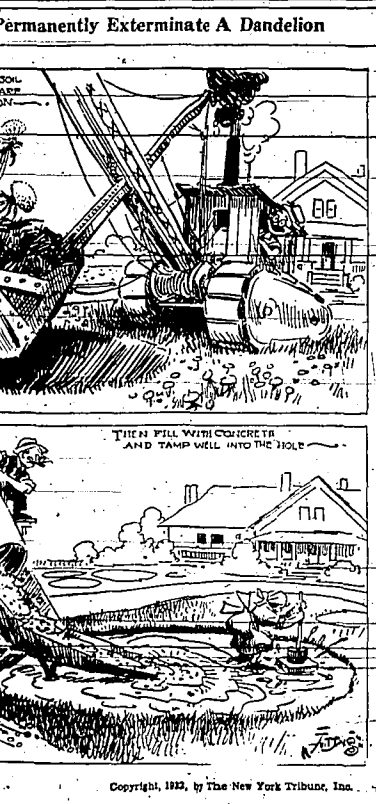

The next year he came to New York City, where he had another uncle, to study, and later came West, shortly after coming to Gooding, about 24 years ago. He built in Denmark sent him funds for his passage home, with an additional liberal amount for spending money. He returned both, with thanks, saying that America was good enough for him. POCATELLO PRIEST SPEAKS UPON TWO CHURCH DOCTRINES

Rev. M. J. McGowan Explains Catholic Dogmas Regarding Sacraments of Baptism and of Penance

Pressing on the program of the day, Trinity Sunday, May 21-18:30, wherein Christ commanded his apostles to go forth and teach and baptize all nations promising that he will be with them until the end of the world.

Rev. McGowan said in substance and in part that the use of water as a cleansing agency in religious ceremonies was used under the old law regarding which special mention was made in Numbers 6-7, and Numbers 19:7-12, and in different places in the psalms.

CASSIA COUNTY LOOKS FOR BIG PRIMARY VOTE

BURLEY, May 21 (Special to The News)—Politicians look for a large vote at the primary election to be held in Cassia county tomorrow. They expect 200 Republican votes to be polled and approximately 700 Democratic.

There was no contest in the Democratic fold except for sheriff and state representative. Three aspirants have filed for sheriff and two for representative. All offices on the Democratic primary ballot are not filed, but at a recent meeting of the Democratic caucus, committee and prominent members of the party it was decided to write in names so that the full ticket could be put in the field.

In the Republican ranks, county commissioner seems to be the most popular office. There are five candidates for the first district, three for the second, and two for the third. There are also three candidates for sheriff and two for coroner. The entire ticket is filed. K. C. Barlow is Republican candidate for state senator, to succeed Roscoe C. Rich, and F. O. Butler is the only candidate for representative to succeed himself.

It is estimated that the primary election will cost the county \$200, and that the regular election will cost a like amount. There are 30 precincts in which election supplies have been sent from the auditor's office, the same number of precincts as in the election two years ago. Of absentee voters, Republican number 23 while only five absentee Democrats have filed application to vote.

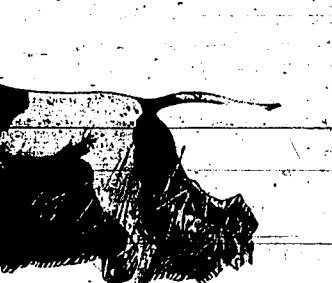

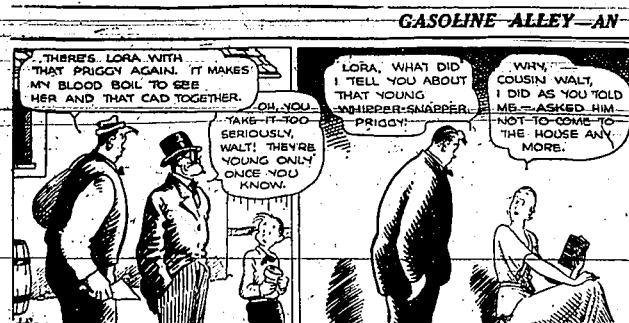

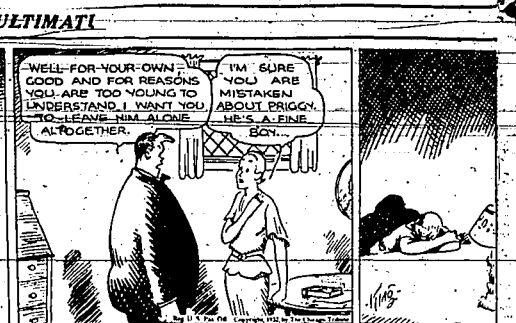
