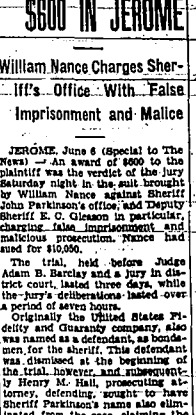

Grid Rules Dictators Urge Coaches To Embrace Safety

Two Noted Figures In Sports Counsel Coaches of Nation

Appeal Goes Out Against Employ of Merit Boys Who Unfit Boys to Play or Who Allow Any Unfairness

By EDWARD J. NEIL (Associated Press Sports Writer)

NEW YORK, June 6.—E. C. Hall, chairman of the National Football rules committee, and Neil Stevens, Yale president of the Football Coaches' association, are joining today to coaches, officials, and athletic directors for united action to prevent another season of the sale of the code, such as football experienced in 1931.

In a statement prepared for the sale of the code, Hall and Stevens asked the coaches not to try to circumvent the new rules passed last fall for the purpose of protecting players. They appealed to officials for strict interpretation for the sake of the code.

Conceding that minor injuries are inevitable in a fast, body-contact game, they declared that these injuries should be treated in direct proportion to the lack of supervision.

Officials' directors were advised to employ only coaches with whom the interest, the welfare, safety and health of the players are paramount, rather than those interested primarily in winning games.

"Supervision to be effective should make certain that the equipment of players is suitable, that no boy who is physically unfit should participate, that injured or over-tired players leave the game after a rest or examination, and that if injuries occur, no matter how trifling they appear, they are attended to promptly and intelligently."

It is not possible to make football free from occasional accidents by mere framing of rules, any more than it is possible to make automobile driving safe from accident by enactment of the traffic laws.

"If however, the playing rules of football as they now stand are supported by all who are in any way connected with the game, football should be safer for those who play it than ever before in its history."

Coaches were urged not to teach players to give or throw themselves through the air in violation of the new rule against the flying tackle and block. Officials were called upon to penalize promptly any player to crawl with the ball, or piling on, as well as illegal use of hands by a defensive lineman on an opponent's head.

It was pointed out that the new rule allowing frequent substitutions would allow a coach to attempt to take advantage for their team's advantage to aid exhausted boys.

The reason of 1931 determined conclusively that certain new and unnecessary hazards were steadily creeping into the game. Information on injuries was gathered and analyzed in restriction of certain practices was the result.

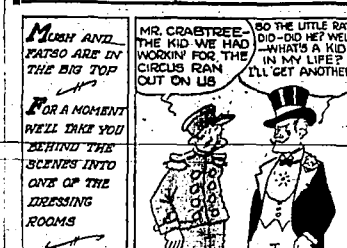

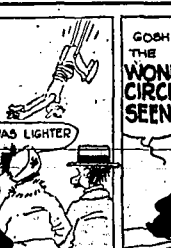
