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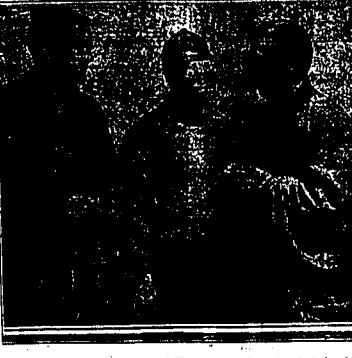

MINIDOKA COUNTY MEN FILE FOR POSITIONS. BEET PLANTING LABORS PROGRESS AT RUPERT.

RUPERT, April 15 (Special to The News)—Robert Walton, present deputy sheriff, has officially filed on the Democratic ticket for sheriff, entering his name on the list of those desiring nomination Thursday morning.

It is likely that the 7000 acres set as a goal at the beginning of the planting season will fall short, but it is expected that 8500 acres will be put into the officials' hands.

On Wednesday there were about 4000 acres planted in the two counties and by the end of next week practically the season's beet crop will be in the ground, according to present indications.

The yearly saving made by the cut in salaries will be \$150,000 for the county, with a saving of 2 cents on \$1,000,000 valuation for the county.

Salary of the county attorney and of county commissioners are fixed by statute and not under jurisdiction of the board of commissioners.

BURLEY'S GUARDSMEN UNDERGO INSPECTION

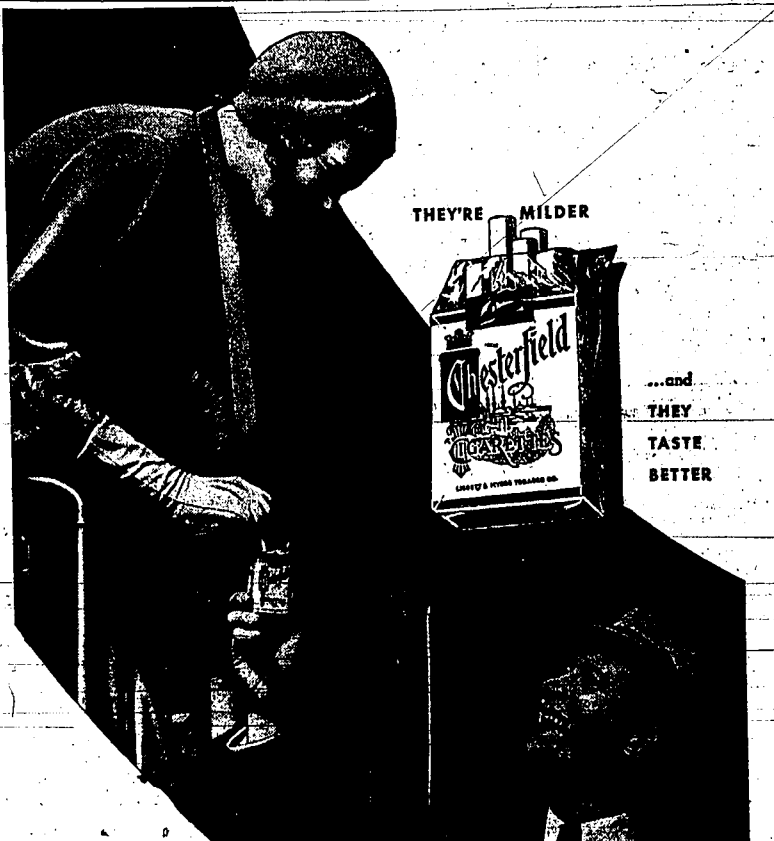

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SCHOOL DISTRICT'S VOTERS AUTHORIZE EXTRA 7-MILL LEVY

Twin Falls electors voted today to authorize a seven-mill school tax levy in addition to the eight-mill levy the school board makes on its own initiative under Idaho law.

At the same time, it was shown, high school enrollment has increased from 1877 last year to 2027 this year, and the district's bonded debt has been reduced from \$387,000 in 1921 to \$217,000 in 1927.
