EX-IDAHONAN DIES AT LOS ANGELES HOSPITAL

BOISE, April 14 (AP)—Mrs. Eleanor Walker Park, wife of Harry Park, both prominent in Boise society until they moved to Los Angeles three years ago, died yesterday in Los Angeles after being stricken with a sudden illness at a mountain resort.

Mr. Park was in Chicago and took an airplane for the coast on being notified of his wife's illness but was unable to reach her side before she died.

Surviving besides her husband are their daughter, Antonio; two small daughters by a former marriage; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Walker, Hartford.

DESPERADOES TERRORIZE MEXICAN BORDER TOWN

EAGLE PASS, Tex., April 14 (AP)—Mexican authorities reported today that a mounted band of 25 heavily armed desperadoes had terrorized the Mexican town of Nava, 30 miles southeast of Piedras Negras, Monday night.

The desperadoes came into town shooting rifles and pistols. They captured the mayor, police and other city officials and held them in a saloon while they staged an all-night celebration. Whiskey was pilfered from saloons.

No robberies were reported and none was injured. The bandits liberated their prisoners and left town at dawn.

General Ignacio Elizondo dispatched troops to hunt down the bandits, but the troops returned to headquarters without being able to contact the bandits.

25-FOOT SNAKE TURNS ON MASTER AT CIRCUS

NEW YORK, April 14 (AP)—A 25-foot python chased through a 25-foot python chase on an afternoon audience at Ringling Brothers' Circus and killed a man.

The python was being held by a man when it struck him in the chest and the big snake wrenched its armor plated head and body away from a man's grasp.

The python, about 20 feet long, was coiled around the body of Luigi Cannata, acrobat, and sank its fangs into his bare right arm.

While the acrobat and reptile struggled a score of fellow trouper rushed into the ring and tried to pull the snake away from Cannata.

The performers were taken to the hospital. Cannata received a serum injection for the bite.

MURRAY DOESN'T LIKE TREATMENT BY PRESS

TULSA, Okla., April 14 (AP)—Governor William H. Murray, who unofficially abandoned his Oregon campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination to hurry home to Tulsa, Okla., today said he "didn't like" the "disturbing" newspaper attacks and that newspapers had "no business" meddling.

In explanation of his departure from Oregon, Murray said the newspapers had said "at one town while I was in it, I was across the line in the state of Washington."

He hesitated when asked if he would continue his campaign into Missouri, he originally planned. "I don't know yet," he said.

IRISHMAN FIGHTS SCOT ON TOP OF SKYSCRAPER

NEW YORK, April 14 (AP)—The biggest fight on record took place today on a top floor of the world's tallest building, Chrysler state.

Charles Campbell and Patrick Dougherty, Chicagoan manager of the latter, balanced over the eighty-seventh floor. The quarrel developed from the realization of the two men's respective nationalities.

The Scotchman was taken to a hospital with a broken leg. The Irishman was held in \$100 bail for being on a charge of felonious assault.

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WILLIAM J. BURNS DIES AT SARASOTA

World Famous Detective Succumbs Unexpectedly, at Winter Home at Age of 70

SARASOTA, Fla., April 14 (AP)—William J. Burns, world-famed detective, died at his home here tonight.

Burns, who was probably the most famous individual in the detective business, died unexpectedly. He was 70 years old, a native of Boston and spent much of his early life in Ohio.

He founded the detective agency bearing his name and was one of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice from 1922 to 1924.

Mr. Burns was stricken with a heart attack tonight and death resulted within a short time.

He had been here since last fall, during the winter months he had spent his winters in Sarasota. His summer home is in New York.

FIGURES IN OIL SCANDAL

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—As chief of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice, William J. Burns, figured prominently in the Teapot Dome oil scandal.

He was appointed to the post in 1924 after the resignation of J. Edgar Hoover after making a national reputation as head of the private detective agency bearing his name.

In 1923 he was in charge of the investigation of the sensational dynamiting of the Boston granite quarries.

After entering the department he was bitterly attacked for general raids upon "reds" and racketeers in 1923 and 1924.

In appointing him to his post, Daugherty said Burns was "an intelligent and courageous man and at the same time a man who could be trusted to assume the important duties assigned him."

Just a few years later both the chief and his appointee were engaged in the oil case and both retired from office, Burns some time after his chief.

GEN STATE GOVERNOR ISSUES PROCLAMATION

BOISE, April 14 (AP)—Governor C. B. Dierkes today issued a proclamation during the Child Health day in keeping with which the proclamation said was the "most important example set by the president."

The proclamation urged the people of the state to observe the day by abstaining from alcohol and to encourage the program, outlined by the White House conference on child health, in promoting the welfare of children.

Son Mother Sought Leaves Jail Cell To Attend Funeral

CHICAGO, April 14 (AP)—Mrs. Bridget Tamm, mother of six children, asked the police the other day to help find her son, 19.

The police remembered the name today. They found him in a jail held on suspicion.

They booked him for disorderly conduct and then let him out on \$100 bond. He was brought to his mother, killed by a hit-and-run motorist.

NEW ZEALAND POOR RIOT AT AUCKLAND

AUCKLAND, New Zealand, (Friday Morning) April 15 (AP)—Royal Naval Reserves and Mounted Volunteers Guards City After Fierce Fights

QUEEN STREET, main business thoroughfare, became a street of smashed and looted shops. It looked as if it had undergone a battle.

One hundred civilians and 25 police officers were injured. The combined efforts of marines from His Majesty's Ship Phoenix, police, the fire department and private citizens quelled the riots and restored order.

It was estimated \$85,000 worth of plate glass windows were shattered, while the total damage to property was placed at \$500,000.

