prisoner upon arrival at Leavenworth is a responsibility assigned to a United States marshal, with roll-call and numbering of convicts for the time. Then each prisoner receives an old prison suit—they usually ill-fitting, his "revvie" either being stored or sent to any other designated ward.

Few variations from Garb The sulphur "delousing" bath and several physical and mentally tests the hospital floor. After about two weeks he receives a new prison uniform, something nearer his size. He must be clean and neat when he comes from the inside out with one exception: He may wear a colored necktie but only if it is not too colorful. Faded underwear is strictly taboo.

Then the new prisoner's features are measured and photographed so that if he escapes thousands of circulars bearing his likeness can be distributed without delay. Adaptability Governs Details He then is brought before the warden or deputy for work assignment. His tasks are governed by his adaptability to the specialized prison industries. Men for the inside might work in the shoe factory. Work is not compulsory but it is usually found desirable after a time.

Each new prisoner is a first grader. Minor trouble will cause demotion to the second grade and something more serious will drop him to the third grade, with no newspapers or visitors for three months. There is the "hole" solitary for the most obstreperous. 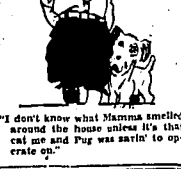

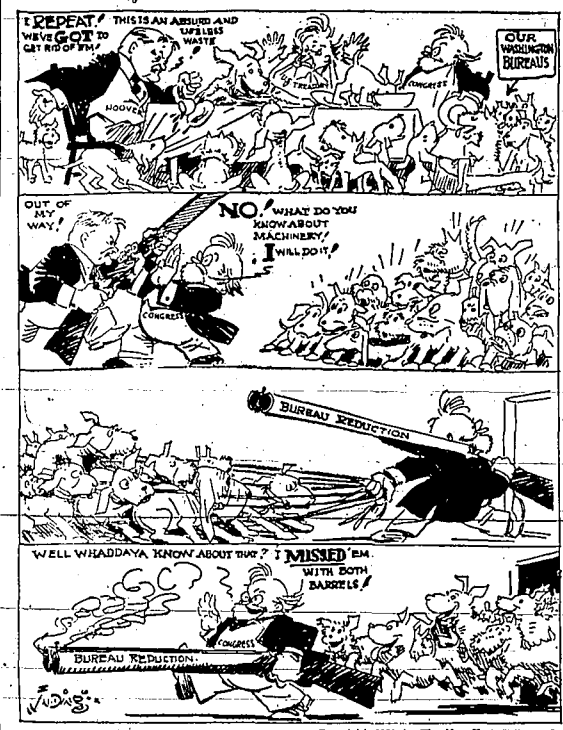

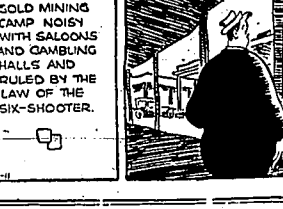

A manslaughter charge was yesterday filed against Martin Lenix, of Reno, Nevada, driver of an automobile which struck and killed Richard Goodnight, 7, on the highway in front of his grandparents' home east of Twin Falls Saturday afternoon.

J. S. Mullins, the boy's grandfather, signed the complaint.

Lenix was not arraigned yesterday. He has been held in the county jail here since he was arrested an hour after the accident.

The man who was driving the automobile which struck the child, officers who found his car in a garage here where a friend had taken it for repairs for a headlight, officers said Lenix confessed, when confronted with evidence, that he was the driver of the death machine.

The manslaughter complaint charges Lenix was driving recklessly and killed the Goodnight boy "in the commission of an unlawful act, not amounting to a felony, and without malice."

Richard Goodnight was the second son and youngest of four children of Mrs. Irene Goodnight, Elko, Nevada. He was born a month after his father's death in Twin Falls. He had lived with his grandparents here for some time.

### HOTEL CORPORATION'S CREDITORS PICK AGENT

Creditors of the Rogerson Hotel company, Twin Falls, representing approximately \$150,000 in claims, at a meeting here yesterday elected L. A. Chapin, Twin Falls city commissioner of finance, to be trustee in bankruptcy under terms of a federal court order.

Mr. Chapin, as trustee, will take charge of the Rogerson Hotel property here which for three months has been in the hands of Stuart H. Taylor, Twin Falls, special receiver appointed by the district court.

Other candidates for the trusteeship were said to have been L. L. Patrick, Twin Falls, and F. C. Graves, Piler.

Vote of a majority of the creditors, on the basis of numbers as well as of amount of their claims, was required for the election.

Judge C. P. Dwyer, Twin Falls, referee in bankruptcy, called the creditors together and presided, at their meeting yesterday which was held in the probate court rooms. More than 90 creditors took part in the meeting, several others being represented by attorneys.

The stockholders of the Rogerson Hotel company were the stockholders of the Twin Falls National bank, which closed last November 23. According to the petition for appointment of the special receiver, a failure of the two institutions was so intermingled, that one could not be distinguished out without the other.
