SIX CANDIDATES SEEK NOMINATIONS

Two Republicans For Commissioners' Board and Three Democratic Officials On Day's List

Three candidates for Republican nominations for county officers, and three county officials who are candidates for re-election on the Democratic ticket, filed declarations of candidacy in the office of the county auditor here yesterday.

Republican candidates were J. P. Condit, Twin Falls, and C. A. Hatfield, Buhl, candidates for nomination respectively for county commissioner from the Second and First districts, and F. B. Bell, Twin Falls, candidate for the nomination for probate judge.

Democratic officials seeking reelection who filed declarations yesterday were James L. Barnes, chairman of the board of county commissioners, and J. P. Condit, chairman of the board of assessors.

Mr. Condit has been a director of Twin Falls Canal company for many years and both he and Mr. Hatfield are old-time residents of the county. Their declarations of candidacy were both endorsed by the same group of Republican voters — J. J. Boyd, W. H. Harvey, J. H. Barker, C. E. Rudy, G. P. Duncan, J. O. Eastman, R. W. Hudson, H. S. Parham, Buhl; Charles E. Jones, M. J. Sweeley, J. G. Bradley, Twin Falls.

Mr. Bell, a Twin Falls attorney who was the Republican candidate for probate judge two years ago, was endorsed for his nomination by C. E. Lind, W. E. Sanger, W. H. Dwight, W. H. Eldridge, Orlin Williams, Frank L. Stephan, F. P. McAtee, C. T. Hampton, Twin Falls; A. R. Scott, Hansen.

On Democratic side Mr. Barnes, who was first elected county commissioner in 1928 and re-elected in 1930 after a two-year interval, was endorsed for nomination for a third term by J. D. Barnhart, A. E. Haggerty, H. Colwell, Twin Falls; F. W. Wachholz, Murlaugh; J. E. Lowery, F. Brewer, Hansen; J. M. Bleske, Kimberling; W. M. M. Miller, Filer.

SEED LOANS SET NEW HIGH RECORD

Federal Government Makes \$17,297.50 Available to 58 Farmers of County

Federal government seed loans totaling \$17,297.50 were made available yesterday to 58 Twin Falls county farmers, who had indicated purpose to raise 18 different kinds of crops on lands aggregating 5000 acres.

The days seed loans total set a new mark for the county, exceeding the previous day's \$10,876 record by a wide margin. Yesterday's loans ranged from \$2 to the \$400 maximum which was granted to 17 of the applicants.

What was the crop favored by most of the applicants on yesterday's list, 47 of the 58 farmers indicating purpose to plant 2188 acres of that crop. Nineteen growers indicated purpose to raise grain as a main crop for 523 acres of alfalfa or clover. Indicated quantities of alfalfa on yesterday's list included 979 acres, and of clover 231 acres.

Twenty-three growers indicated intentions to plant 777 acres of beans, and 13 growers obtained loans to raise 153 acres of beets.

Twenty-eight growers set down 295 acres to be planted in potatoes. Other crop planting intentions as shown by yesterday's loan records were as follows: Barley, 339 1/2 acres; corn, 204 acres; oats, 21 acres; onions, 127 acres; lima beans, 15 acres; garden stuff, 3 acres; orchard, 47 acres; raspberries, 1 acre; hay, 625 acres; pasture, 105 acres; sodden grass, 5 acres; alfalfa seed, 25 acres.

Aged Unitarian Minister at Boise Recalls Friendship With Whittier

Dr. John C. Mitchell Also Remembers Acquaintance With Six Other Poets

When one reaches the age of 80 years, he said, "he seems to be expected to display signs of extreme feebleness, and because I do not, my friends ask how it happens. I can only reply that I fill my mind as full of the exquisite language of rhythm and ideas of poetry as there is no room for anything else. Our American poets are the most charming."

All Unitarians All were Unitarians, he said, during the annual conventions of the church in Boston, he had frequent opportunity to meet the men and even more frequent opportunity because he lived in the city with them.

