Chief Executive Signs Bill To Invigorate Business, Increase Employment and Relieve Human Destitution (By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 21.—President Hoover signed into law today the gigantic federal relief bill that masses \$3,800,000,000 in cash for the relief of the unemployed. The bill is the largest ever passed by Congress and is the most comprehensive relief measure since the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and other agencies were created.

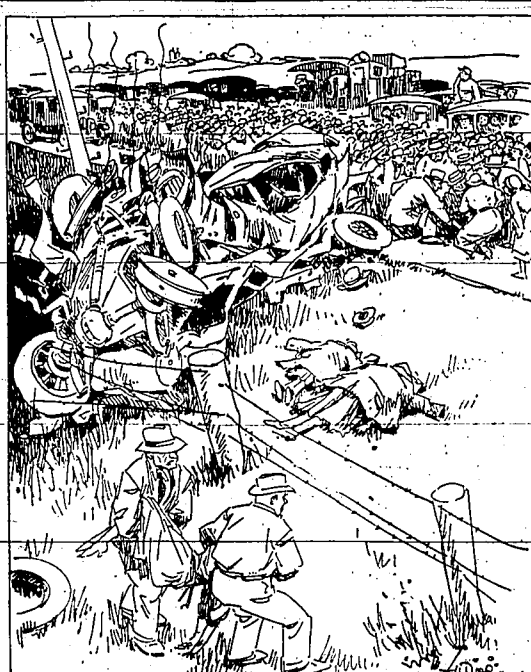

### UNEMPLOYMENT IMPROVES IN MONTH

#### Although Surplus of Labor Still Remains, Report Reveals Slight Improvement

WASHINGTON, July 21. (Special to The News)—Report of employment conditions in Idaho for the month of June was better today than for the corresponding month of last year. John R. Atkins, supervising director of the United States employment service, showing a slight seasonal improvement in the slight of the unemployed.

**GENERAL**—There was a marked increase in the demand for farm help in June at several thousand men and women were required for picking green peas and berries and for other farm work in the hay fields. A large number of men were employed in place of women, but there was little activity in the quarantined mines. Telephone construction was active in several sections. A number of men, practically all the lumber mills worked continued below normal and there was a surplus of labor in most sections of the state. Residential building continued on a restricted scale.

**TRADING**—Several thousand men and women were employed in picking green peas and small fruits and the demand for help was also abnormally high. The farm-labor surplus was maintained in most sections. Piece-making continued on an active basis, while the lumber mills operated on restricted schedules. Building was limited to residential work in the state.

**IDAHO FALLS**—The care and harvesting of various farm crops provided work for a large part of the resident unemployed during the past 30 days. A limited program of building was in progress, principally repairs and remodeling. Produce warehouses and creameries operated on a restricted basis, while the seed houses were closed.

**LEWISTON**—The lumber mills continued operations on restricted schedules. Very little activity was reported in building. Normal schedules were maintained by the creameries, warehouse and meat-packing plants. A labor surplus continued throughout the month.

**COUER D'ALENE**—Some of the lumber mills operated on part-time schedules. While others remained closed. Several of the large lead-silver mines were inactive and others operated part time with reduced forces.

### ACCUSED MAN GETS SENTENCE DELAYED

Steve Anderson, Convicted of Burglary of Warehouse, Asks for Time

Steve Anderson, 37, of Red Owl, South Dakota, convicted of first-degree burglary in connection with a burglary of a warehouse at Rogers, the night of June 30, was sentenced by Judge W. A. 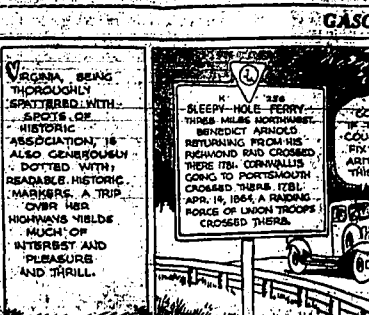

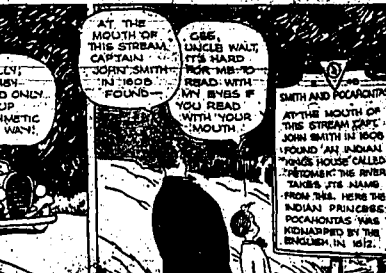

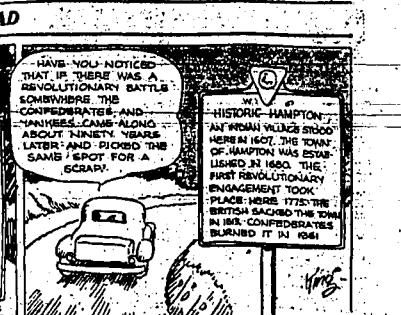

Outstanding individual rams listed for the sale are two Hampshire studs owned by H. L. Finch, Soda Springs, a Suffolk stud from E. T. Brown, Rupert, and two Hampshire studs and one Suffolk stud from the University of Idaho.

For 11 consecutive years this sale has been in operation, disposing of approximately 1000 rams to range operators and purebred breeders of the United States. The quality of the rams for this sale were carefully selected by a judging committee from the best of the state, which insures an excellent offering of the best of Idaho rams.
