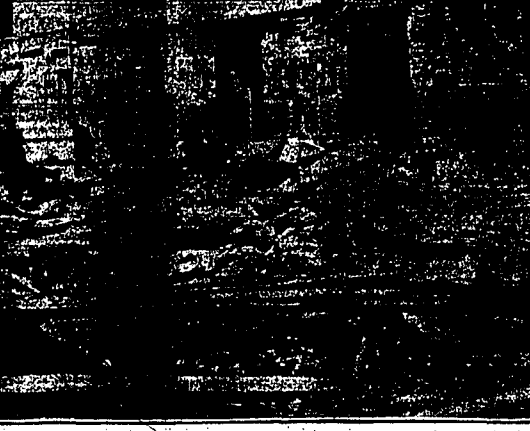

(Continued from Page One) the coming fiscal year. It is \$15,320,000 less than the budget estimates recommended by President Hoover, and \$13,810,000 less than the current year's appropriations.

"In explaining the bill to the House, Representative Ayres, Kansas, Democratic chairman of the appropriations sub-committee that drafted it, said the proposal was "unfiling at this time" to have "further" reactions made because of world-wide conditions.

"World conditions today unhappily are not as inspiring as we might wish," the Kansas said. "The world-wide economic depression is everywhere."

"We have witnessed a conflict in the Orient, which was a direct challenge to the effect of the treaty for the settlement of international disputes by peaceful methods."

"Whatever our individual convictions may be as to the institution of war and the further need for armed conflicts, the very fact that we maintain a military and naval establishment is an admission of its potential recurrence."

"The act of congress yesterday in retreating \$3,000,000 off the Boulder Canyon dam construction fund in the Interior department supply bill was assailed by 'house-organ' and 'labor' criticism by Secretary Wilbur.

"Criticism of the drive for reduced expenditures also arose at both ends of the capitol. Senator Johnson, Republican, California, said the 10 percent cut was a 'cut in the wrong place' and that it was 'not a cut in the right place'.

Chairman McDuffie announced the economy committee would place on the omnibus measure the Byrne bill directing the president to consolidate the war and navy departments into a department of national defense, with an assistant secretary for aviation.

Bohan devoted most of his speech to the record proposal by Smith for a 20-year moratorium on debts.

"If we forget them for 20 years, they will be regarded as outstanding debts," he said. "Whatever the good faith in which the proposal was put forward, it is a proposal for cancellation of the globe."

"There is no question as to who would benefit from the 20-year plan. The American taxpayer could not. The only persons who could possibly benefit would be those who had sold war bonds in Europe."

Bohan said that under Smith's plan for crediting the foreign countries with debt payments on the purchases they make in this country during the 20-year period, the debt would be cancelled even if they did not increase their buying.

"Viewed from any standpoint," he added, "The American taxpayer does not receive any benefit from a proposal of this kind."

Senator Lewis, Democrat, Illinois, who has his state's presidential vote, also attacked the Smith plan, saying it was "part of an insidious conspiracy" to convince this country that it cannot recover until Europe does.

No inclusion was evident in administration quarters as to the tremendous importance on the fact that the British budget included no repayment to receive the 20-year plan was debt. "The whole problem will be gone over thoroughly in London after the Lusignan conference in June, and the British cabinet will be guided on the basis of facts uncovered there."

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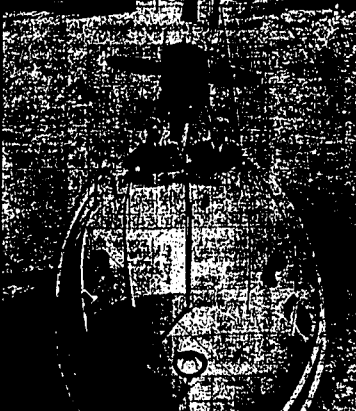
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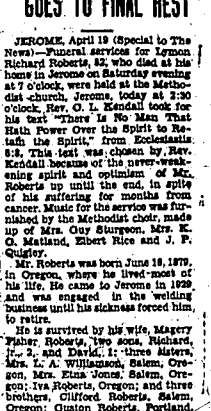

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### Estimates Place Citrus Value In Rio Grand Valley At \$100,000,000

15,000 Persons Care For 7,000,000 Trees in Fast Growing Texas Industry



By ROBERT WEAR (Associated Press Staff Writer) DALLAS, Texas, April 18—Grapefruit may be to some a perverse thing that squirts into one's eye at breakfast or that eludes the cocktail glass at dinner. But its more than that in the lower Rio Grande valley of Texas, where the citrus industry has earned the \$100,000,000 claim—that the estimated value of the 7,000 citrus farms in the area.

And it's still growing—this comparatively new industry in a state which already produces a third of the nation's cotton crop, enough oil to domestic markets, great herds of cattle and wheat by the square mile. In the opposite corner of Texas from the Panhandle has come to light this new 'pot of gold' under the agricultural rainbow.

The valley comprises four counties—Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, and Willacy—with a total area of 3,000,000 acres. About one-third is already under cultivation and another third is arable. The region from Brownsville and Port Isabel on the east to Mission, 70 miles upriver, on the west, is irrigated with irrigation canals and miles of paved highways. Old settlers trace the beginning of citrus growing in the valley to a wandering priest who brought some oranges to children of his diocese 90 years ago.

A community garden of 80 acres for the unemployed has been opened at Bartlesville, Oklahoma, by the Salvation Army. After setting a new high record in 1930, automobile deaths in Kansas showed a decline of 10.8 per cent in 1931. After five years of apparent lifelessness, the legs of a willow tree owned by a Reddy, California, man sprouted leaves this spring.

Oranges, grapefruit, lemons—all have had a part in building a great industry in the Rio Grande valley of Texas, centering in the counties shown on the map. A fair which is shown inspecting part of this year's crop—product of a citrus industry valued at \$100,000,000. seeds are still bearing, but it was not until 1920 that the industry suddenly gained impetus throughout the area. A year or two later the Texas Citrus Fruit Growers' Exchange was organized as a cooperative group. Now it has two smaller cooperatives.
