The dollar has become so dear under the "single gold standard" that all debts such as bonds or mortgages contracted previous to the past three years require three to four times the amount of labor, wheat, beans, wool or other products to pay the same amount on interest or principle as was required at the time the obligation was contracted.

Make the Banks of the United States, where bank failures have averaged 200 in the past five to ten years, as safe for American Depositors as the Banks of Canada are safe for Canadian depositors, where they have not had a bank failure in the past seven years.

My Tariff Policy: Give the same protection to the products of the Farm, the Range, the mine, the Forests of the West as is enjoyed by the products of the Industrial East.

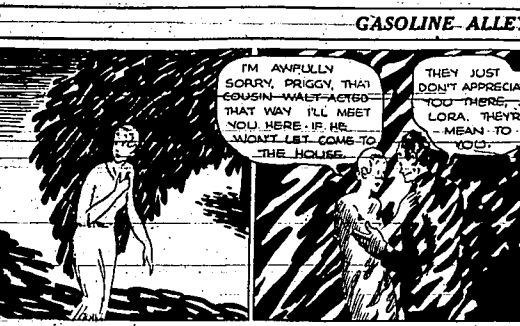

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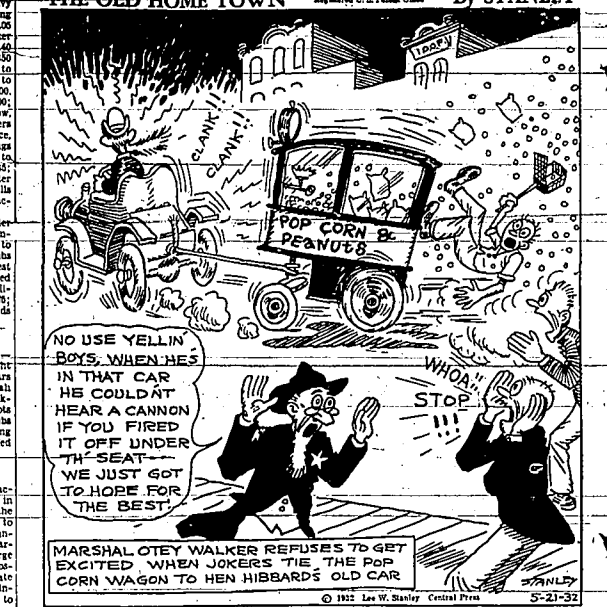
