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900 Blooded Animals Sell At Idaho Wool Growers' Annual Ram Sale In Filer

Stud Consigned by University of Idaho Tups Auction And Total Value of Consignments Nears \$12,000

(Special to The News)
FILER, Aug. 10.—Idaho Wool Growers' association distributed 900 blooded studs and rams among growers throughout southern Idaho at its eleventh annual ram sale here today, disposing of practically all animals consigned to the sale and handling approximately \$12,000 in the transactions.

A University of Idaho Suffolk stud and two University of Idaho Hampshire studs were leaders in this class, one selling to R. B. Beatty, Twin Falls, for \$750 and another to Eugene Looney, Boise, for \$750.

Two Suffolk yearlings consigned to Eugene Looney for \$60 each.

A pen of 10 Suffolk ram lambs consigned by Leida and Brockie was purchased by Maurice Guerry, Castleton, for \$18 each.

Robert H. Blackstock, Filer, sold 37 each for the University of Idaho Hampshire yearlings consigned by W. F. Turner, Nampa.

The average sale price had not been computed definitely tonight, but Melvin O. Clear, Boise, secretary of the association, stated that it probably would show a decrease under last year's average comparison.

The total stock sold this year was approximately 900 blooded studs and rams, 110 this year. The University of Idaho consigned both.

Total sales last year were approximately \$20,000, compared with about \$12,000 this year.

This year's sale was largely attended, more than 250 growers participating, and the secretary said a larger proportion of lambs had been loaded out by buyers this evening than has been the case in other years.

Mr. Clear said indicating buyers came prepared to buy, and did supply their needs at least in line with existing conditions in the sheep and wool industry.

Robert Blackstock, Filer, was chairman in charge of the sale.

The wool growers participating in today's sale mounted up the day with a banquet晚ing in Twin Falls at the evening at which United States Senator John Thomas was the chief attraction.

SENATOR ASSIGNS CONGRESS CREDIT IN COST CUTTING

John Thomas Tells Idaho Stockmen of \$1,000,000,000 Slush in Government Appropriations As Starter

Congress has made substantial contribution to the cause of reduction of expenses of government and restoration of economic conditions in this country, United States Senator John Thomas, Gooding, said in an address before an audience of stockmen at a banquet following an annual Idaho Woolgrowers' association ram sale at Pahrump, Nev., last night.

"If we want to reduce expenditures of federal government, slush or surplus, we must spend less money," Senator Thomas declared.

"Congress made a decided step toward economy in federal expenditures by cutting the appropriation for 1933 to more than a billion dollars less than expended in 1932. It also gave the president authority to combine and eliminate many bureaus and some of this has already been done since congress adjourned. Salary cuts and other economy measures will bring expenditures down still further."

"Further, it was necessary to balance the budget and while the task was unpopular it had to be done to preserve the credit of the nation. The most stringent taxes were placed on those who were most able to pay and income taxes in the higher brackets were raised to as high as 55 per cent."

Revenue Fall

"The deficit in the nation's treasury is not due to greater expenditures particularly as is generally assumed, but to the smaller income, excise and revenue taxes. Income taxes dropped more than \$111,000,000 from 1928 to 1932; internal revenue taxes dropped more than \$180,000,000 and import duties dropped about \$250,000,000. These and other declining revenue needs are met by the treasury for 1933 of more than \$2,000,000,000."

The senator favored relief measures by congress and spoke particularly in favor of the agricultural loan corporation as provided in an amendment to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. This will make loan direct to farmers. The home loan act, he said, should be of great help also as well as the appropriation for construction and the loan states.

The demand of certain groups throughout the country at different times, Senator Thomas said, has caused the development of bureau. These have developed far beyond their needs to some instances are built up a bureaucracy which is difficult to cut or eliminate.

The need for relief is the cause of this depression, as we cannot destroy billions of dollars worth of wealth and millions of lives without having to pay for them in the end.

"I am hopeful," Senator Thomas said, "of a return of confidence and with it the helpful relief work of governmental agencies set up by the last congress. Relief of unemployment, rise of commodity prices and a general trend toward prosperity and optimism."

Bonds Warning

Senator Thomas emphasized that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and other similar agencies were brought forth to meet evident requirements of a great national international emergency.

"None of them," he said, "can be justified in normal times, and none should be permitted to exist in normal times."

Challenge To Faith

Senator Thomas closed his address with a stirring rallying cry for marshaling of faith and courage and ability to withstand hardship which in the past has brought this nation through periods of depression to a new dawn of hope and better day that is not far distant.

Senator Thomas was introduced by Dr. E. W. McClure, Bliss, former secretary of the National Wool Growers' Association.

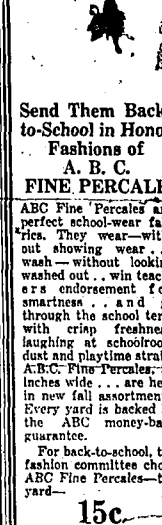

CONGRESSMAN SEES UPWARD TREND IN NATION'S BUSINESS

Representative Addison T. Smith Believes Congressional Legislation Beneficial to People

Congressman and Mrs. Addison T. Smith arrived in Twin Falls yesterday afternoon from Washington and will make their residence at 231 Seventh avenue north, until the return to the national capital for the opening of congress in December.

Mr. Smith expressed belief that the turning place of the depression had passed and that congressional legislation had exercised a beneficial effect.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Smith are well, though the long trip across the country, with stops in Ohio to see relatives, was tiring, they stated.

"The session of congress which has just closed was the most exhaustive one since the Great War," said Mr. Smith. "More bills of far-reaching importance were considered by congress during that session except during the World War congress. Among the bills of national importance considered and passed by the house of representatives were the international debt moratorium bill, the tariff revision bill, the Reconstruction Finance Corporation act, the constitutional amendment known as the 'Lend-Lease' bill, the emergency relief act for loaning money to the states and municipalities for entering upon a public works program which will give employment to hundreds of thousands of people."

Among the bills of peculiar interest to Idaho, and the West, to which Representative Smith said he had devoted a great deal of time and study, were the relief bill for the benefit of water users on dried States reclamation projects, bills to control and regulate grazing on the public domain, bills to assist in the protection of watersheds and the storage of flood waters in the Western states, and the reauthorization of silver.

Congressman Smith stated that he believes that the legislation enacted by congress is largely responsible for the recent rise in the prices of certain farm products and the marked upturn in the prices of industrial stocks and bonds, and that we have now passed the turning place in the depression and that times will become better from now on.

Representative and Mrs. Smith expressed themselves as being very glad to be back home, and look forward to resuming their friendships and acquaintances in the state.
