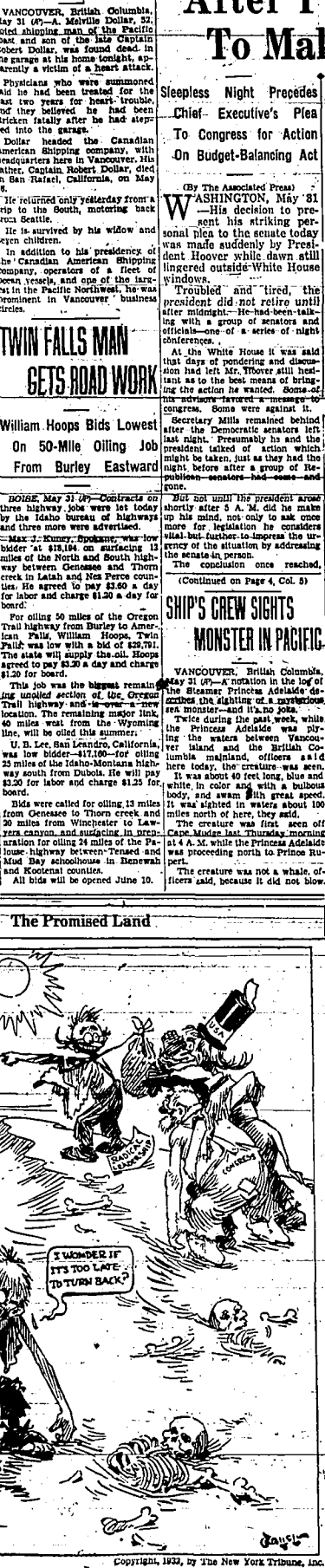

The economic disturbance reported by the president was reflected during the day in Wall street. The stock market went down at the start, revived as the president went to the senate and endorsed the limited sales tax and then fell off again.

The continued downward movement in the stock market during the day, the president said, has been particularly accelerated during the past few days and it relates in some measure to the financial program of the government.

There can be no doubt that support for the other side of the coin continues to grow in the passage of legislation providing for such things as the new income tax, additions to revenues to finance the budget, together with proposals of projects which would greatly increase governmental expenditures, have given rise to doubt and anxiety as to the ability of our government to meet its responsibilities.

Enlarged Ahead. These fears and doubts have been foolishly exaggerated in foreign countries. A similar result has been to create an entirely unjustified run upon the American gold reserve, a serious danger within the past few days despite our national wealth and resources and our unparalleled gold reserves.

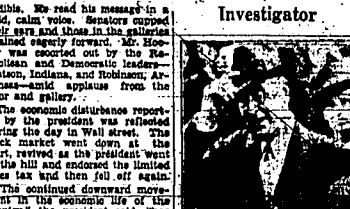
These general manufacturers' excise taxes have not been proposed by the way but have been recommended by the many special interest groups and their leaders in the house of representatives. It is in the hope that immediate passage of the bill would result in the secretary of the treasury recommending a solution to the country and the world of the importance of the American gold reserve and that we are ready to meet our emergencies at any sacrifice. I have now come to favor an extension for the period of the many special excise taxes to a more general manufacturer's excise tax and will support the bill if it is adopted.

Concluding with a note of confidence, the natural wealth of this country is unimpaired and the inherent ability of our people to meet their obligations is being restricted by failure of the government to act. It is time of the essence. Every day's delay makes new wounds and extends them. I come before you in sympathy with the difficulties which the problem presents and in the true spirit of helpfulness. I ask of you to accept such a basis of practical advice as essential to the welfare of our people in your hands at this moment is the answer to the problem presented. I believe we have the capacity to act speedily enough to save itself in emergency. The nation urgently needs unity. It needs solidarity before the world is demonstrating that America has the courage to look its difficulties in the face and the capacity and resolution to meet them.

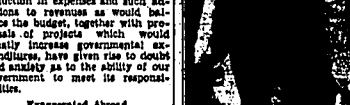

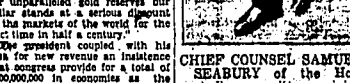

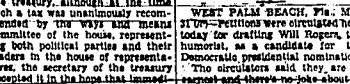

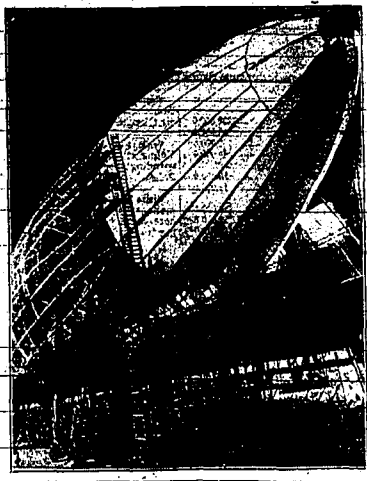

PRINCE'S DREAM OF AMERICA LIGHTENS PARIS FACTORY JOB

Infante Alfonso d'Orleans, First Cousin of Ex-King Of Spain, Works for Ford

By ADLAIDE KEELS (Associated Press Staff Writer) PARIS, May 31.—The Infante Alfonso d'Orleans, first cousin of the former king of Spain, has taken the job he wanted in the suburban Ford automobile factory here.

