FIRE LICKS WAY THROUGH CAMPS

(Continued From Page One)

The travel to the war department for the purpose of securing the necessary papers for the veterans was a long and arduous one. Some of the veterans, however, because the crowded conditions of the national guard camp led to the veterans when they first came to Washington.

As the doughboys pushed along through the smoke they met the firemen who had been seen in Camp Marks at the main entrance into Anacostia, (late, where the camp was located, here a hundred or so doughboys stood and yelled, "if you want us to move come and push us.")

The soldiers, moving slowly but steadily forward, came and bustled. About the middle of the camp two troops of cavalry moved on and among the burning shacks, their figures silhouetted against the fire-lit sky.

It was just after midnight when the last of the more defiant veterans were ordered from the field by the determined infantrymen.

A considerable group of the veterans, who had been in the field for several days, had gathered around a big American flag. They gave ground only when the infantrymen with fixed bayonets pressed them and they finally out onto the slopes overlooking the burning Anacostia.

Hundreds of the veterans sat at tent and stum in the "tailroad" embankment, watching the conflagration.

A dozen tear gas bombs were tossed into a group of veterans who were slow in leaving the area.

There were no particularly hard feelings against the soldiers. Some veterans even spoke to the sergeant, McArthur, whom they described as having tears in his eyes when he threatened them asking them to leave peacefully.

A group of veterans collected in front of a police precinct in Anacostia and there was a few boys and threats but police dispersed them after a mild scuffle and a couple of arrests.

Some of the veterans headed toward Camp Bartlett, where a private tract of land was available for use, but scores continued to tramp the streets of Anacostia, many of them in a belated mood.

There were several families standing on street corners, and at one intersection two little children were sleeping in a doorway.

So heavy was the barrage of gas bombs that the fumes not only covered the open air, but also the camp had been found their way into some of the adjacent buildings.

At a hospital, Edward Brown, the day's first casualty, was reported in a critical condition with no better than an even chance for his life.

Some police victims of veterans' brickbats were nursing lesser injuries.

MIDNIGHT MEETING LEADS TO ATTACK

Buhl Man Tells Magistrate Farmer Carrying Jug Slashed—Him—With Knife
