Leonard scored 181 pounds, two more than Walker. Leonard had to stage a comeback to gain the decision over the rugged New Jersey waterweight. He had led at four out of the first seven rounds and seemed doomed to defeat.

Leonard staged a rally in the eighth, cutting Walker about the head and completely out-punching him. Heavy boxer Paulie Walker, Michigan, lightweight, decisively out-punched Charley Raymond, Brooklyn, in his 10-round preliminary. Jack Rodman, South Bend, Indiana, Negro heavyweight, stopped Ed Whittington, West Virginia, after 1:15 of the third round of another 10 rounder.

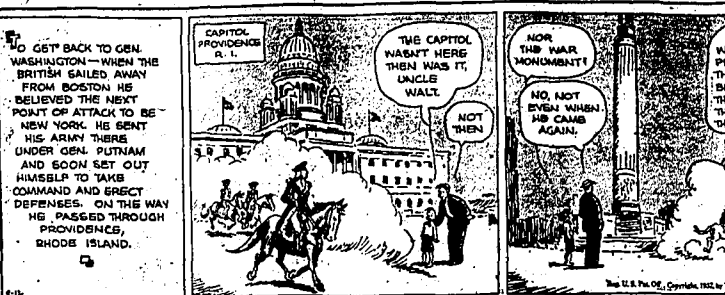
