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BABCOCK HUNTS UP LAW FOR DRAINAGE DISTRICT

BOISE, July 14 (AP)—Drainage districts aren't entitled to a rebate on their pumping power under the terms of the Idaho-Hawaii law, Attorney General Fred J. Babcock told the department of law enforcement today.

The question was raised by drainage district Number 4 of Canyon County. The district pumps about 5000 acres last year, of which 1800 acres last year were sold to an irrigation district, 3000 acres were picked up by canal users of water within the district and 1000 acres went to waste.

The first and last item the attorney general said, clearly are not entitled to the exemption provided in the kilowatt tax act, since irrigation water pumped for sale is specifically exempt from the exemption and drainage water is not used for irrigation. As to the water picked up from the drain ditches, since the water is not pumped for the purpose of irrigation but of drainage, the exemption does not apply.

"It clearly appears," said the opinion, "that the use of such water for irrigation is not the object or end which has caused the exemption of electrical energy for pumping."

"The controversy here is not between the district and the power company, but between the district and the state; hence the application of the rule that exemptions must be strictly construed. Nor does such a construction impose any burden upon the district under the facts that now appear. The district has had no increase in rates and no additional burden because of the law."

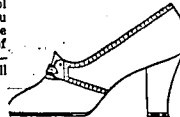
