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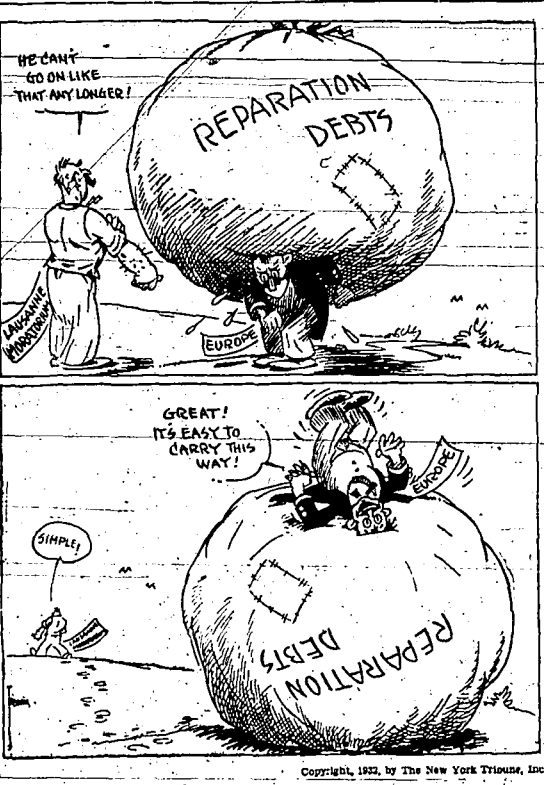

COUNTY'S FARMERS CONTINUE ATTACK ON NOXIOUS WEEDS

Director of Operations Points To Results of Warfare on Three Farms in Twin Falls Vicinity; Shows Results

With carbon bisulphide gas, sodium chlorate spray, and "clean" cultivation, Twin Falls county farmers are continuing the war on noxious weeds that has been waged in this county for nearly 10 years.

The wood was in Twin Falls county on a cash basis, and farmers are required to pay in advance for materials used for this purpose, since the county commissioners decided early in the year against extension of the county's credit in this direction to permit farmers to pay weed war bills with their taxes.

There is no element of compulsion back of this season's weed war, except report to the state quarantine which forbids marketing of products from weed-infested farms, and except, also, a depreciation of value of lands where weeds are permitted to grow and spread.

There are 50 farms, ranging in area from 20 to 150 acres each, in Twin Falls county that are practically valueless because of noxious weed infestation. J. P. Hunt, director of the county noxious weed department, said yesterday.

Combating the weeds this season, Mr. Hunt said, Twin Falls county farmers already have used almost a carload of carbon-bisulphide, which may be applied effectively at any stage of plant growth. A carload of the gas contains 76 drums of 55 gallons each.

Since the first of this month an active demand has set in for sodium chlorate, used effectively as a spray after foliage has become well developed.

Cost Decline

Cost of the weed war has declined somewhat, Mr. Hunt said, so that it is possible to do for it this season what is costlier to accomplish last year.

The third method of combating weeds, which is "clean" cultivation, involves little or no expense for materials, but persistent application of time and effort. This method in-

WORK PROGRESSES ON HIGHWAY AT BURLEY
