# NEWS OF THE DAY AS RECORDED BY THE CAMERAMEN

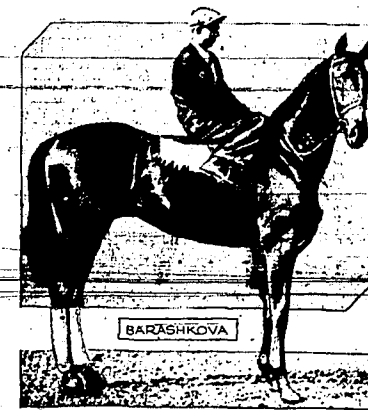

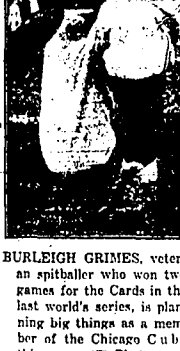

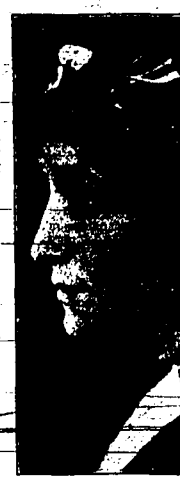

EVIDENCE LACKING FOR PROSECUTION IN FATAL MISHAP

Prosecuting Attorney Gets Dismissal of Manslaughter Charge Against Hit-and-Run Automobile Driver

A manslaughter charge against Martin Lenz, 26, Reno, Nevada, driver of a car which struck and killed seven-year-old Richard Goodnight on the highway near Twin Falls last March 5, was dismissed by Judge Guy L. The accident occurred almost directly in front of the residence of the boy's grandfather, J. S. Mullins, with whom he had made his home for some time. Mr. Mullins signed the complaint.

Lenz was held in the county jail here until March 16 when he was released under \$2000 bond.

The complaint accused Lenz of driving with "wanton disregard for the rights and safety of others," and of commission of "an unlawful act without malice."

The prosecutor's motion for dismissal of the manslaughter charge stated that "full and thorough investigation of all the facts and circumstances surrounding the case" had been made "both by myself and the officers of the sheriff's office."

On the grounds that there was "not sufficient evidence available at this time to warrant conviction of the crime charged," the prosecutor asked for dismissal of the charge.

"The manslaughter charge was the only charge that was filed with me," O. W. William, prosecuting attorney, said last evening.

The prosecutor said he had no information whether another or lesser charge would be filed.

A "hit-and-run" driver, he said, could be prosecuted only on a misdemeanor charge of failure to report a collision to the officers.

Lenz had been employed for some years by a Reno bank, and had been in months during the fall and winter when he was in charge of sheep that were being fed at Twin Falls and later at Boise.

It was reported that a \$2700 settlement had been made with relatives of the dead boy, presumably by the insurance concern which carried public liability insurance on the back of the car which was driving when the accident occurred.

WOMAN OPENS ATTACK ON DECREE OF DIVORCE

A motion to set aside a decree of divorce granted in district court here March 25 to Fred Craig, Rogerston, from Mrs. Yvonne Craig, was placed on file yesterday, declaring Mrs. Craig's intention to restore the severed matrimonial bonds. Craig sought and obtained an annulment on grounds of alleged cruelty. Mrs. Craig was not present or represented by counsel at hearing on Craig's complaint.

It was not her intention to permit the case to go by default, she said in an affidavit supporting her motion to set aside the decree.

On March 16, she said, she consulted an attorney regarding the suit. The next day she verified her answer to the complaint. On the following day, she said, she raised \$5 to pay costs of filing the answer and on the next day, March 19, she said, her answer was served on Craig's attorney.

A second affidavit in support of the motion was made by Mrs. Craig's attorney, S. T. Hamilton, Twin Falls, who said he was in Gooding on business when Craig's complaint was brought up for hearing in the court here.

The Craig's were married September 13, 1920. There are no children, and, according to Craig's complaint, no community property was involved.
