They were extremely hot in the first half, which ended 18-7, and were not threatened. The score at the end of the third period was 27-13.
Out of a total of 68 tries for field goals, the Oakley lads topped once in 11 tries. Bellevue players shot nearly an equal number of times, but only seven of them found the mark.
Oakley's high scorer was Severe, who collected 15 tallies. Burch, with 12, was a close second. Myer's Bellevue forward, led his team with 6 points.
Bellevue, lacking experience in Class A competition, found the flashy Oakley squad more than a match. The Wood River team had gone through the Class B tournament on the Shoshone court with only one defeat, against five victors.
Oakley boys went through the pre-tournament season with a record of nine triumphs and one defeat. They claimed Class A tournament honors with five victories and one defeat at the same event.
The Oakley boys, favorites for the entire season, now are rated strong contenders for the district title in the single-elimination tournament to be staged on the Bruni's court March 17 and 18.

Hartford Pugilist Celebrates Debut by Administering Brutal Beating to "Wasp"

The 10-round semi-final saw rugged young Hart, beat out a decision over the veteran Archie Bell, Brooklyn. Bell was weighed in at 160 and had his heavier rival swelled completely shut. Petrolie weighed 124 pounds to Bell's 130.
At 6 o'clock, Philadelphia native Sammy O'Brien, Camden, a beating in the opening round preliminary on the "Bat" Battalino, was in the ring. He was swelled in the ring and lost the fight on a point but could not put him down. Each weighed 144.
