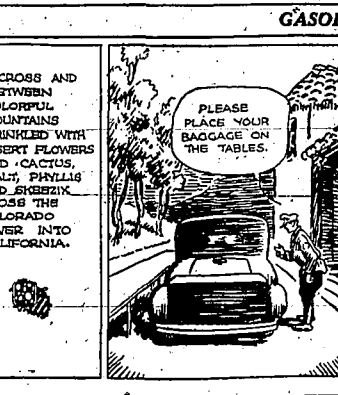

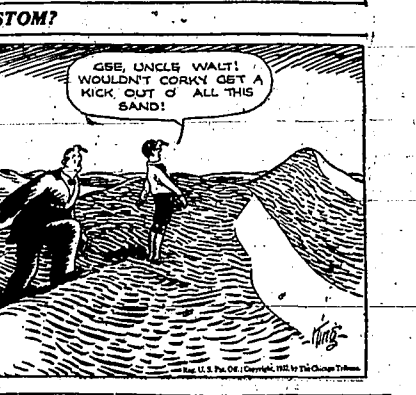

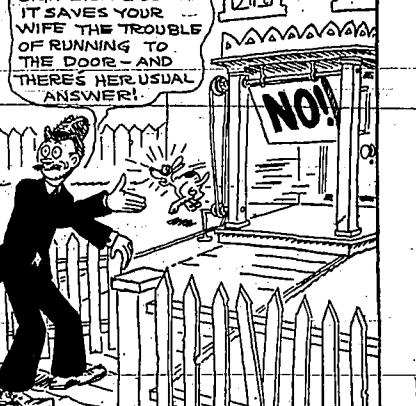

Martin Lenis Gets More Time to Prepare For Inquiry in Richard Goodnight's Death

Martin Lenis, 36, Reno, Nevada, accused of manslaughter in connection with the death of seven-year-old Richard Goodnight in an automobile accident here March 5, was released from jail here yesterday under \$5000 surety bond which he furnished after being granted a continuance of preliminary hearing to April 2. Lenis was not represented by counsel.

He had spent 10 days in the county jail, having made no application for release under bond since being arrested within two hours after the fatal mishap. Sheriffs and police officers arrested him when they discovered his car in a repair shop here. A headlight was broken. Officers had picked up broken headlight glass on the pavement where the accident occurred.

Lenis admitted he was the driver of the death machine, when officers confronted him with the evidence. He said Richard and a boy companion started across the road in front of his car, and that he swerved to the left in an attempt to avoid a collision, but was unable to steer clear of the Goodnight boy.

J. B. Mullins, magistrate of the dead boy, signed the complaint accusing Lenis of manslaughter.
