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PROHIBITION SEEMS ORAL MINOR ISSUE IN IDAHO POLITICS

Attitudes of Several Candidates and Aspirants Reveal Divergent Views On "Dry" Laws, However

By FRESTON L. GROVER (Associated Press Staff Writer) BOISE, April 1 (Special to The News)—Prohibition is being prohibition to the form as a major political question in Idaho, but it has been held off for a time on the issue in the divergent views of a number of the outstanding candidates and potential candidates.

The Woman's Christian Temperance union meeting at Boise this week avowed its purpose to begin an immediate campaign to elect dry officials, bring about state-wide and national conventions, and to oppose any one whose leanings are toward a modification of the present laws on alcoholic beverages.

Prohibition is unlikely to become a live issue until candidates for state offices since none of those in the field at present has established himself in the state as a militant "dry" or "wet."

Defendant "Dry" Byron B. Ketchum, Republican prohibitionist, has been known as a "dry" ever since he was elected to the legislature. In the congressional field the situation was more sharply defined and the question more likely to be discussed.

Chew T. Stratton, candidate for the Democratic senatorial nomination in this district, has declared against prohibition and has also sent out campaign material in the form of a pamphlet.

John Thomas, Republican senatorial nominee in the second congressional district, has been known as a "dry" ever since he was elected to the legislature.

Representative Addison T. Smith is a "dry" but a believer in "dry" principles. So far, W. P. Alworth, Phil and Harold Yennema, blind Buhl and other Democratic aspirants, have included any reference to prohibition in his platform.

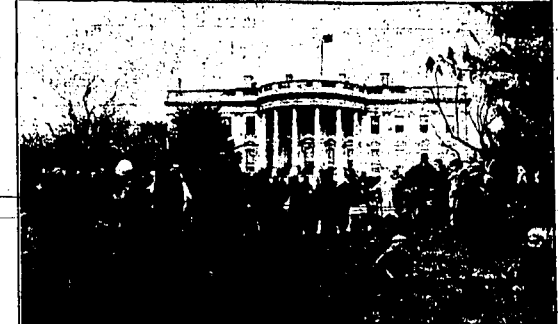

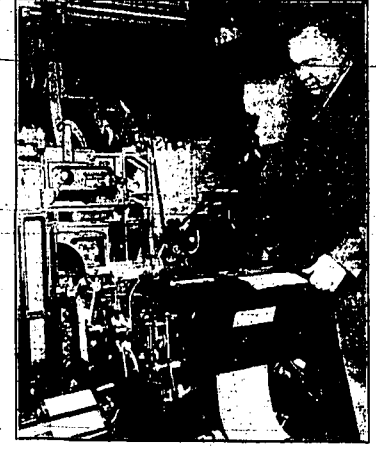

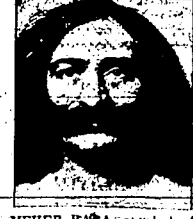
