Midnight Adds 75,000 Miners in Coal Fields To Jobless Multitude

STROUBSBURG, Pa., March 31 (AP)—Thomas P. Lambert, 29, reported to have been the youngest World War veteran in the United States, died at his home in East Stroubsburg yesterday after a long illness.

He took part in the battle of Chateau Thierry and the Meuse river Veale drive before entering the Air Corps where he was brought home in October, 1918, after two months' post-war duty in the front line. He had been in ill health since the end of the war.

Mother Nature "Holds" Gold in Hiding Place Off Alaskan Coast

Precious Metal Washed Into Sea by Streams Remains Beyond Reach of Man

(By The Associated Press.) JUNEAU, Alaska, March 31—One of the "hiding" places of gold is back into circulation soon belongs to Mother Nature.

"Gold dust" is the marking on charts of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey at this point, in Stephan Passage, an inland arm of the sea.

This gold was found when the original soundings were taken in the channel in the 1880's. Gravel, brought up from the bottom, contained many tiny sparkling grains of the precious metal.

Since the gold dust was "panned" from the sands along Alaskan streams in the Klondike gold rush of 1897.

Ironically, thousands of fortune-seekers passed directly over the "gold dust bottom" in steamers on their way to the Klondike.

The gold is believed to have been washed into the sea by streams during the Klondike gold rush.

At a depth of 600 feet, the gold dust seems to be safe from recovery. Divers can not operate much below 300 feet, and dredging is limited to 20 or 40 feet.

SUGAR BEET SIGN-UP AT HALF-WAY MARK

Amalgamated Company Manager Tells Kiwanians 5300 Acres Already Contracted

Contracts for the production of sugar beets in the Twin Falls district this season, have been signed for nearly two weeks since the contracts became available. A. R. Hagar, Twin Falls manager for the Amalgamated Beet Company, told members of the Kiwanis club at a meeting at luncheon at the Park hotel yesterday.

Ten thousand to 12,000 acres of beets in this district would provide for a 100-day run of the factory, he said.

The new contracts specify a 50-50 division between growers and manufacturers of the returns from the sugar, without a minimum guaranteed price.

Hagar touched upon prospects for successful beet crop production, referring to federal government announcements, stating that the price had reduced leaf hopper populations materially. The Amalgamated company, he said, has made arrangements to advance \$20 an acre to growers to meet expense of seed, sowing and fertilizer where it is also to use local labor in so far as it is available in cultivation and harvesting of the crop. Hagar was also under way to organize high school boys and Boy Scouts in this work.

In conclusion, Mr. Hagar pointed out that approximately 60 per cent of the sugar produced in Idaho is foreign sugar, while a large part of Idaho's sugar crop must be marketed in other states.

Idaho sugar consumers could increase the price of beets 50 cents a ton, he said, if they would buy only Idaho sugar.
