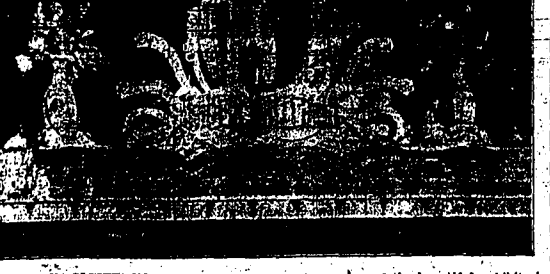

# NAZARENE PASTOR SPEAKS ON STATE OF SOUL OF LOST

Rev. Herschel Murphy in Evening Evangelical Sermon Makes Application Of Text of Holy Writ

Speaking on the subject, "The Lost Soul," and talking for his theme Mark 8:35: "What shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" Rev. Murphy, pastor of the Twin Falls Church of the Nazarenes in his evangelistic sermon Sunday evening, dwelt on the condition of the lost, said in part:

"Lost! Sinking beneath the frown of an unloving God; breathing the fiery billows of dark damnation as long as the cycles of time shall roll by in one endless procession; lost in eternity's night; no sun, no moon, no star of hope will ever rise to send a gleam of consolation down the pathway safe over the divide of world's night."

"The rider of the pale horse has long since called for you; his cold clammy fingers have been laid upon your heart stalling it forever; his icy breath has turned your frame to marble. The brass gates of hell have opened and closed for your soul the first and last time; you are now a prisoner of time."

"Dark-winged imp of night await your coming with hideous glee. As they pounce upon your defenceless soul and hiss exultantly in your face, you will pray for mercy and they will laugh. Mercy? There is no mercy; hell will scorch you with anguish; 'Let me rest a moment, oh, let me rest.' They will answer: 'Rest? There is no rest in hell; in helpless despair you will pray and call upon God and they will mock. Can't you still name His name?'

"Lost! No music but the shrieks of the damned and no water but the tears of the damned."

"How long will you remain lost? And echo answers: 'How long? You will remain lost as long as God lives!'

"Until you are the throne of God vacant or occupied by another; until the angels wear mourning and the peacocks are hung with wreaths until the River of Life dries up at its source and the Tree of Life falls to the ground in decay; until the golden streets are bedded with the stink and stench of sin; until heaven is filled with every foul and unclean bird; until your deserted mansion of light is inhabited with loathsome creeping things; until nauseated with the horrible sight and smell located with the dreadful stench you stagger away; wandering over a wide expanse of eternity you find a lonely desolate grave upon the sands of time. I speak reverently, until you see the collapse of hell; until you can throw yourself precariously across the grave of your God and miss your head upon the ground of your Maker—that long you will remain lost!"

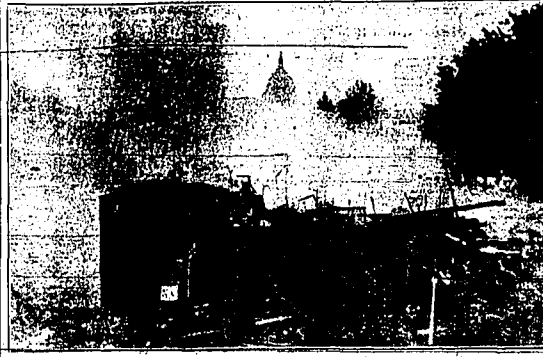
"Fly on, cursed, doomed and damned spirit! No angel will ever greet thy anxious gaze and no savior walls furnish a resting place for the weary sinner! Fly, the foliage of the Tree of Life will ever shelter you beneath its pleasant shade; the River of Life will ever and there stick thy burning thine or cool thy parched-tongue in its sparkling soul. Fly, the pure air of heaven will give thee own evil conscience, moaning and screaming out thy lonely funeral dirge—thou are forever gone beyond 'Lost!'

# SURVEY OF OAKLEY IRRIGATION LOOMS

Idaho Congressional Delegation Makes Possible Studies of Requirements

OAKLEY, Aug. 1 (Special to The News)—Following requests for a federal survey of undeveloped water resources that might be made use of to augment the short water supply of the Oakley valley for irrigation purposes, word has been received in Oakley that an investigation will be conducted by the reclamation department on these lines this summer. The examination and survey has been made possible through the efforts of Senator John Thomas and the Idaho congressional delegation. Application has also been made to the reclamation finance corporation for the advance of funds for the rehabilitation of the Oakley project. A long succession of dry years, coupled with a larger crop area than justified by the amount of available irrigation water, has resulted in water shortages and abandonment of some farms. Additional water can be procured, it is asserted, through pumping from the level of the Snake river backwater of the Miller dam, and also through a possible recourse to an artesian well.

