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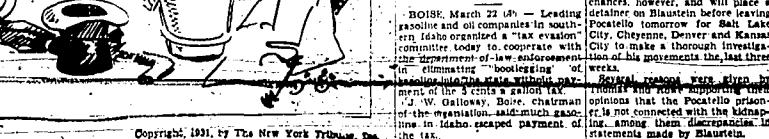
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LABOR SITUATION REMAINS PROBLEM

Report Shows Scarcity of Jobs All Over Nation and Idaho Shortage Continues

TWIN FALLS LEADS IN DECLAMATORIES IN SESSION HERE

Local Contestants Win in Four of Six Events on Schedule For District Championship Honors

Twin Falls high school contestants won first place in four of the six events staged yesterday in the South-Central Idaho declamatory contest, held in the national oratorical, the dramatic, the humorous and the one-act play division. Second place in the humorous division also came to students in this city. Buhl stood second in the number of contestants yesterday, with one first place, one second and three third places. Carey had one first place, one second and one third place. Fairfield had one second place and one third place. Piner one third place.

First and second contestants in each division except the national oratorical one-act play division at Caldwell Friday and Saturday of this week to participate in the inter-district contest. Only the person holding first place in the national oratorical division contest is eligible to enter the district contest.

RED CROSS SERVICE GOES ON AFTER WAR

Twin Falls Chapter's Roll Call Chairman Tells Activities For Veterans

Red Cross chapters in Idaho gave service and relief to an average of 87 reserve men and their families each month during the past year. It was revealed in a report, P. C. Sorenson, Roll Call Chairman of the Twin Falls chapter, made public yesterday.

The war may be over, but aid to the disabled veteran still goes on, he said. "The Red Cross has pledged itself to stand by these men as long as they need its services."

That war service constitutes an enormous part of the Red Cross program in Idaho states was a member of the organization's national headquarters. During the year, home service workers throughout the United States gave assistance to 443,716 veterans and service men, or 10 members of their families.

An average of 4923 patients in army, navy and veterans' administration hospitals were served each month directly by the Red Cross. Its expenditures in behalf of veterans and service men for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, exceeded one million dollars.

Although more than 13 years have elapsed since the signing of the armistice, there are 25,555 World war veterans still in hospitals of this country. A total of 27,742 death compensation claims have been filed. A study of those figures is sufficient proof that the existence of the Red Cross war service is justified.

Aid from giving aid to dependents of those whose deaths resulted from war, many thousands of dollars have been recovered for the veterans themselves.

The Twin Falls chapter has set to renew memberships and to extend the invitation to all to join the Red Cross.
