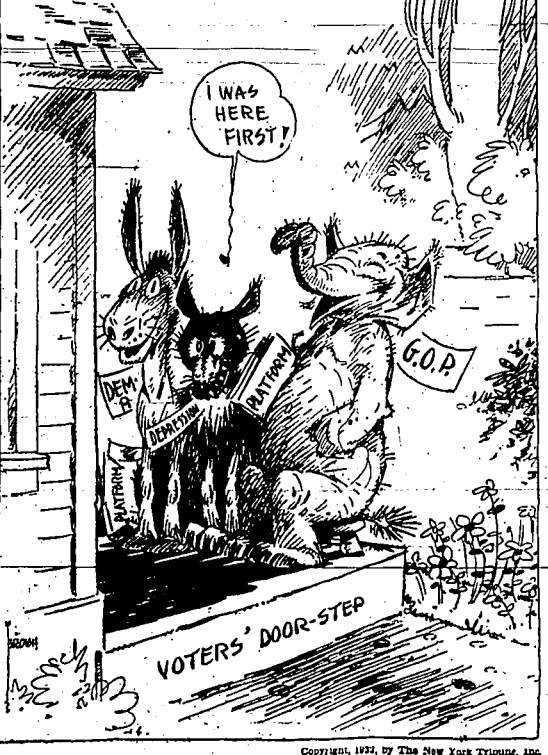

BABY AT CASTLEFORD DROWNS NEAR HOME

CASTLEFORD, July 11 (Special to The News)—Infant, who was two miles west and two miles north of Castleford, was drowned in a ditch which runs about 100 rods from their home shortly after 8 o'clock tonight. The little girl, the youngest of a cluster of five, was about 18 months of age.

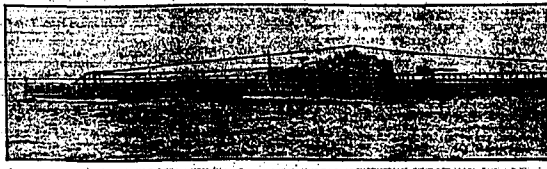

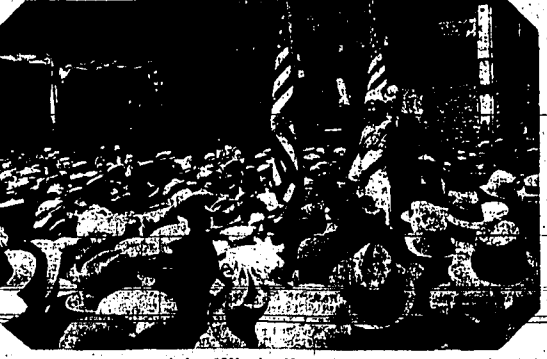

BURLEY, July 11 (Special to The News)—Mary Ann Nelson, wife of Bishop N. C. Nelson, passed away Sunday afternoon about a noon at the Rupert hospital, following an operation for gall stones and obstruction of the bowels. She had had an operation for appendicitis about 18 years ago and has had trouble since. She suddenly became ill last Tuesday. She was taken to this hospital Sunday morning and the operation was performed at the Johnson mortuary, awaiting the funeral which will be conducted from the Latter-Day Saints Tabernacle Thursday at 3 P. M. Mrs. Nelson was born in England, December 27, 1863. She came to the United States when a girl. She was united in marriage to N. C. Nelson 31 years ago in the Salt Lake City Endowment House. The family came to Burley shortly after this tract was open to settlers. Four children have preceded her in death, Mrs. Dorothy Nelson Thorndick, Joseph, Dorothy, who died at the age of 16 and Mrs. Annie Millard. 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CATTLE ON MINIDOKA RESERVE LOOK GOOD

Cattle look like corn fed stock, he avers, and sheep were also excellent condition. Three shipments of lambs recently left the reserve, of four cars each containing, that weighed 25, 24 and 27 pounds on the market. They all went to the butchers, with none out for feeders, and were unusually fat for this early in the season. Ranges on the lower parts of the reserve are better than for many years. The foothills are covered with many varieties of perennials, and indications are that there will be a huge seed crop insuring plenty of feed there under ordinary climatic conditions. The upper ranges are still wet, and the soil is cold. Water is tumbling down from snow-drifts in every draw. The soil is absorbing its normal water capacity as used to prevail in times of abundant precipitation. Range feed on these upper reaches will be abundant, and sheep-rangers and grazers are permitted to go to feed by moving stock up higher in the hills.

