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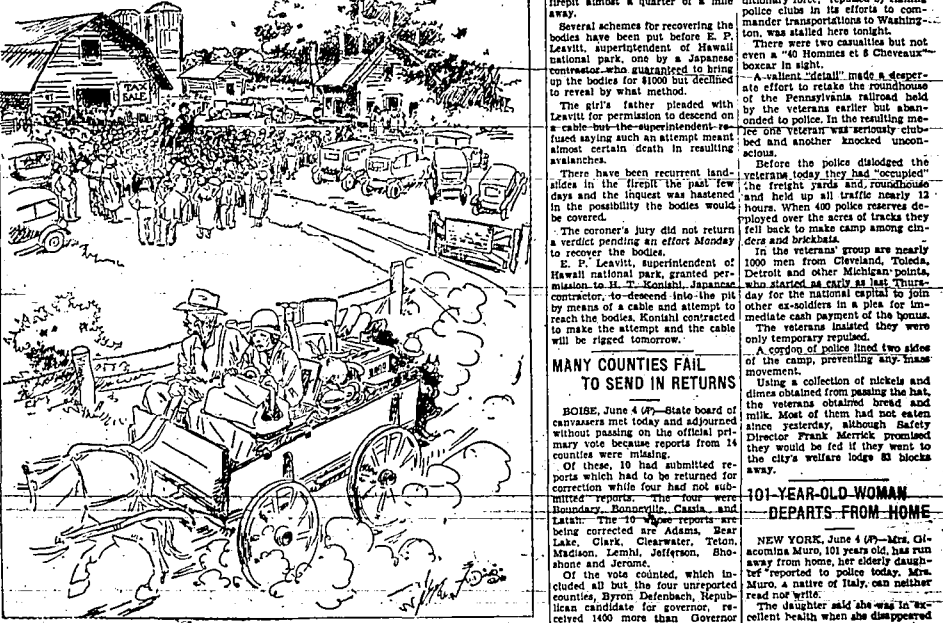
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JEROME'S SOCIAL EVENTS FLOURISH

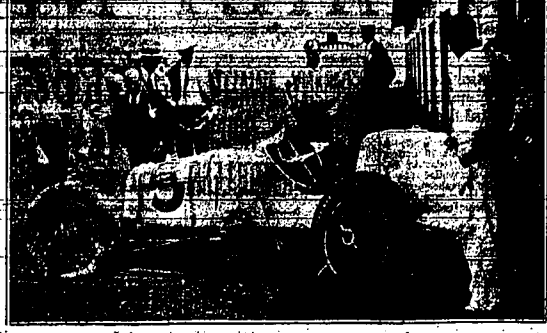

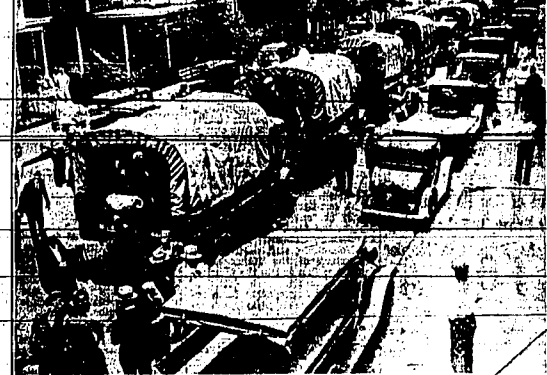

SALT LAKE CITY, June 4 (Special to The News)—James MacDonald, 34, University of Utah student and a native of Albany, New York, was fatally injured in an automobile accident in Emigration canyon near here late yesterday. MacDonald suffered a skull fracture and died two hours after the accident.

Sherman Burt, 22, a companion, received a broken neck and was in a critical condition tonight when the driver of the car, James White, 22, escaped with minor injuries.

The party was en route to a canyon road for a school outing when their car left the highway on a curve and plunged down a steep bank.

JACKSON RESERVOIR STORAGE INCREASES

Inflow of Water Fills All Lower Rights, Report of Canal Company Reveals

JEROME, June 4 (Special to The News)—Jackson lake reservoir inflow of water, due to the heavy spring run-off, had filled all lower rights by June 4, according to an official report of the canal company officers.

The inflow filling, they reported, included 10,000 acre-feet of the lower rights, owned by the North Idaho Canal company in the bottom of the reservoir. And from now on all inflow will be a credit to the storage capacity in the Jackson lake reservoir owned by the North Idaho Canal company and the Twin Falls Canal company, in the approximate ratio of 3 to 1, respectively.

The total capacity of the Jackson lake reservoir is 948,000 acre-feet, of which the North Side, both upper and lower, total 524,000 acre-feet.

There has been much rain in the upper country in the recent past months and as present time there are still four feet of snow remaining on the Lewis lake divide, official state.

Minutes, mostly routine, were discussed at a recent meeting of the canal board of directors, held in Jerome, when it was learned that the exact capacity of the upper storage section is 312,000 acre-feet; but the grand total water storage capacity of the works is 816,000 acre-feet.

Polish Corridor Keeps Nations Of All Eastern Europe On Edge

Flood of Pro-Polish and Pro-German Propaganda Inundates East Prussia

By LOUIS F. LOCHNER (Associated Press Staff Writer) DANZIG, June 4 (AP)—A flood of pro-Polish, pro-Polish and pro-German propaganda is inundating East Prussia, the Polish Corridor, West Prussia, and the "free city" of Danzig.

Tons and tons of pamphlets are being printed to point out what Danzig is civilization link behind the political intention of the League of Nations.

Seen through German eyes, the creation of the Polish corridor has severed the province of East Prussia from the Reich about as effectively as if New Hampshire were to become a part of Canada, leaving Danzig an island.

Seen through Polish eyes, the corridor is a mere strip of land, the mere obnoxious territory, the mere Polish character of the coveted strip, says the Poles.

More recently, whispering campaigns have started on both sides. The Germans pass along the fact that Poland is plotting to swallow East Prussia.

Demagogy, pamphlets in English, in German, in French; pamphlets with and without illustrations, pamphlets with maps tracing the vicissitudes of the corridor through the centuries, are being mailed to the territories.

A few months previously Polish leaders had delivered fiery speeches in the Polish press, where the fact was once German, serving no purpose that every Poles would give up.

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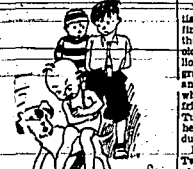

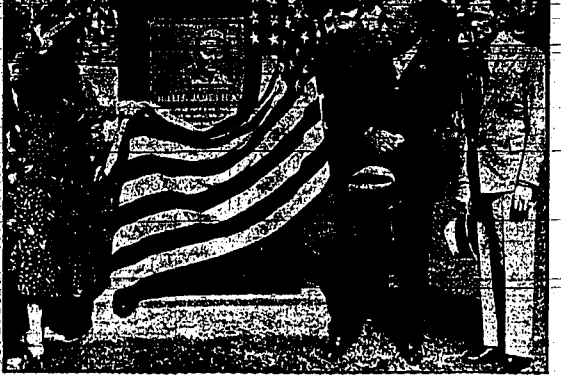
