INQUEST FOLLOWS FOREST SHOOTING

N. G. Whitney, 59, Boise, Dies in Sawtooth Forest Without Physician's Aid

FAIRFIELD, Idaho, Aug. 3 (Special to The News)—The body of N. G. Whitney, 59, Boise, Idaho, was found in the Sawtooth national forest 15 miles north of Hill City, who died last night from bullet wounds. A physician called to administer aid, was taken to Mountain Home and died of a heart attack. A sheep camp tender found Mr. Whitney at 12 o'clock, severely wounded, with an .22 caliber rifle bullet from his own gun lodged in his left shoulder, about 2 inches from the spine. The camp tender rushed the body to the Hunter Creek ranger station for help. Physicians at Fairchild and Mountain Home could not do anything so the doctor was summoned from Gooding. The latter failed to arrive until after Whitney's death, at 7:30 o'clock last night.

Lloyd Owings, forest guard, reported that the shot apparently was accidental. He stated it was his opinion that Mr. Whitney had left his rifle in a fork of a tree, and that the weapon had discharged when Whitney attempted to dislodge it.

Mr. Whitney was employed by Joe Burt, residing in the Spang Creek district in the Sawtooth national forest north of Hill City. The inquest at Mountain Home will be tomorrow, Thursday, officials stated.

Mr. Whitney made his home at 220 Franklin, Boise. Members of his family survive. Mr. Whitney leaves a widow, Mrs. Minnie Whitney, and eight children: Mrs. Jessie Thompson, Miss Alice Muller and Donald, Orville, Clair, Guy, Paul and May—Whitney, all living in Boise. May, the youngest, is 13.

Mrs. Whitney said in Boise her husband had been suffering for several long time, his activities keeping him away from home since last January and said information she received indicated the death was entirely accidental.

A new case was held by Sheriff Arthur Stevens and Coroner O. C. Zacher in Mountain Home. A coroner jury has been summoned for an inquest at Mountain Home Friday when witnesses will be brought down—the Hill-sondoy. Whitney was born in Rutland, Vermont, and would have been 60 years old August 7. Funeral services will be held in Boise probably Wednesday.

GOUTH AMERICA'S OUTLOOK IMPROVES

European Nations and New World Join in Opposing War Between Two Continents

(By The Associated Press)

Outlook for peace between Paraguay and Bolivia was considerably brightened early today as pressure against war was being exerted in Europe and the Americas. Both nations, however, rushed preparations to fight it out in the field in the event that battle becomes necessary to settle their conflict over the Gran Chaco territory on their borders.

At Geneva the League of Nations secretariat announced that Paraguay had agreed to arbitrate. At La Paz the Bolivian government made public a note informing the League that Bolivia "does not decline pacific means for solution of the controversy."

In Washington representatives of South American nations drew up a statement calling on the belligerents to cease hostilities. Following upon Paraguay's general mobilization order signed last night Bolivia called all classes between 17 and 22 to 28 to the colors.

So that war was fever in a union that 300 volunteers aimed swamped a transport starting up to Paraguay river toward the front with 500 soldiers aboard. Hundreds of Paraguayan women—society girls and "hussy" possibilities—besieged the government offices with pleas that they be allowed to fight alongside their men.

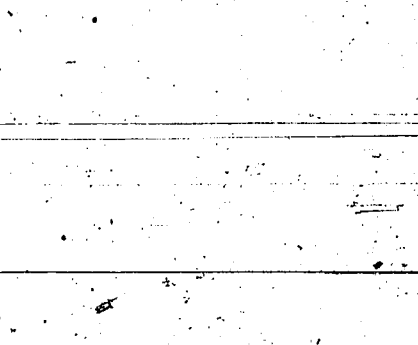

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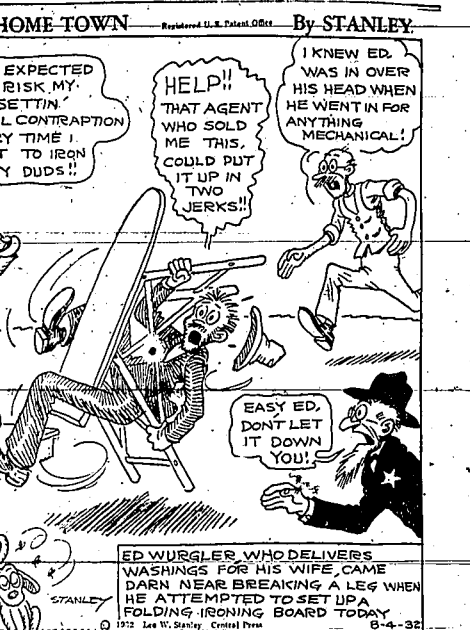
