**BEET MEN LISTEN TO TERMS OF NEW REFINING CONTRACT**  
Restriction of Idaho's Consumption of Sugar to State's Product Would Boost Values, Says Hagar

Idaho's sugar consumption of 185 pounds per person annually will increase the 1932 price of sugar beets to the 50 cent per ton if the state's consumption of sugar is restricted to the Idaho product, A. R. Hagar, Twin Falls manager for the Amalgamated Sugar Company, told a meeting of 250 growers in Twin Falls high school auditorium last night.

"I wasn't impudent. The bishop just asked me if the right would always win, and I said no if the other fellow had a good left."

1932 beet contract, it was explained, provides for 50-50 division between grower and manufacturer of the net return for the sugar produced in Idaho by transportation and terminal storage charges. Increasing the net return to that extent, Hagar explained.

and all of the company's books. "Under this new contract," he declared, "we are all partners together. This farmer grows the beets and the manufacturer shares equally in the product."

Last evening's meeting, called for the purpose of discussing the proposed production loans soon to be made available, as well as for consideration of the new beet contract, and beet production methods, was the last of a series of five similar meetings held in Twin Falls county within the past four days at Murtaugh, Kimberly, Buhl, Filer and Twin Falls.

He explained the sliding scale price to be paid for beets depending upon sugar content and the price received for sugar. The range, he pointed out, is from 45.15 cents for 43.50 sugar to 110.00 for 47 sugar, on a basis of per cent sugar content, which is the average of the past five years in this district.

Attendance at these meetings, aggregating 875, is said to have exceeded attendance at any similar series of meetings in this county. The new contract was made available for signing at all of these meetings except the one at Murtaugh, and the sign-up at that place was very satisfactory.

Idaho produces 1,500,000 pounds of foreign sugar. Idaho sugar that is not consumed in this state must be marketed elsewhere, mostly in the Middle Western states, he said.

The meeting voted an expression of thanks to Mr. Peisoldt for his efforts in connection with the drafting of the new contract.

Mr. Hagar said, and consumes 468,000 pounds of sugar. Idaho's consumption is 140,000 pounds, or 18.60 per cent of the total. Idaho sugar and 282,000 pounds of foreign sugar. Idaho sugar that is not consumed in this state must be marketed elsewhere, mostly in the Middle Western states, he said.

Outlining the history of the beet growers' organization in this district, Mr. Peisoldt told of its affiliation last year with regional and national organizations formed under auspices of the federal farm board. The growers' organization, he said, is fighting to increase consumption of Idaho products, and is providing an effective influence in shaping legislation in the growers' interest.

He said that the sugar beet crop acreage in the county this season would reach 25,000 acres, had been raised the year before to 20,000, and another sugar field men were cautioning applicants for contracts against underestimating the plant larger crops than they can be sure of taking care of properly.

The world's sugar production this year will be considerably less than last, according to indications to which he referred.

Referring to activities of the growers' organization, Mr. Hagar said that through this agency growers may check delivery of beets at receiving stations—direct laboratory tests to determine sugar content, and have free access to sales records.

Explains Loans  
A discussion of federal crop production loans was given by Mr. Hale outlined provisions for securing the loans, engaged the attention of Idaho growers, and he explained in detail the qualifications for securing these loans, which was occupied for about a half-hour answering questions.