The battered police could not cope with the rioters, smashing windows and breaking down doors, looted shops.

The mayor appealed for a volunteer police force, but when those who responded could not handle the situation unemployed and not-well-paid police were sent.

This morning the rioters were on patrol and hundreds of rioters had been treated for injuries, some of which were serious.

EARTH SHOCK RATTLES WINDOWS IN MONTANA

BOZEMAN, Mont., April 14 (AP)—A slight earth shock caused windows to rattle and hanging lamps to sway.

The shock was felt shortly before noon today. No damage was reported.

SNOW DESCENDS AGAIN IN PARTS OF MONTANA

HELENA, Mont., April 14 (AP)—Sharp drops in temperature and a fall of snow today displaced summer-like features in western and southern Montana.

A wet snowfall developed in the Gallatin country from a heavy rain, which began falling this afternoon. The mercury slipped to the freezing point.

Yesterday high temperature marks for the year were set at several Montana points.

POCATELLO SEARCHERS FIND WOMAN'S BODY

POCATELLO, April 14 (AP)—The body of Mrs. Stella Lane, 42, former state law librarian, was recovered this afternoon from the Portneuf river in which she drowned herself last week.

She was found about a mile below the point at which she is thought to have jumped the water.

Mrs. Lane was reported dependent following a long illness.

MATE ON TITANIC RECALLS DISASTER

Charles Herbert Lightholder, Once Hero of Tragedy at Sea, Awaits Master's Call

NEW YORK, April 14 (AP)—The white light of a 60-second searchlight will call for the night in the light of the memory of 1913 passengers who lost their lives in the Titanic.

At two places they found some of these survivors, but some of the passengers were members of the relief and were released.

Adult Hitler himself told The Associated Press in a hurried interview that the government would not put an end to the celebration of the storm.

Lightholder testified he stood atop the ship's quarter as the ship was plunged beneath the surface, dived with it, and was blown to the surface by explosion of the ship's boiler, coming up near a lifeboat.

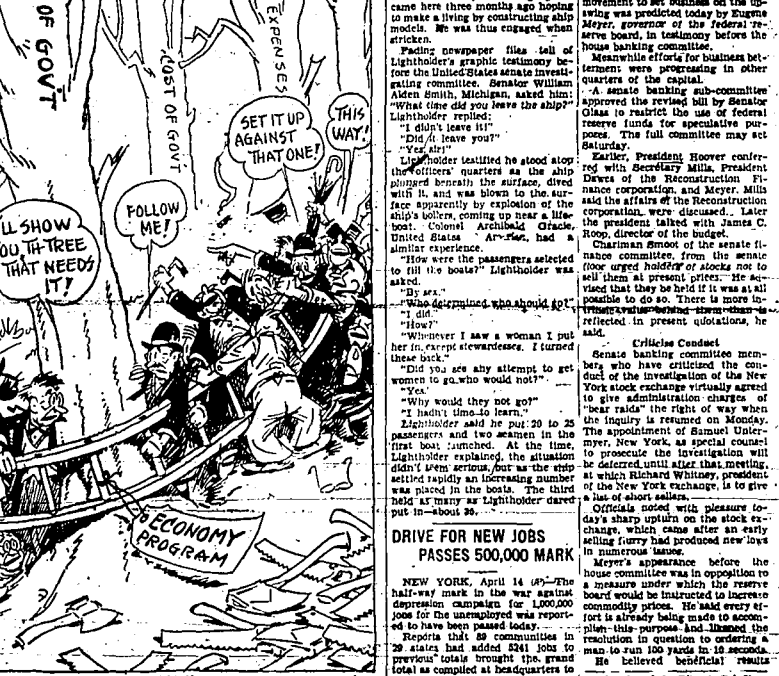
"How were the passengers selected to go to the boats?" Lightholder was asked.

"I don't know," he said.

"I never saw a woman I put her in a lifeboat," he said.

"Did you see any attempt to get women to go into the lifeboats?"

"Yes," Lightholder said he put 20 to 25 passengers and two women in the lifeboat.

GROWER OF ONION SEED PLANTS COSTLY BUILD

A Bush district farmer, Ernest Melander, is planning seed plants for a one-acre plot of certified onion seed. It was stated at the public meeting held here yesterday by Charles Kamrath, Chicago, who in Caldwell organizing the Idaho Meat Producers' association with a view of establishment of a cooperative packing plant at Caldwell. He made the trip here in company with F. Lee Johnson, commissioner of agriculture.

Mr. Kamrath stated that he was consulting engineers during the construction of the largest packing plant in the world at Moscow, and served in a similar capacity during construction of another large plant at Kasankian, Southern Siberia.

He stated that the government there is economical and efficient but would not operate in this country. However, he does believe that many scientific principles will be applied here, though on a more liberal scale.

GOVERNOR'S OFFICE SPONSORS BALLOT
Letter to Statehouse Inspires Selection of Five Greatest Men in State

BOISE, April 14—Just who are Idaho's five greatest men, lives not included. The governor's office would like to know.
The office today received a letter from Edward Martin, state treasurer of Pennsylvania, saying the Association of State Auditors, Accountants and Treasurers would like to know what five men each state considered its greatest.
The association meets in Richmond, Virginia, in November. Although members of the governor's staff immediately hit upon such names as Orville, discoverer of gold in Idaho; Pierre, discoverer of gold in North Idaho; Lewis and Clark; Captain Bowers; John H. Hally; and others, yet it was considered likely the list should include names of outstanding pioneers in irrigation, settlement, railroading and other enterprises. Thus the call to the state for help.