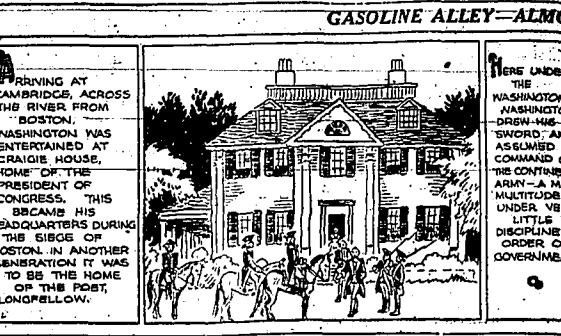

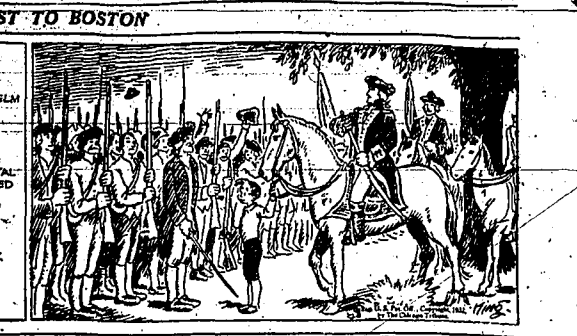

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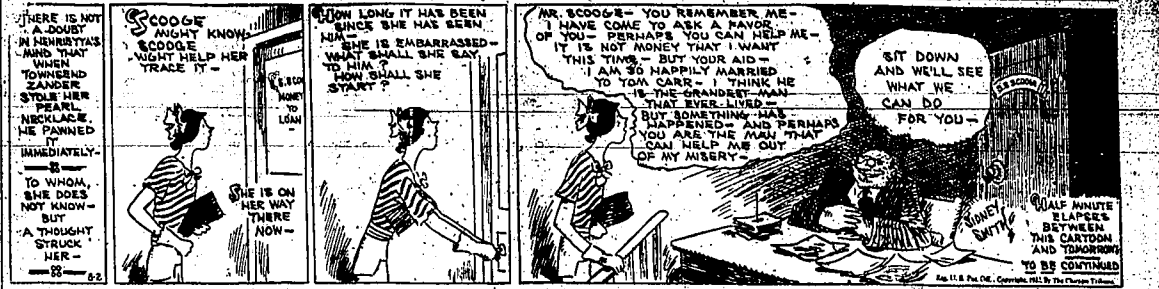

Parsons, county auditor. The decrease of \$221,500 shown in this year's assessment is probably less than was expected from early current reports, based on incomplete information. It was stated by members of the city council last night, at its regular session.

Bills aggregating \$377,244 were allowed, including \$467,723 general fund bills divided as follows: Police, \$129,116; streets, \$158,311; water, \$122,422; gas, \$702,56; sanitary, \$1370; sewer, \$6; meat and dairy inspection, \$180; general expenses \$707.84; Social Security, \$1,000,000; lighting, \$490,931; library, \$760. Water rents received \$21,450.22 and cash collected \$23,221.23, the report of that department showed for July. July reports of M. McGowan, city treasurer, showed receipts of \$19,222.00 and disbursements amounting to \$13,782.78.

Report of R. E. Leighton, chief of police, showed 32 arrests for violation of city ordinances during July, six for traffic violations, seven for intoxication, and six for violation of state laws. Fines collected amounted to \$135.75 and \$1000.00 levied in the police court amounted to \$384. Four cars were stolen and three recovered. The report showed. ### SURVEY BASIS FOR RELIEF ACTIVITIES

Canvass to Ascertain Requirements Precedes Claim Here For Red Cross Cotton

Twin Falls Red Cross chapter, will make regulations for fabric, and bedding materials milled from cotton lately filed by the federal farm board, as soon as it can be determined how much of this material will be necessary to meet requirements of needy persons in and about Twin Falls, it was announced at a meeting attended by about 20 persons in the Parish hall last night. In gathering this information, it was decided, a comprehensive survey is to be made, which is to serve as a basis for the coming season's relief activities in Twin Falls. C. P. Bowles was designated as chairman of the committee to make this survey, with his understanding that Twin Falls Parent-Teacher associations will be requested to lend their active support and assistance in the undertaking. The city and surrounding territory are to be canvassed thoroughly, according to plans outlined last night, with view to determining not only the requirements of needy persons, but to ascertain also the measure of support that may be expected in donations of money, clothing and foodstuffs for relief activities. There is to be no indiscriminate distribution of relief supplies, but, on the contrary, effort will be concentrated toward helping needy persons to help themselves. Members of needy families will be encouraged to make over garments and make bedding with Red Cross materials during the summer and autumn months, and it was suggested, the Parish hall might be made available for this purpose. Similarly, needy families are to be encouraged to make their own accumulations of fruits, vegetables and other foodstuffs during the harvest season.

### Butterfat Prices In New Advance
