Out of \$1,421,887.50, Only \$971,263.19 Gets in Collectors at Time of Deadline

Out of \$1,421,887.50 taxes for 1931 charged for collection by Twin Falls county treasurer, \$971,263.19, or 68 per cent of the total, had been collected when the time limit for payment of the second installment was reached.

Figures given out at the county treasurer's office yesterday, showed first installment 1931 tax collections totalling \$579,283.10, with collections of the second installment of taxes for that year totalling \$391,980.09, making a grand total of \$971,263.19.

The proportion of 1931 collections was 12 per cent over 1930 tax collections. The reason showing that 60 per cent of the 1931 total of \$1,263,571.25 taxes charged for collection, \$1,235,318.41, or 60 per cent, had been collected when the time limit expired last year.

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Admission Sales To Olympics Set New High Mark

With Opening Date 10 Days Away Advance Ticket Disposal Passes 1,300,000 Single Admittances

By PAUL ZIMMERMAN (Associated Press Sports Writer) LOS ANGELES, July 20.—With the opening day of the 10th Olympic Games less than two weeks away, the advance ticket sales passed the 1,300,000 single admittance mark today, thereby exceeding all attendance marks of the modern games.

Zack Farmer, general manager of the local Olympic committee, in announcing this, predicted the Olympic stadium with its capacity of 105,000 seats, would be a sellout for the opening ceremony July 30.

More than 100 Texans have leased an entire hotel here, and are coming in one group to attend the commonwealth classic. Approximately 1000 visitors from Japan are expected within the next few days.

The opening ceremony is expected to be the most attended of the Olympic games, with an estimated 100,000 spectators.

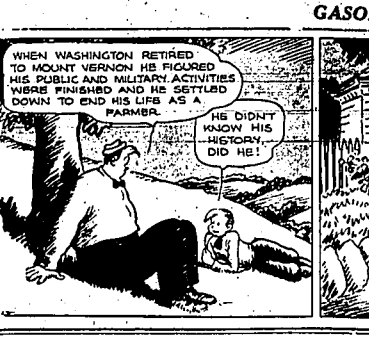

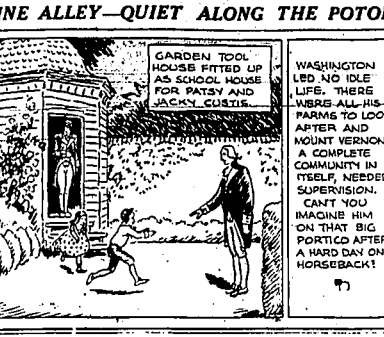

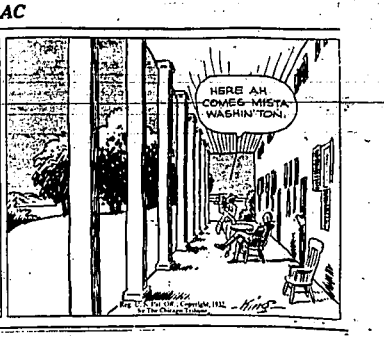

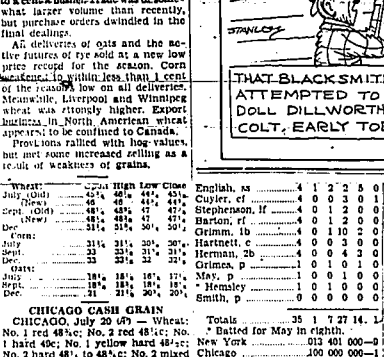

ACCUSED MEN WIN LIBERTY AT TRIAL

Twin Falls Pair Convicted Jury With Explanation Of Midnight Foray

Twin Falls police court went into a night session last night at trial of two Twin Falls men, G. P. Hartley and W. O. Tucker, held on vagrancy charges after they were found with two empty gummy sacks in the vicinity of the Jerome Cooperative creamery at 1 o'clock Sunday morning.

A six-man jury found the accused men not guilty, returning the verdict a few minutes after receiving the case at 9 P. M.

One of the accused men, G. P. Hartley, presented the defense trial, questioning witnesses, testifying in his own behalf and finally delivering an argument to the jury. E. M. Greer, city attorney, waived argument explaining it was a matter of policy to take no advantage of an accused person conducting his own defense.

Evidence indicated that Mr. and Mrs. Tucker and their daughter and Mr. Hartley were engaged in picking pinches at the Hartley home from 10 o'clock Saturday night to 1 o'clock Sunday morning, and that the two men left them to go to the Orson Short-Line coal chutes to pick up coal. They staged on this mission at that time, it was explained, because both families planned to pick cherries the next day.

J. F. Peterson, night man at the creamery, testified he called the police when he observed the two men in the vicinity of the creamery, and he had been with a gun, until the officers arrived. Some money had been stolen at the creamery some time before, he said.

E. J. Finch, county commissioner, said both Hartley and Tucker had received assistance during the winter, and that both men had been employed in the county's sage brush and wood cutting crews. Mr. Hartley testified he had lived in and about Twin Falls for 20 years. Mr. Tucker had been here for a year and a half. He is a carpenter and testified he had been employed recently at a local seed warehouse.

The case was set for trial at 10:30 P. M. yesterday, but selection of the jury occupied an hour's time, and the trial was resumed after a recess for dinner. J. W. Bouton, police magistrate, presided in this case at his first jury trial.
