PARIS, April 2.—Prints are back in fashion's picture book.

A three-quarter length sleeve often is seen in the coat of these prints. Sometimes, since it is preferred the lower sleeve of the contrasting frock to show below.

Most of the printed frocks feature the simple silhouette which marks the 1932 mode, although designs are occasionally fashioned with softly draped necklines or sleeves having elbow or wrist puffs.

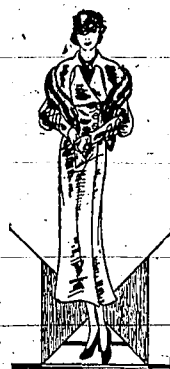

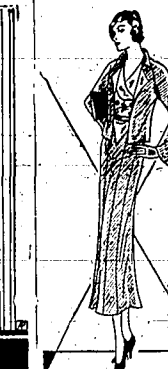