BURLEY EXPECTS 70 FIREMEN AT MEETING

BURLEY, July 11 (Special to The News)—A group of southern Idaho firemen will meet in convention here Sunday, July 17, with an estimated 70 members and 70 wives of the Southern Idaho Firemen's association. These meetings are held three times a year, in May, July and October. The last meeting was in Shoshone. At a business session, starting in the morning, Robert Stewart, mayor of Burley, will explain details of the fire department, including storage and pressure and pump capacity. Seth Harper, Cassia county assessor, will speak on valuation and fire tax, reduced to a per capita basis. Paul Mueller, Burley, swimming, will explain methods of construction of persons threatened with drowning and suffocation. A representative of the rating bureau from Boise will also attend the gathering. Visiting ladies will be entertained at a boating party in the afternoon, and the department will put on a demonstration with fire lighting equipment. In the evening there will be a banquet. All meetings will be under direction of Fred Margetta, Rupert fire chief and president of the association.

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TAX COLLECTIONS DROP SOME IN CASSIA COUNTY

BURLEY, July 11 (Special to The News)—Although second installment of taxes collected by Lawrence Dunn, Cassia county treasurer, were considerably greater than anticipated, the total amount collected this year fell 13 per cent short of last year's total. Total collections for the real property tax in 1932, before the books were closed, amounted to \$173,163 for the first installment and \$17,000 for the second installment; out of a total of \$494,500 to be collected. This collection amounts to 87.3 per cent of the total due. Total collections last year reached \$226,938 for the first installment, and \$161,166 for the second, out of a total assessment of \$330,993, or 72 per cent of the whole. Treasurer Dunn recalled that taxpayers legally established allowing lawyers a little additional time for payment for a few days after the deadline. This action is a little out of the ordinary, and was taken by reason of the spring financial situation.

500 PERSONS HEAR DEMOCRATIC TALKS

Senatorial Candidate and Wife of Governor Ross Address Filner Meeting

PHILIP, July 11 (Special to The News)—That a cause can hardly be sold unless it is presented in a way to represent it, was the thought developed by James P. Pope, mayor of Boise and Democratic candidate for United States senator, at the national convention held by 500 persons held in the Orange hall at the Filner building tonight under the auspices of the Twin Falls county Democratic Women's club, speaking on the subject of "The National Convention," Mrs. C. Ben Ross, wife of Governor Ross, was the featured speaker.

TWIN FALLS READY FOR ACCOUNTING WITH BOND HOLDERS

Supreme Court's Decision Paves Way for Early Distribution of Local Improvement District Funds

Twin Falls city administration will ask for appointment of a trustee to distribute approximately \$100,000 among holders of some \$400,000 in local improvement district paying bonds. It was indicated when E. M. Sweeney, city attorney, told members of the council at a regular meeting last night that bond holders would probably present their claims within the next two weeks. Idaho's supreme court, he said, has lately decided money available for payment of local improvement district bonds is to be distributed pro rata among the bond holders.

Distribution of these funds, he views, would entail considerable labor and expense of which the city treasurer's office should be relieved. He would like to see the trustee discharged his obligation in respect to local improvement district bonds when it would be necessary to retire them. The bonds in question matured two years ago.

Containing reproduction of financial statements and action as recommended by E. O. McManis, accountant, who recently completed an annual audit of the city's records and accounts, and voted to charge off \$11,416 of taxes for 1927 and other years against property which had gone to tax sale or is held by the county subject to sale. There remained \$10,018.87 of delinquent taxes for 1927 and subsequent years. The city treasurer's June report shows receipts totaling \$27,786, with \$116,740 payable on hand at the close of the month and \$23,400 on hand at the close. Sundry assessment collections totaled \$100,000 of 1928 collections made by the treasurer's office during the month.

Subject to the building inspector's approval, council voted authorization to the Independent Gas and Oil company to install a 12,000-gallon storage tank to replace a 12,000-gallon tank at the corner of Third street and Third street.

The local power commission, according to a communication read at last evening's meeting, has requested the city to have the Murrain irrigation district's application for license for a water project on Snake river, near Twin Falls, and to receive objections up to August 31, next, against issuance of the license.

The city had 11,000 of Pacific sals up to about two years ago. The Murrain district's project provides for construction of a diversion dam on Snake river two miles above the mouth of Rock creek, canal, intermediate reservoir, power house, diversion dam and canal on Rock creek transmission line to a point near Miller where power would be used to pump water to the district's irrigation project of approximately 27,000 acres in the Hansen, Pacific areas of Twin Falls and Cassia counties.
