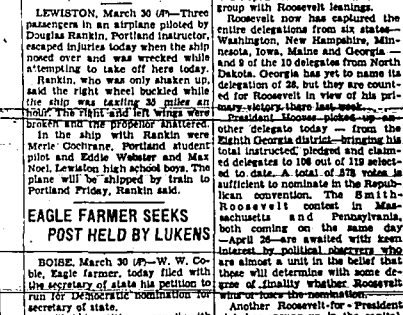

### SEATTLE MAN LOCATES SUNKEN TREASURE SHIP

NORWOLK, Va., March 30 (The News)—Miss Carl H. Wiley of the former Marine Salvaging company, announced today he had located the wreck of the Ward Line Mermaid about 65 miles northeast of Cape Charles.

Wiley would leave tomorrow by plane for Seattle to make preparations for operations to salvage the ship, which went down November 1911, with a cargo of gold, silver and jewels, valued at between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000.

Captain Wiley, who has been here since March 9, is inventor of apparatus which he said would be used in deep water operations, and which now is being employed in an effort to raise the Steamer Islander, sunk in Alaskan waters in 1905, with a \$3,500,000 cargo of gold.

The Mermaid was located, he said, in 11,000 feet of water and his apparatus is designed to be effective at depths up to 230 feet.

### CITY OF BURLEY DRILLS WELL TO 70-FOOT DEPTH

BURLEY, March 30 (Special to The News)—Engineers here are drilling a well for the city of Burley, has penetrated down 70 feet, but they are expected to go a few feet farther, when they will perforate the lower part of the casing with 2-inch slits and test for water. Strata underneath the surface at Burley vary considerably. At the place where they are now drilling, in the southwest part of the city, they struck water-bearing gravel at 47 feet, which they are now drilling in other stratum of gravel. T. J. Stephenson says he expects to secure a well with a capacity of 100 inches continuous flow, or better. A well at the fairgrounds pumps a continuous flow of about 75 inches without lowering the water level.

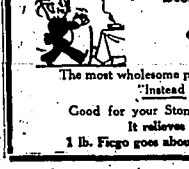
### DIETRICH WOMAN DIES AT HOME IN SHOSHONE

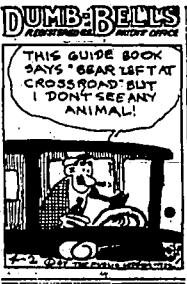

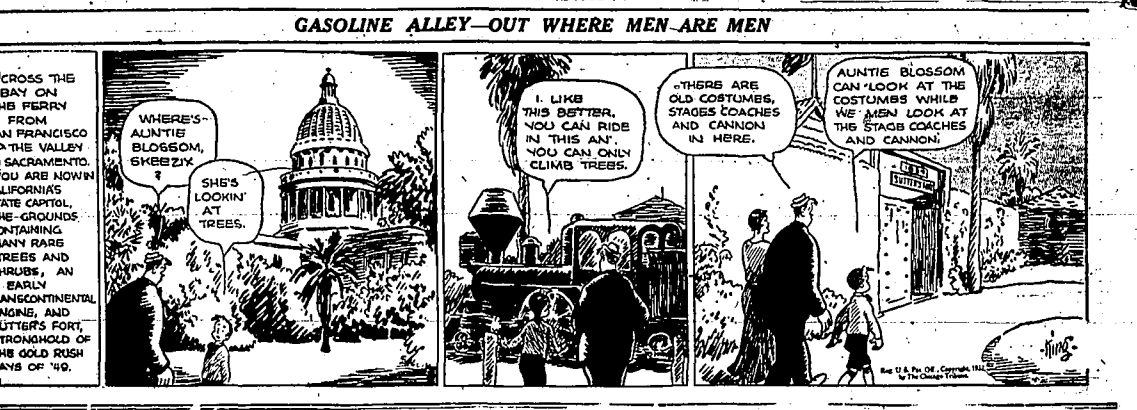

### SCHOOLS AND CITY SLASH AT DEBTS

Twin Falls Superintendent and Finance Commissioner Outline Fiscal Policies

Notwithstanding that the schools of Twin Falls and the city are educating more pupils than ever before in the history of the district, the district's total bonded indebtedness amounting to \$452,000, will be paid off within the next six or seven years. W. B. Smith, superintendent, told members of the Twin Falls Rotary club in session Wednesday. Continuing, Mr. Smith made the statement that the transportation for school children is costing less than in the year 1921 notwithstanding the fact that more pupils are carried to and from school. During the past 10 years, \$247,000 in bonds has been paid off by the district, according to Mr. Smith.

L. A. Chapin, Twin Falls commissioner of finance, discussed the matter of city debts which he declared to be upon a cash basis. This policy would be continued, he asserted his indebtedness, except as to the interest on bonds amounting to \$5000 have been reduced through refinancing at lower interest rates, and to which the expenses have been cut and further cuts are anticipated. In all likelihood, a reduction in the cost of domestic water will be effected in the near future, he said. Continuing, Mr. Chapin declared that much of the financial trouble of the country, in his judgment, was directly traceable to installment buying which he considers is ruining the private credit. He advocated a system of rigid economy on the part of all. "Give until it hurts," he declared in this way only could prosperity be re-established.

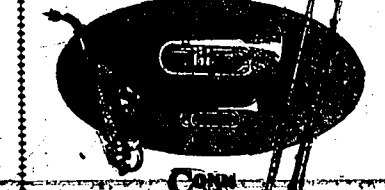

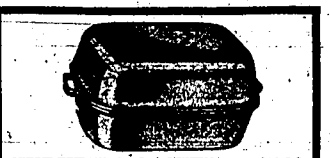

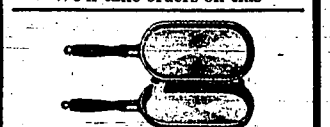
