MINIDOKA FOREST GETS 4000 EVERGREEN TREES

BURLEY, April 23 (Special to The News)—S. S. Stewart, supervisor of the Minidoka national forest, has received 4000 evergreen trees from the Friedman family. About 1000 of these are 1000 yellow pine, from the monument forest service nursery, Colorado. These little seedlings, in a packet weighing hardly 100 pounds, are at Rogerson, awaiting propitious weather for setting out.

Most of the trees will be planted in the Shoshone basin, in quaking aspen shade. Although so very small, they are about four years old. Much care must be exercised in setting out these forest trees, and none but experts familiar with this task can hope to obtain satisfactory results.

Two men on plant from 600 to 750 of the young conifers in a day.
"As an economy measure, the forest service has concentrated their tree nurseries in three places: at Monument, Colorado, in northern Idaho; and at Hailey, Nebraska. Until recently, there were several others, one at Pocatello, at Brigham and Orem, Utah, and other places.

Good for these nurseries is gathered under supervision of forest rangers from timber sales areas. The seed is sowed thickly in rows four or five feet apart, and under lush screens.

News in Twin Falls 19 Years Ago

Taken From The Twin Falls News Files Thursday, April 24, 1913

The largest and most important sale of Idaho irrigation bonds completed in five years has been announced by the Idaho Interstate Commission.

The baseball season for Twin Falls will open formally this afternoon on this date will be either with Pocatello or Idaho Falls. Between now and the opening of the season, preliminary games will be played with neighboring town teams.

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A fitting climax to a most prosperous year was the annual banquet of the Twentieth Century club, held at the hotel, returned the first of the week after a business trip to Salt Lake City.

MEN FOLLOW WOMEN AS WINDOW SHOPPERS

CHICAGO, April 23 (AP)—Oblivious to the howls of screaming German students of the Cologne university commercial college shattered a time-honored idea that women shopped considerably longer before shop windows than men.

CONVENTION PUTS VIEWS ON RECORD IN RESOLUTIONS

Idaho Congress of Parents and Teachers Asserts State Responsibility for Equal Educational Opportunity

The Idaho Congress of Parents and Teachers, with 100 registered delegates in attendance from among 500 members in more than 100 Idaho communities, closed three-day sessions of its twentieth annual convention here yesterday after receiving reports of district presidents and members of department heads, installing newly-elected officers and adopting resolutions setting forth the organization's objectives and attitude with respect to school finance, district operation, and other subjects of advertising and many other issues.

Mrs. Thomas Ogden, Boise, retiring president, turned the gavel over to Mrs. John E. Hayes, Twin Falls, who was elected president for the two-year term. Only newly-elected officers installed yesterday were Hayden, Boise, first vice president; Mrs. Wendell Phillips, Lewiston, fourth vice president; Eugene Kyle, Pocatello, fifth vice president; Mrs. Louis Nagel, Boise, treasurer.

The report of the resolutions committee, presented by Eugene Kyle, praised Mrs. Ogden's service the past three years as president of the organization, and recommended that she be designated as the executive secretary.

Resolutions declared it to be a responsibility of the state government opportunity for all children, and advocated a policy of collection and distribution of school finances in conformity with that view.

They expressed confidence in the patriotic spirit of Idaho teachers and voiced opposition to "inadequate teacher salaries, inadequate school equipment and unnecessary school bigness cuts." During the session Mrs. Kyle suggested that "a plan should be made to permit graduates from high school and college to return to school on an additional term the better to equip themselves for citizenship."

Call for New Legislation
Resolutions urged summer round-up campaigns and periodical physical examinations to be followed by medical, dental care, reactivated endorsement of anti-narcotic legislation, condemnation of cigarette manufacturers' advertising which encourages girls' use of cigarettes, and demand for stronger laws to control indiscriminate sale of deadly weapons.

The committee report, in conclusion, expressed warm appreciation of Twin Falls hospitality.

A public breakfast, Mrs. W. E. Turner, president, presided over at 9:45 A. M. at Pocatello, and was attended by 60 delegates. Mrs. John E. Hayes, newly elected state president, and a vice president of the national organization, and Miss Jean Dinkler, Twin Falls, were the guest women, were speakers.

In addition to the winners of the champion horseman, Jim Colbert, champion best showman, Harry Miller, champion sheepman, John Pierce, champion showman of dairy cows, Dale Banner, champion showman of swine, George Wilson.

Special prizes for exhibitors went to Carl Estep for his pig, a calf, and to Gerald Akse for his pen of chickens.

Bob Smith took first prize for his pen of Duroc hogs and his pen of sheep. Other winning entries of hogs belonged to Jack Buscoe.

Colorful Parade
"As I" class, with its dairy float designed and built by Don Scott and his associates, won first prize for the parade.

Addressing the Future Farmers and their friends at the exhibit hall in the Midway here on Friday and Saturday, Dean E. J. Jiddings of the University of Idaho college of agriculture, pointed out a two-fold value of participation in this event.

"First," he said, "there is a practical value of increased familiarity with necessary agricultural methods, and Idaho is primarily an agricultural state with two-thirds of its population on farms and deriving two-thirds of its annual increment of wealth from farm, livestock and stock raising."

Secondly, he said, "there is a social value of participation in this event."

Novel contests and demonstrations which varied the farm program included a sheep shearing contest in which there were seven entries and which was won by Jim Colbert, and Don Miller second. Will Miller demonstrated horsemanship in plowing of a four-horse team, and three young women, Karline Wale, Alma Parnell and Ruth Reed, took part in a

horsecap riding demonstration. The title of "Best Future Farmer" was won by Carl Estep in an achievement contest in which there were 24 factors including project, average high grade, work at home and at school, leadership ability, citizenship, sportsmanship and personality.

Estep's score was 1976; Ronald Pierce was second with a score of 1907; Donald Miller, third with a score of 1743, and Bob Smith fourth with a score of 1740.

High scores in the judging of livestock of all classes, in which 60 boys competed, were recorded as follows:
