BURLEY OFFICE SENDS OUT CROP LOAN PAPERS

Commissioners Reduce Pay of Five Elective Officers For Ensuing Two Years

BURLEY, April 16 (Special to The News)—Applications for crop production loans, at the county agent's office, are dropping off, although a few more are expected to be filed. The last day for applications to reach the farmers' credit office at Burley is April 30.

There have been 28 applications already forwarded to the Salt Lake City office, and about 100 will be completed in the Casia county agent's office. Loans average something over \$2000. The maximum limit is \$400. The smallest loan thus far requested is \$25.

BURLEY PRODUCERS USE WINDBREAKS FOR BEES

BURLEY, April 16 (Special to The News)—Willow windbreaks, put up by Frank Beach and other honey producers of the vicinity, are doing around their apiaries, have made quick playgrounds for the bees in the comparative quiet of the outside gale. The bees can get extra protection in the comparative quiet of the apiary, and have easy access to the nectar of the flowers.

Men find, also, that they can work in the apiary, at their accustomed tasks in the woodlot, without having to fly off until a quieter day. The willows are cut from the banks of Snake river, or other bodies of water. They are hauled to the beehive, the stakes in the ground at the bottom of the surrounding fence, and the middle portion of the willow being barbed wire into which the branches are woven.

The resulting windbreak gives better service than a solid fence, although a somewhat puffing job to build. When a board fence is used, the wind eddies downward within the yard, making a bothersome place to work in and causing the bees to fly off. The willow blowing through the willow branches, honey producers say, is broken and quieted and a calm apiary is the result.

BOARD CUTS WAGES IN JEROME COUNTY

Commissioners Reduce Pay of Five Elective Officers For Ensuing Two Years

JEROME, April 16 (Special to The News)—Jerome county commissioners met yesterday and during their routine business a motion made and seconded and passed, cut the salaries of a number of Jerome county officials.

These cuts were as follows: Assessor, from \$1800 to \$1500; treasurer, \$1500 to \$1000; superintendent of public instruction, \$1500 to \$1100; probate judge, \$1000 to \$1200; sheriff, \$1000 to \$1500. Salaries of the coroner and surveyor were held at \$600.

The office of county auditor and recorder being a holdover, the salary remains the same. The salaries of the county attorney and the commissioners are fixed by the legislature according to county classification, and the reduction of the county remains somewhere near its present level, these salaries will remain the same.

Dr. Charles F. Zeller, county physician, met with the board and gave a report on the general health and conditions in the county. He reported a favorable condition at the present time, with no contagious disease.

CONTESTS DEVELOP OVER NOMINATIONS WITH NEW FILINGS All Members of Present Board of Twin Falls County Commissioners Now in Running Two Republicans Enter

All three members of the board of Twin Falls county commissioners were in the running for re-election, and two new contestants for Republican nominations for county offices developed in the filing yesterday of declarations of candidacy of E. J. Finch, Twin Falls, Democrat, for county attorney; P. V. Larson, Twin Falls, Republican, for county attorney; and Fred E. Drake, Twin Falls, Republican, for county clerk.

Only one week remains for filing of declarations of candidacy under terms of Idaho new election law. Mr. Finch was the last of the three members of the present board of county commissioners to declare himself a candidate for re-election. He is not so far opposed for the nomination, James L. Barnes, Hansen, chairman of the board, and one in the third district, without an opposing candidate for the nomination and with no Republican opponents at the general election yet in evidence. George R. Hart, county clerk, is the only one to be nominated by the county commission, by H. O. Munyon, P. Ier, and the winner of present developments, to be elected in the general election by the voters.

Where Contests Come As the record stands now there are three contests for nominations on the Republican ticket, and three contests for Democratic nominations in Twin Falls county. Besides the Democratic contest for nomination for first district commissioner, George R. Hart and H. O. Munyon, which is a triangular contest in which Sheriff E. F. Prater, candidate for re-election, is opposed by S. B. Elrod and J. S. Kimball, both of Twin Falls. The winner of this contest will meet the Republican nominee, J. B.
