By JOHN L. COOLEY (Associated Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, Aug. 13—Stock market was curbed up considerably today as conflicting cross-currents swept over it, stocks ending the day 1/8 higher on the main scale, while a few registered slight net gains.

Today's buying was apparently of two classes, one representing new purchases by bullish investors who had missed the previous rally and wished to enter the market once it receded, and part of it representing covering by short sellers who were fairly active in the market on Friday.

The bond market reacted after a week of steadily advancing prices and the bull market in stocks was momentum in the selling of stocks. The commodity market pursued a somewhat mixed course, with wheat, foreign exchange more firm, possibly indicating some profit-taking in our market for foreign account.

The weekly trade figures sounded a somewhat more cheerful note, while no important reflection of the general financial picture was indicated in the heavy industries, aside from a somewhat sterner tendency for scrap iron, a fairly substantial increase in movement of iron and tin ores was reported. This was particularly noticeable, the reviews of the automobile industry, which showed a reduction of 14,694 cars in the previous month.

Among the active stocks which, after yielding 1/2 to 5/8 points in the early trading, bounced back to a level where they ended the day about a point lower were Santa Fe, Chesapeake, General Motors, Southern Railway, Union Pacific, Bethlehem Steel, DuPont and Pennsylvania.

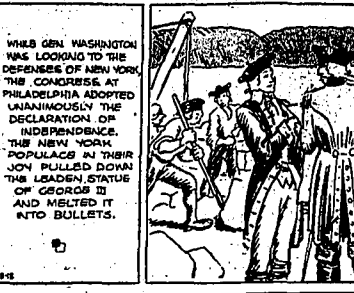

Wheat closed nervous at almost the day's bottom, 7-8 to 1-8 under pressure from a number of factors.

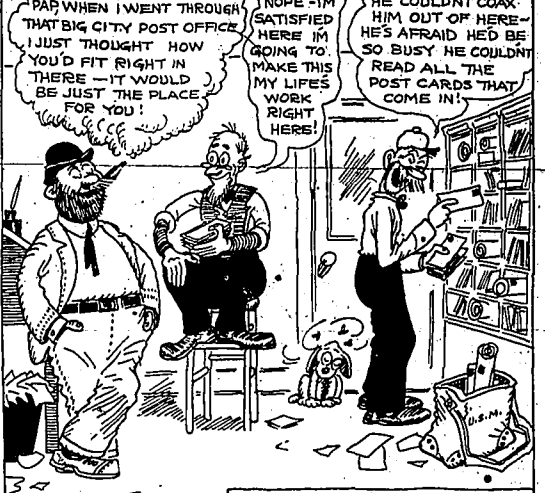

TWIN FALLS BEAN PRICE GETS BOOST

Increase of 15 Cents a 100 Adds \$70,000 to Value of South Idaho Holdings

Great Northern bean price in Twin Falls rose 15 cents a 100 pounds yesterday, adding more than \$70,000 to the value of the present inventory of beans in the South Central Idaho district which ships through Minidoka, on the basis of an estimated 480,000-bag carry-over.

The prevailing price, quoted last night by five dealers in the city of Twin Falls, is \$125 a 100 for number 1, and \$115 a hundred for number 2.

The price Twin Falls dealers offered early in the week was \$115 for number 1 and 90 cents for number 2. A 5-cent rise occurred in the quotations on Friday, and the 10-cent rise Saturday followed closely.

Altogether in the last week the value of the present carry-over in the warehouses of the South Central Idaho district has increased nearly \$100,000. This is in addition to the increase in value of the crop which is to be harvested. It is estimated that the 1932 harvest of Great Northern in this district is about 80 per cent of the 1931 harvest.

Other bean-growing districts have reported similar reports in 1932.

The government report of Great Northern bean inventories throughout the nation shows the 1932 crop exceeding about 3,000,000 bags under the 1931 harvest.

This decrease in viable supply of beans is believed partly responsible for the recent rise in price.

L. F. Spencer, who pleaded guilty to operating a truck loaded with poles one of which extended 30 feet back of the truck at 8 P. M. last Tuesday, was sentenced to pay \$15 fine and costs.

C. Noble, accused of operating a truck loaded with wood but with no warning light displayed at the rear of the load, was sentenced to pay \$8 fine and costs.

The law under which these cases were prosecuted forbids operation of motor vehicles with loads extending more than four feet behind the rear of the truck, and without a yellow or red light plainly visible under normal atmospheric circumstances.

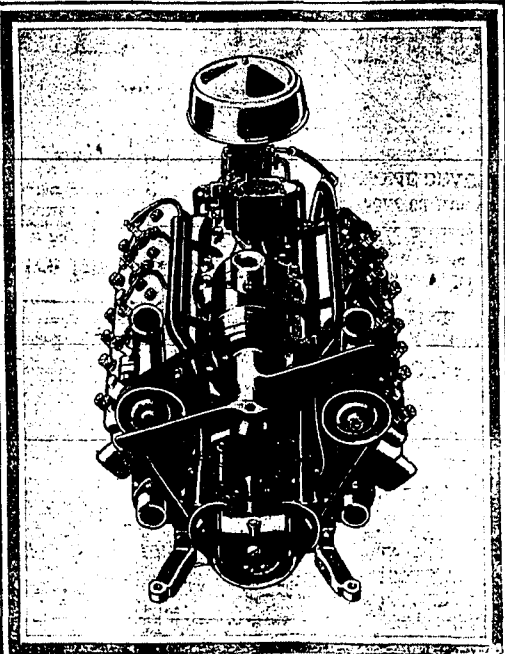
