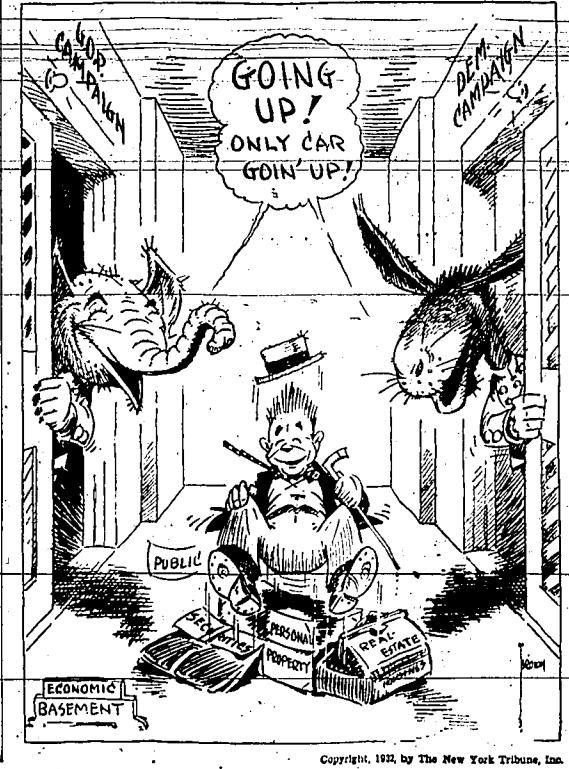

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ROOSEVELT PLANS CAMPAIGN SPEECH

New Yorker Governor Intends To Address 100,000 Followers in New Jersey

NEW YORK, July 22 (AP)—In New Jersey, heart of the Roosevelt revolution and the New York stronghold, Governor Roosevelt will launch his personal campaign for the presidency August 1.

Democracy's standard-bearer will begin 10 weeks of intensive traveling, speech-making and campaigning, which will culminate in New Jersey, that day to address a rally.

If the expectations of Jersey leaders are correct, 100,000 people will greet his nominee on that occasion.

Sixteen days earlier President Hoover had called his campaign with his speech of acceptance from New York.

The Roosevelt announcement came from New York, where the city, South by floor leader in Chicago, who has drawn the entire support of Jersey organizations behind the man he has chosen to endorse.

Persistent but unverified reports are that the season's rally will be held at a public reception of Roosevelt and Smith.

The "happy warrior" of 1928 and 1932 will have a minor role since his followers fought at Chicago. Neither has Smith made any attempt to show his attitude toward his former opponent's prospects.

Smith's close associates would say about the prospect of his going to Seattle, where 100,000 rallied him in 1932.

"He has received no invitation yet," said James A. Farley, New York manager, continued his drive to entice the white-haired support of all who were with Governor Roosevelt.

From New Jersey, where he had staged his sportsman-like escapade, the energetic Farley went to Philadelphia to address a Smith delegation to Chicago.

In a hotel at Springfield he spent hours with Governor Roosevelt, who placed the 1932 party leader in nomination.

Farley, who is the only anti-Roosevelt leader on record as a supporter of Roosevelt.

"Governor A. E. and I have gone on the situation very carefully and I have arranged for Governor A. E. to meet Governor Roosevelt in Albany next week. After that visit Governor A. E. will be in New York by auto and I will be in New York by airplane."

Until Everett Sanders, Republican national chairman, arrives here next week to round up the party, the Eastern campaign, the Hoover-Smyth drive is making time here.

Farley's resignation as national chairman of the Republican party is a blow to the party's morale.

STARK CASE PROBE BRINGS INDICTMENT

Counsel for 13 Policemen Get Instructions to Produce Clients in Court

NEW YORK, July 22 (AP)—Sealed indictments were handed up tonight by the grand jury that investigated the "third-degree" death of Hyman Stark.

Prosecutors charged that Stark's death was instructed to produce them in court Monday morning, when the bills will be opened. Preliminary charges against the policemen ranged from second-degree murder down to assault on a jury. Four of them were accused of murder.

Alexander Drangel, fellow prisoner of Hyman Stark, who said he and two others arrested with Stark for alleged robbery and assault of a detective's mother, went before the grand jury handcuffed.

Inspector Frank King insisted that he merely suffered from hysteria. Meanwhile in Griffin, Georgia, a court case is being prepared for involuntary manslaughter for the death of a Negro convict.

STATE'S TAX BILL TROUBLES COUNTY

Attorney Gets Request for Opinion Whether Warrant Fund Can Be Used to Pay

Twin Falls county is short approximately \$42,000 of money to pay an \$28,000 state tax bill that fall due on Monday, July 11.

This became known yesterday when it was learned that the county attorney had been asked for an opinion whether money in the county's warrant redemption fund could be used, legally, to pay the state tax bill.

With the possible exception of the warrant redemption fund, the county has no money in any fund which will pay the state taxes. There is no money in current expense, county hospital or county fair funds, and money collected for general school fund and bond interest and sinking fund, is regarded as a trust which may not be used for this purpose.

The state property tax assessment is made not against individual tax payers, but against the county, and the county is held liable for payment, whether or not the individual property owners pay. The state tax is payable in two installments, one in January and another in July.

The county has levied, but has not been able to collect sufficient tax money to meet the state tax bill due. There is on hand in the county's state tax fund approximately \$37,000, which is not enough to meet the state's claim.

What the state can do to enforce collection of the state tax is not quite clear.

The smoker had been placed in the truck without any kind of fireproofing fire insurance side which produced the smoke.