"A Free Religionist" gathering in Boston, he said, "I remember seeing Bryant, Whittier, Emerson and Holmes all seated on one section. Emerson had lost his mind, and Holmes was taking care of him. It was a sad sight to see one of the world's greatest spiritual philosophers looking vacantly, not knowing where he was."

When Longfellow died, he said, Emerson attended the funeral. Emerson was looking at Longfellow in his casket, Emerson murmured: "That man had a sweet soul, but I have forgotten his name."

Dr. Mitchell believes poetry and religion would save the people much trouble now endured. "We are living in a materialistic age when all men care about is science, invention and money-getting."

Indeed, we have pursued the materialistic policy until we stand now on the verge of a frightful revolution.

"Whittier was the tallest of all the poets, over six feet, straight as an arrow and quick of motion. He had wonderful eyes, sharp and keen when he glanced at you, you felt that he read your inmost soul. His eyes were 'violet' to 'emerald' to 'turquoise' in hue, but his nose was under the spell of his mustache or of a mighty inspiration, his eyes flashed and sparkled like diamonds."

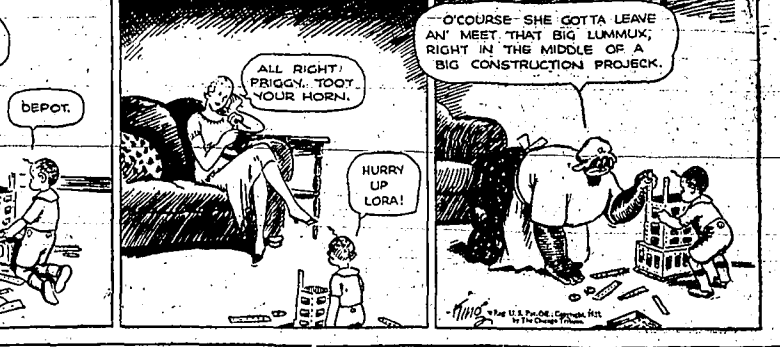

NORTH DAKOTA MAN VISITS PRODUCERS

Senator George H. Hoopie Visits Growers With View of Perfecting Organization

George H. Hoopie, Hoopie, North Dakota state senate, arrived here yesterday with a view of perfecting an organization of "The United Potato Growers of Idaho," the objective of which is to reduce potato acreage. He is registered at the Rogerson hotel.

Senator Hoopie, who states that he is engaged in extensive production of potatoes in the Red River valley in his state, says that he came to Idaho on invitation of A. Y. Satterfield, Postville, who had already operated growers north of that city in the project. He says he will spend about a week here and then return to North Dakota to perfect the organization in that state. A similar organization in Idaho was perfected in January of this year he states with the result that by now values regarding same—the prices were raised slightly above what they were before the organization.

"The United Potato Growers" is not a direct marketing organization," said Senator Hoopie. "It is not connected with or in conflict with the government movement to organize a direct marketing organization. Its purpose is indicated in its constitution as follows:

"The board of directors shall, from time to time, quote the minimum price at which the United potato growers and any member of the Union may sell potatoes for that price or a higher price than that he can obtain, but shall not sell for a lower price.

"The Union, to be effective, must get at least enough signers of the potato growers of Idaho to actually accomplish that which is intended. It shall be the duty of the majority of the directors to ascertain when that number has accrued up and their decision shall be final and binding on the Union—majority rule.

"After the directors have been satisfied that a sufficient number have signed up, the said Union shall proceed to carry on its work and the necessary organization shall be completed in accordance with this agreement, majority rule."

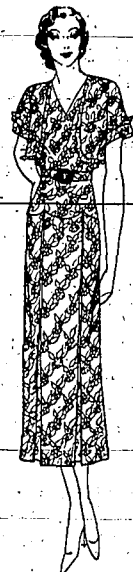
