Secretary - Pioneers And Citizens Farmers at Celebration Sponsored by Buhl and Wendell Churches

(Special to The News) TWIN FALLS, July 22.—An address by Governor C. Ben Ross, Idaho, on the general topics of pioneer and agricultural life was the highlight of the summer day celebration today sponsored by the Buhl and Wendell churches of the Clear Lake section of the church of Jesus Christ, Latter-Day Saints.

More than 1000 persons from surrounding places were present at the event, as the Clear Lake Golf and Country Club, near Clear Lake, was the scene of the celebration. The governor's address was the first of the day. He spoke for 45 minutes, and his address was the most interesting of the day.

Schaaf Wins Decision Over Uzudun In 5-Round Battle

Fans to Big Bowl**

Jack Sharkey's Personal Entry in Heavyweight Title Lists Fails to Satisfy Handful of Fight Faithful

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN BOWL, NEW YORK, July 23—Burying the hatchet in the heavyweight title fight, belted his way to a 15-round, 50-minute, rough and tumble duel starting a new round of elimination in the present standing of the various heavyweight contenders.

One of the smallest crowds in Madison square arena history, a scant 6000, all but lost in the vast reaches of the big bowl—alone, and, at night, under the long table. From the sound of the boss at the end it would have been the continuation of both warriors.

There were no knockdowns and no real exciting moments. The ninth, fourteenth and fifteenth rounds, the two best punches were counted. The fight had a couple of elephants in a death struggle, ploughing up the resin with massive arms, and the other—laboriously—about the waist.

Schaaf, a brassy blonde of average build, was appointed, as it was earlier this season in winning a close decision fight over Max Baer, to fight with young Stanley Forede. He held desperately at times, was content to let his opponent carry him the way he liked it, and not until the final round did he cut loose with the punching of which he was capable.

Finishes Even

The time was short, however, and Schaaf started early though badly shaken and chopped up about the head.

Uzudun did his best work in the middle rounds, bobbing inside Schaaf's left hand to swing sweeping left punches.

The Associated Press score sheet gave Schaaf eight rounds, Uzudun five and even, Schaaf weighed 210, Uzudun 185.

Arthur Hutnick, young New York heavyweight, who had been knocked out tonight over Jack McCarthy, Boston, substituted as Jack Forede's third round opponent.

McCarthy battered McCarthy for two rounds and in the third the Boston boy suddenly pulled out of a clinch and ran like a hare. A doctor found he had dislocated his shoulder.

Uzudun weighed 183 pounds, McCarthy 182.

Donald (Red) Barry, Washington, who had been scheduled to fight Frankie Simms, Cleveland, 207½, in a disputed six-round match, was replaced by young Jimmy Braddock at fight eight rounds to win an easy decision. There was no action. Braddock weighed 177½; Simms 181.

Mickey Walker Whips Italian With One Blow

Seven inches smaller than his opponent, Walker disposed of the Italian without even musing his hair, a right to the jaw ending the battle after 1 minute to seconds of fighting.

Only three real blows were landed, a couple of lefts to the body and then a short, parrying right. Ruggirello flattened out and had to be carried to his corner.

The semi-final, Mylan Bass, 156, Baltimore, knocked out "Booby" McDeade, 156, Harrison, New York, in 214 of the first round.

The purse of both Walker and Ruggirello were held up by John H. Wood and Joseph Maloney, officials of the state athletic commission.

Neither would make a statement, but announced there would be a hearing of the principals and their managers with Commissioner George Kierwan tomorrow.

Walker is managed by Jack Kearns, who formerly piloted Jack Dempsey, while Ruggirello is directed by Joe Weis.

Hamans Trounces Ramage in Hard 10-Round Fight

WRIGHTFIELD, LOS ANGELES, July 23 (AP)—Steve Hamans, Eastern collegiate heavyweight, plucked back Lee Ramage's ear tonight to win a thrilling 10-round decision before 11,000 wildly cheering fans.

In the semi-windup, Joe Glick, San Francisco, won a 10-round decision over David Velasco, Mexico City. Glick came in at 145, and Velasco at 147.
