CANDIDATES FOR COUNTY OFFICES GET MOST VOTES

Official Canvass Shows Contests for Nominations for Sheriff and Prosecuting Attorney Focus Interest

Three candidates for the nomination of sheriff received 2810 votes, which was the largest relative number for the nomination for United States senator, and 100 more than the candidates for the nomination for Democratic nominating election in Twin Falls county last Tuesday, it was a clear indication that when the county commissioners completed their official checking of tally sheets from the county's 27 regular precincts.

Three candidates for the Republican nomination for prosecuting attorney divided 2103 votes, which was 27 more than both candidates for the nomination for United States senator and 100 more than the official count did not change any election returns indicated by unofficial returns compiled by the News-Review.

In the election's closest count, the official count gave John B. Rowley a majority of 175 more votes to J. T. Winder, Twin Falls, for the Republican nomination for prosecuting attorney.

The official count also increased from 28 to 30 the margin of L. J. Johnson, attorney, over F. E. Drake, Republican, for the nomination for prosecuting attorney.

50 WHITE WORKERS DISPLACE MEXICANS

Unemployed Twin Falls Men Get Results Through Fight Day's Agency Operations

Through an agency which unemployed Twin Falls workers set up this week, approximately 50 resident white laborers were sent out yesterday to replace Mexicans at work in Twin Falls district sugar beet fields, J. L. Woodland, in charge of the new employment agency, announced last evening.

The list of unemployed men seeking work in the beet fields has increased to include between 300 and 350 Twin Falls men representing approximately 1200 dependents, Mr. Woodland said.

Through this new agency, unemployed Twin Falls men are being sent to beet growers and supply their requirements with local white labor. Men seeking this work have agreed to quit after the half-day's work if their work is not satisfactory.

Temporary offices for the agency have been provided in the sheriff's office building 1237 where Mr. Woodland is to be found during the daytime. His residence telephone number is 377-W.

THOMAS H. IRWIN ANSWERS SUMMONS

Twin Falls District Farmer For 20 Years and Former Road Board Member, Dies

Thomas H. Irwin, 77, Twin Falls district farmer for 20 years and one of Twin Falls' highly respected commissioners in 1924 and 1925, died suddenly at 4:45 P. M. yesterday at his home three and one-half miles east of Twin Falls, following two heart attacks, one in the early morning and another in the afternoon. The attacks came without warning. Mr. Irwin had suffered from several illnesses with influenza last winter, but apparently was feeling in good health at 4:45 P. M. yesterday and seemed to be quite well.

No arrangements had been made last evening for funeral services, but were arranged from two sources.

Thomas O. Irwin, Sacramento, and Jacob C. Irwin, Palo Alto, California, were made plans to come here with their wives next week for a visit. The body rests at the White mortuary.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Bertha O. Irwin, who served in 1922-1923 as a member of the state house of representatives from this county. He leaves also one daughter, Mrs. M. Thorne, Dobbs Ferry, New York City, and three sons, Carl D. Irwin, Twin Falls; Thomas O. Irwin, Sacramento, an official of the California State Chamber of Commerce, and Jacob C. Irwin, Palo Alto, an official of the California board of athletics control.

Mr. Irwin came with his family to Twin Falls in 1912 from Salina, Kansas, where he had been engaged in farming for 20 years. The family home was established on the farm where he has since resided. He was born at Ashland, Kentucky, February 11, 1859.

He was a member of the Twin Falls Six Six lodge, and until last year he had been a member of the Twin Falls county mutual fire insurance company.
