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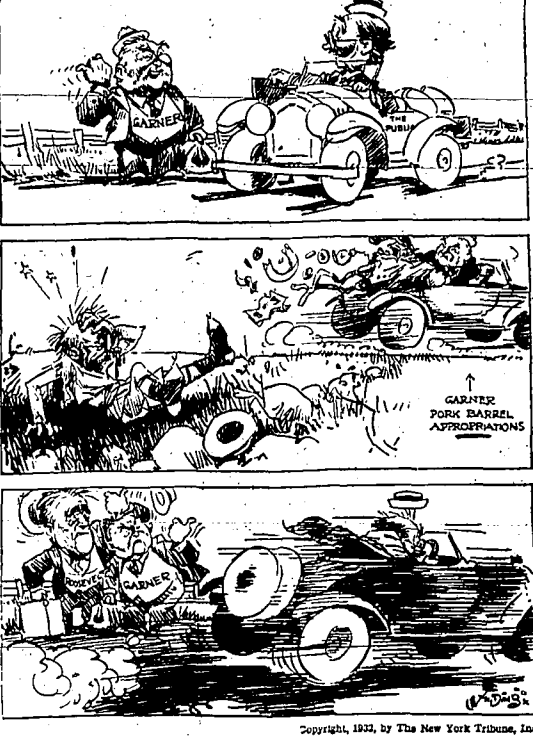

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### GRAIN COOPERATIVE REVEALS OPTIMISM

Stockholders of Gigantic Federal-Sponsored Unit Foresee Better Days Ahead

CHICAGO, Aug. 16 (AP)—Twenty-eight stockholders of the Farmers' National Grain corporation, grain-farmer-owned and government-sponsored grain cooperative, agreed today the agricultural outlook was improving and were informed co-operative marketing was making rapid progress.

Officers of the corporation announced net earnings for the year ended May 31 were more than \$2,000,000, that membership increased in practically every section, and that the organization handled 1,000,000 bushels of grain—more than 20 per cent of the nation's crop and 50,000,000 bushels more than the previous year.

"Most farmers are optimistic—and that means a lot," said C. E. Huff, president of the corporation. "Prices for grain had been low for some time, but farmers are now getting a fair price and that's what this country needs most."

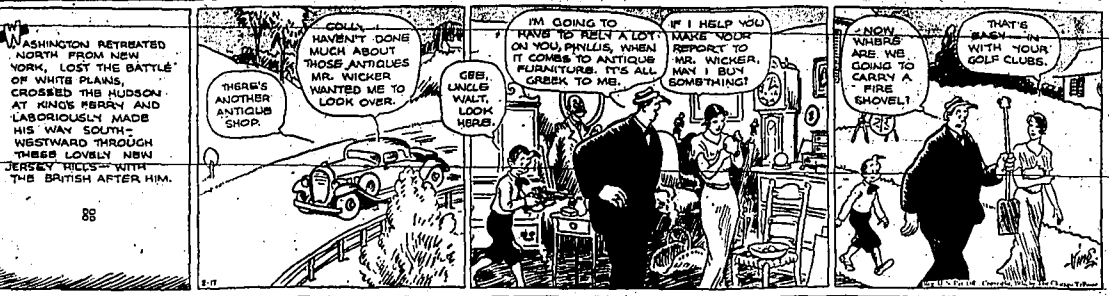
