In connection with the Democratic financing plans, it was recalled that John J. Rauh, who was national chairman, estimated the 1932 campaign would cost \$10,000,000, less than was spent in 1928. Roosevelt managers, however, are not contemplating the expenditure of that much money today. No definite sum will be set until the organization plans have been approved. The "victory" campaign has as its goal the collection of \$1,200,000, \$400,000 to wipe out the debt incurred during the four years of the work done since then, and \$800,000 to make a "flying start" this fall. So far about \$725,000 has been raised, including Taxator's contribution of one \$100,000 obligation for July.

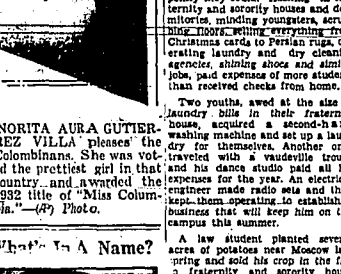