Starting a few weeks ago as a clerk, he now is a bus-bus-mechanic. Until the fall of the Bourbon dynasty in April, 1931, he was chief of the former king's royal air squadron. He went abroad with American pilots several times when he visited the United States a few years ago.

So while his wealth dwindled with the establishment of the Spanish republic, and the brilliant court at Madrid scattered, his thoughts turned to America, he decided to study the mechanical field there as the most progressive in the world.

The prince went first to Zurich, Switzerland, where his two sons, formerly betrothed to daughters of Alfonso XIII, are working for engineering degrees. He wrote to Henry Ford, asking for a job and was offered a place in the parts factory. He hopes it will eventually lead to a place in Detroit. Besides, he thinks:

"This is a time when everybody should be doing something with his hands."

So the Infante, thin bronzed and 43, has plunged happily into the task of assembling motors.

He begins work at 8, lunches on beef stew in the mechanic's canteen and dines every night with his mother, the Infanta Eulalia, in her convent mansion.

The Infante, who is the aunt of

the ex-king of Spain, had been his greatest ally in his determination to go to America. She bought his work blouse and she canceled social engagements so that she will be home when he returns from work.

The wife, Princess Beatrice of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, who is a sister of Queen Mother Marie of Romania, expects to join him here later.

She is teaching a playmaker. He is paid on the same basis as other local musical teachers and is saving his money to forward his own study.

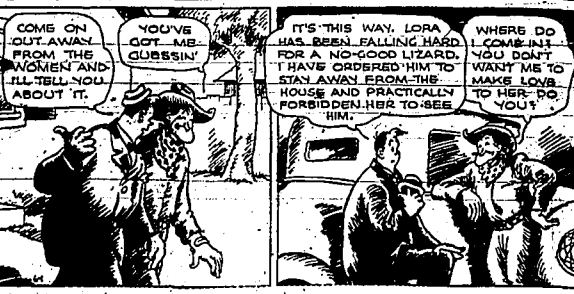

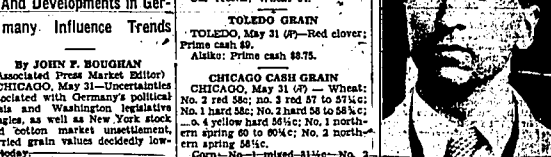

SALVATION ARMY REVIEWS LABORS

TWIN FALLS GIRL DIES AT HOME IN CALIFORNIA

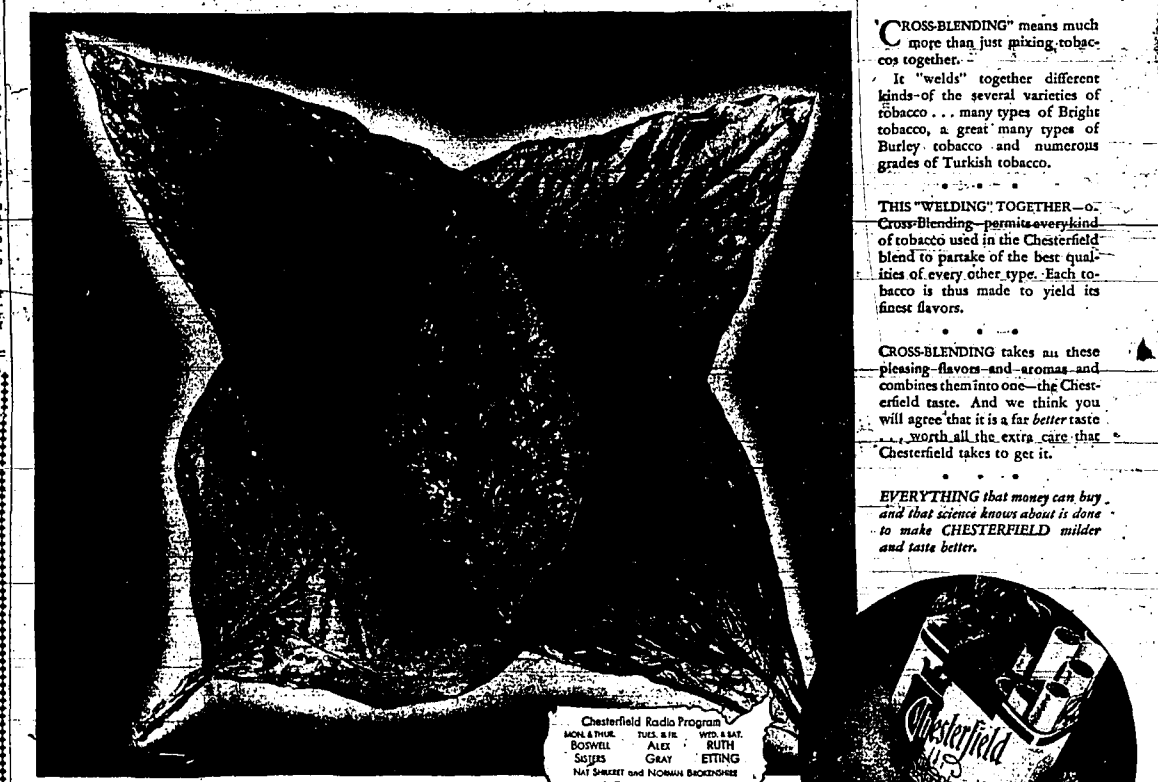
